

Annual Report to Carryduff Easter Vestry

The Parish of Carryduff has several significant features which make it a privilege for each of us to have a part in its life

The **location** is both convenient to two cities and yet distinct from both of them. Based on busy commuter routes to and from both Belfast and Lisburn, the community here is able to access the resources which the cities provide yet possesses a unique atmosphere of its own.

The **halls** have long been valued with a sense of being for the community of which we are part rather than purely "church" property. People of all religious traditions and none find a welcome here, based on a shared respect for one another and a willingness to work together.

The **sanctuary**, the church building itself, is delightfully different from other church buildings - in both the community and the diocese - and is able to respond creatively to the opportunities for worship and community life which comes its way.

And so in this my second report to the parish it is my privilege to **thank** the faithful and supportive team here who have striven to keep our church on an upward journey. Your vision and commitment to God and his Church have proved valuable in developing the opportunities our location, our halls and our sanctuary provide.

Mission 2015 is not so much an event as an attitude: in each programme and event we have been considering as a parish, we have tried to look outside our own walls to see how the church can be more fitted to serve our community in this year of Mission.

After last year's Easter Vestry the new Select Vestry's first decision was to commence the installation of **Screens** to aid the conduct of services for all ages in weekly worship. With teething problems associated with such change and with the slow process of building up a team of helpers we are now at a stage where we can enable those who are comfortable with books and page numbers and those who are comfortable only with screens to take an equal part in regular worship. Visitors to the worship no longer need to guess what page they are on!

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The Diocese challenged us to take part in **24:7 Prayer** and we ventured into this with both trepidation and a wonderful enthusiasm. The fact that **over 80 individuals** from the two parishes took part in the five days, offering to spend an hour or several hours in prayer vigil made all the effort by the organizing team worthwhile. We surprised ourselves at what we could do when we dared to follow the guidance and keep the hall or church open for 24 hours for five days. Viona Crothers led this team for both churches.

Early in 2014 plans for the **Christmas Tree Festival** were launched and the various contributors to the event were drawn together and - enthused by Joyce McMeekin and Keith Shaw – took part in what was both enjoyable and inspiring and fun. Seeing our community come together to create, to sing and to delight in the Festival was a wonderful thing.

The Vestry has maintained its concern for the repairs to the roof of the **Jeremy Taylor Chapel**. After several months of searches and checks and re-checks the wall above the chapel rather than the roof itself seems to have been the sole cause of the most recent persistent leak. We dare to hope that having found the source we can look forward to a final repair to the ceiling and a fresh look at securing the long term future of the structure of the church itself. Money was raised at the Harvest for this work and other more decorative repairs and we await application of this resource now that the leak is fixed!

We have been well served on our vestry by various office bearers. Some have reached the end of their service, in particular Francis Buchanan who stood down from being **Honorary Secretary** at the first meeting of the newly elected vestry last April. Having anticipated this the vestry thanked him at the time and we renew that thanks more publicly this evening.

Our **Honorary Treasurer**, Stephen Thompson, has once more done all that was asked of him, and we thank him particularly for his sourcing of Accountants for the parish who have audited our accounts this year.

I thank the **Churchwardens** and **Glebewardens** for their ongoing attention to detail, and while I leave it to the members of the general vestry to thank their wardens as they see fit, I

would like to thank Ken Fletcher and Mark Rourke for their service as Churchwarden and Glebewarden this year for me, and to encourage great thanks too for Derek McKinley and Dave Nevin for their outstanding work.

Derek McKinley was appointed **Sexton** in succession to Mrs Pat Williams who completed her term of service with the best thanks of the parish and a small gift during the year.

Worship is often dependent on the willingness and the ability of those who provide the music during the services. We have been using recorded music at many of our evening services, some of which has been successful. Videos of children's songs prove a popular change at morning services. We are deeply grateful to Mrs Pat Mees, Mrs Marlene Moore and Mrs Michelle Hudson for giving their combined talent and effort and enthusiasm to make the worship honouring to God. We would love to have a full time organist so that the Choir would be better supported but in the interim we are well served by our deputy organists and pianists.

Mission 2015: For YOU/for Him is happening all around us. In the next few weeks a special youth event happens on Monday of Holy Week, a new way of marking Maundy Thursday will take place with a meal, a Film from the Billy Graham organization will feature on Good Friday Night, a fabulous concert by Belfast Community Gospel Choir has almost sold out for an April date, and ten days of mission events are planned for October featuring our Missioner, Rev James Boyd from Dromore, Co Tyrone.

You have afforded me a very warm welcome in your homes when I have had the privilege of visiting you. I hope to be more visible on your homes in the year ahead. If you would like me to arrange a visit in the immediate future please contact me when I have a diary handy and I will come and see you.

One of the major steps to take—in the next year—is to refurbish the halls: the J Club decorated upstairs rooms last summer, and the Mitchell Room in which our Easter Vestry meets has been beautifully decorated just a few weeks ago. Further maintenance and decoration is being planned now that we have a better idea - thanks to organization leaders - about how best to store equipment in the halls.

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Finally we note with delight the new connection being made between our parishes here and a brand new Diocese in South Sudan. Through our link with CMSI and the Diocese of Maridi, where Bishop Justin serves, we were able to confirm in our vestry a new link - which will take priority - with **Olo Diocese**. Olo was formerly an area of Maridi but on 15th January 2015 became a diocese in its own right. We look forward to developing the relationship with **Bishop Tandema Obed Andrew** who met our own Liz Fleming in December last. Liz was part of a small team working with young women in Uganda and South Sudan. This was a great start.

May I thank all members of the Select Vestry, the ministry team including Lay Reader Marlene Moore, Lesson Readers and Prayer Leaders, Keith Shaw and the Mission 2015 Team, and the regular worshippers who together serve God to make his kingdom grow in Carryduff.

Crackpots

There have always been a few weird people around. I mean people with odd or misguided ideas, or with delusions of grandeur. Some might simply have been harmless eccentrics, while others, arguably, were out and out crackpots.

Such people – often sincere but just plain crazy or wrongheaded – can, by the sheer force of personality, attract a substantial public following and, in some cases, lead people into serious danger.

There is a long and occasionally unfortunate history of strange personalities within the various Christian traditions. Not all of them were heretics or in any sense harmful. Think, for example, of Simeon Stylites (388-459) who simply withdrew from the world and, for thirty seven years, lived out his faith in isolation on the top of a stone pillar.

On the other hand, there have been those who were more dangerously deluded. Two quite alarming characters within the 20th Century come readily to mind. One is the Rev. Sun Myung Moon (1920-2012), from North Korea, who claimed to have had a personal meeting with Jesus on Easter Day 1936. Thereafter he became an active Christian evangelist. This, inevitably, brought him into conflict with the North Korean government. He was later released from prison by UN forces, during the Korean War.

Subsequently his teachings were collected in a text – the Divine Principle – which he claimed both interpreted and completed the Bible. According to this text the world was divided between God centred (American) democracy and Satan centred communism. He further claimed (outrageously) that Jesus was crucified before He could fulfil His divine mission (of raising a God centred family) and, therefore, a second messiah was required. He went on to state - without mentioning his own name -that this second messiah would emerge from Korea. A crackpot? Perhaps it is also worth

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mentioning that Rev. Moon became the founder of the cultish (and very strong) Unification Church and that he adjusted his notion of a God centred America after being indicted and imprisoned in the US for tax fraud.

The other character I have in mind is the American Pentecostal preacher Jim Jones (1931-1978), who established a ministry centred on faith healing, social service and racial integration, all with a distinctly socialist emphasis. He thus attracted a large, primarily African-American, following to whom he depicted American capitalism as racist and oppressive. Thereafter his story gets rather more contentious.

He proclaimed himself as Christ and, in one sermon, said "You can call me an egomaniac.... with a messianic complex. I don't have a complex, honey. I happen to know I'm the messiah." A crackpot? Things then get a great deal more alarming.

Jones assured his congregation that "evil American capitalism" would suffer nuclear destruction in a Third World War. Almost inevitably he had to flee the country and, in the end, he led over 900 of his followers into mass suicide by cyanide poisoning (on 18 November 1978) in what became known as the Jonestown massacre.

I imagine we all know of other much publicised outspoken preachers and media stars who have landed themselves in financial scandals and other difficulties. Mercifully, we are relatively free of these things in the Anglican tradition and I, for one, am most grateful that we have a reliable written liturgy and an ordained ministry characterised for the most part by clergy with a secure sense of the absolute essence of Christian faith.

Finally, your time to read arrives

- 1. Wait for everyone to settle, especially if sitting down after singing.
- 2. Allow sufficient time after you have announced the passage (if required) for everyone to find the starting point giving a page number is helpful.
- 3. It may be helpful to give a one-sentence summary of what you are about to read.
- 4. Read at a good pace, but don't rush, even if you feel nervous. You are trying to convey the meaning as well as the words of the passage.
- 5. Remember, you want the people at the back to hear you clearly.
- 6. When you are finished, remember to add the customary words, and walk carefully back to your place.
- 7. Afterwards, thank God for the privilege of reading this special book.

We hope that our hints have helped you to read the Bible in public well.

Easter Eggs! For the love of chocolate

Are you going to indulge in Easter chocolate this year? Ever wonder where it first came from? We have the Aztecs of equatorial Central America to thank: it was they who discovered that a certain tree, later named Theobroma Cacao, was well worth cultivating. The Aztecs considered chocolate the 'drink of the gods' (Theo means God, broma means drink; hence the name). The Aztecs credited chocolate for everything from spiritual wisdom to sexual prowess; Emperor Montezuma is reported to have drunk more than 50 flagons of the stuff each day.

The Spanish explorer Cortes also called it 'the divine drink', and the conquistadors brought chocolate back to Spain. From there it travelled north, and reached England about 1849. It was first served as a drink, until during the Industrial Revolution it caught the attention of several leading Quaker families, (including the Cadburys, the Frys, the Rowntress and the Terrys. It was the Fry family who created the first 'eating' chocolate... and the rest, as they say, is history. Today the world eats **about** 600,000 tons a year. Enjoy your Easter egg!



An avid traveller and keen rugby fan, Courtney also was a part time poultry farmer at the home which he extended and improved at Drumalig. Courtney is survived by his wife Jo and their sons Ian and Roddy and six grandchildren. The service at Roselawn was well attended and his ashes were buried the following day at Killaney.
