

God is

“I believe in God, the Father almighty.....” These are the opening words of The Apostles’ Creed. The Nicene Creed, which we use during the service of Holy Communion, begins in a similar way with the words “We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty.....” This is something which we stand up and say publicly every Sunday. Sometimes I wonder to myself who or what is God the Father. Do we have a credible way of thinking about Him?

This question was once raised by the distinguished 16th.Century French scholar, Michel Montagne (1533-1592). His conclusion was that nothing could actually be known about God. So, what do we know that might challenge such an assumption?

We should have no problem about belief in the existence, the uniqueness and the godliness of “God the Son.” Jesus was absolutely unique and without sin – not just a wise teacher or a prophet or even the greatest of the prophets –but something above and beyond them. In a word, “God made flesh.” More than that, the gospel record of John states that “He was with God in the beginning (John 1 v.2)”; and the Nicene Creed confirms this in the words “of one Being with the Father. Through Him all things were made.”

We can get our heads round that and, in a similar way, grasp the nature and significance of the third person of the Trinity - the Holy Spirit. This unseen presence can be recognised as an influence for good and the source of comfort in a troubled world. But what are we able to make of God the Father? We can identify qualities of creativity, power, truth, justice and mercy that surely belong to God; but what can we say or know about the absolute being or “substance” of God?

Recently I came across an observation by St. Jerome to the effect that God is His own origin and the cause of His own substance. I think this is helpful in that it clarifies why we are unable to fully know Him - and, of course, it is constructive to

recall that “no-one has ever seen God (John 1 v.18).”

God simply is. We cannot think in terms such as “God was” or “God will be.” His “Is”ness is eternal and unchanging. From the beginning until the end of time God is. It is of the very nature of God to exist entirely by reason of Himself.

We can be reassured and clear in our own minds that Jesus represents to us in human form everything we can know or need to know about God. Jesus, as “God the Son,” encapsulates for us, in a form that we can grasp, all that God is. As He said to Philip: “Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father (John 14 v.9).” Beyond that, the essence of God is all around us invisibly through the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit.

We have a God-given gift of freedom to either accept or reject the nature and the influence of God. Although He is hidden from our sight we undoubtedly have a very good way of considering Him; and an invitation to worship Him “in spirit and in truth (John 4 v.24).”

OLO: partnering with Maridi Diocese

It was exciting news to hear at both vestries that Bishop Justin of Maridi Diocese, who has visited here twice in the last two years, has invited us to become partners with Olo Area, a portion of the diocese of Maridi under the care of a Bishop Tandema Obed.



Both vestries were in agreement with this in principle, and now comes the process of determining how to make this a meaningful and useful link for them and for us. Already at church we have seen how a couple of bicycles have

been given to the clergy there to enable them to travel around their vast areas more easily. Mama Liz kindly showed us a picture of the bicycles being presented when she spoke to the congregations in January.

Would you like to be part of this developing relationship? We hope to be in touch with CMSI's new Director (she took up the role on 23/2/15!) Mrs Jenny Smith to see how we go about developing the partnership. It will most likely involve communication, prayer, financial support, visits and sharing of ideas between the two dioceses. A three year plan helps build concrete results into what is otherwise a rather "woolly" concept. More information to come soon, but please speak to Liz or Stephen about this in the meantime.

Reading the Bible in Church *part 2*

Bible Society NI have produced a helpful guide to Bible Reading: I thought you might like to think about reading the Bible in St Ignatius' or St Andrew's. The following guidelines offer some advice on preparations to make, and pitfalls to watch out for. We trust that the result will be that God's Word will be clearly heard by everyone and that the beauty of its message will impact on them.

On the day

1. Quietly, ask God to help you in your task so that you will be conscious of His presence with you. Pray that people will be touched by the words you read. Ask that the words will speak to you too.
2. Arrive early and find out where you are to read from – a lectern or reading desk, for example? Will the Bible sit on this without slipping?
3. Can you see clearly to read the words if you set the Bible in front of you, taking into account the lighting at that spot?
4. Decide where you are going to sit so that you can easily reach the required position with a minimum of delay.
5. Is there a microphone? Check that it is switched on, that is at a suitable height for you and within 18 – 24 inches from your mouth. Too far, and it will not pick up your voice. Too close and your voice will not be natural.
6. Check for hazards in your path – steps, loose carpet or cables.
7. Use the bookmarks to mark your page: Black for Old Testament, Red for Gospel, Blue for New Testament epistle.

Will you feel encouraged to read a little of the Scriptures each day?

Coming to Faith

It's a strange phrase but it captures what happens in some people's lives: they don't exactly **choose** to believe, or **decide** to follow Christ's ways. No. They simply **come to faith!** They find themselves trusting, praying, relying and leaning on God as Saviour. It was, for them, a gradual process.

For others life is very different. For them the decision to live a Christian life involved a whole change of direction and it was a momentous event so that their friends and family noticed a big difference. Their conversion was delightfully sudden and dramatic so that they are able to say with clarity and conviction, "I was converted on that day"!

Have you ever tried to **put into words** how you came to faith? Was it sudden, like some, or a slow process like others. Was it like waking from a long gentle sleep or being startled awake suddenly?

Try to find words to describe your experience of coming to know Jesus Christ. It is really helpful to have thought about what you might say to someone when they challenge you for your faith.

For me, Stephen, my upbringing made faith seem a reasonable and good approach to life. When I was eleven I decided that this was the way I felt and believed personally and so invited Jesus to be Lord of my life. But that wasn't the end of the story. Indeed I still need to renew that decision and decide to follow Jesus today, to keep putting him first in my life and in my decision making.

How about you? Have you decided to follow Jesus? Do you need to make that decision afresh today? Are there people who are looking to you to discover why you are part of this church? Find words that make sense to you and write them down if it helps.

And if you haven't come to faith yet, may I suggest that it is the best way to face real problems, and find hopeful and life affirming answers.

However it happens I hope you too "Come to faith!"
