

Dear Parishioners

You all realise what a privilege we have in being associated with St Andrew's Killaney as our home church. The marvellous location of the building, the beautifully manicured grass stretching out towards the road, the tower stretching up to the heavens and the warm and tastefully furnished setting- these are the things which most people consider when they think of our church. I do too. But a church is not a building, it is the people who meet there. The church is not on the side of the road from Ballynahinch to Carryduff. The church is in your home and mine.

What difference does such a change of perspective make? May I suggest three as we prepare for our Annual General Meeting on 14th April.

If the Church is truly people then we need to:

Build up the people with as much energy as we strengthen the building: this involves developing new and fresh ways of meeting, worshipping, praying, encouraging and relaxing together so that the body of Christ is built up.

If the Church is truly people then we need to:

Focus efforts on the younger generation who will gradually replace those of us who are older as leaders and supportive members of the church.

If the Church is truly about people then we need to:

Serve people's needs over and above serving the buildings' needs as we become more adventurous in utilising the space we have inherited.

None of this implies even remotely that the care and attention we have rightly paid to the buildings we admire is either misplaced or inappropriate. We could look on it as a family preparing the room for a new baby: the time comes when the room is ready and we need to focus on the new arrival! People not Place.

As I look back on the last year I see great evidence that St Andrew's is living out these purposes day by day.

Whether it is the recent Table Quiz, the Trip to Castle Espie at Christmas, the Parish Picnic or the Sale the focus has been on

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the people who particulate rather than the financial outcome.

We see the sacrifice and effort of the team travelling to Ethiopia with Habitat for Humanity NI, including the huge effort made by family and friends to help the team go.

The rallying around of people at times of need:

No adequate words can be said to describe the shock and sadness we all felt in Killaney when we heard of the death of our recently appointed Church Warden Mr Barry Finlay. The sudden death of such a vibrant and caring individual, who was oblivious to everything but character in those with whom he dealt personally and professionally, left our whole parish and community shocked for months.

Tributes have been paid to Barry far and wide and we were privileged to hold a short vigil in St Andrew's on an evening before the large funeral took pace in Saintfield Presbyterian where his family burial ground was.

Bill and Richard counted it as a privilege to take his place in honour of the man who was due to join the team in Ethiopia few months later: for them we are deeply grateful.

As we look to the year behind us we also see a year in which slow but steady progress has been made in the plans to extend the car park. It is truly surprising the number of approvals we have had to obtain to extend the number of places we can park cars off the road! As we go to the press the final approval is being sought, this time from RCB - who are the titular owners of the Church and Grounds. With that we hope to put the work out to tender to start very soon.

In the course of the year the Church organ was repositioned to give a better sound reproduction and the opportunity taken to add a new base. The use of the hall for the 24:7 prayer vigil in October proved a very moving event for many of our fellow parishioners as a delightful and remarkable peace descended on the people using the room. The Harvest Festival was marked with a wonderful dress by our neighbouring minister the Rev James Hyndman, and a suitably celebratory tea enabled those present to purchase the goods from the harvest for a good cause, this year for Mrs Liz Fleming's trip to Maridi in December. Her report on her return reminded us of the mar-

vellous work which generous and willing people can achieve as they follow God's heart in care for those in need.

An even greater event was the journey mentioned earlier by our men as they went with Willie Nixon and the folks from Drumbeg Area to Ethiopia to help a building project there. We were all very proud of the efforts which Brian, Bill, Raymond, Richard and our guest member Norman put in for the community far away. These were life changing and enhancing moments for these good men.

The break in to the church which took place during the Christmas Tree festival was a sad reminder of the values of those who regard property belonging to other people as being ripe for stealing. The damage has been repaired and we move on.

As we meet for the AGM of our church on Tuesday 14th April at 7.30 pm may I offer my good wishes to those who have served and those who will serve on our Select Vestry in 2015.

Thank you to everyone who gave themselves to the work of the Lord in the year that is past.

Samaritan's Purse update

Denis Carson our local volunteer for Samaritan's Purse has passed on a letter of thanks from them for our support for Operation Christmas Child 2014.

"We very much appreciate your partnership with us through our Project." 8770 boxes were sent to children in Bosnia, Mexico included 68 from our parishes. The NI Total was 42,840 boxes sent variously to Kosovo, Bosnia, Belarus, and Swaziland.

The Impact of a shoebox gift...

"In May last year Serbia was affected by serious flooding, and Samaritan's Purse responded by bringing in essential supplies through local Christian partners."

When Christmas came the team brought gifts to the children "we have never experienced such joy! Kids

that had lost everything in the floods were absolutely delighted to receive a gift and take it to their empty homes. Many of them we had met before when we brought aid like sugar, pasta flour...the floods had stripped their homes and left disaster.

We drove back home praising God for what he did in this town that had lost hope. Our team has visited and helped hundreds of families. They had the privilege of sharing the gospel with many."

Crackpots

There have always been a few weird people around. I mean people with odd or misguided ideas, or with delusions of grandeur. Some might simply have been harmless eccentrics, while others, arguably, were out and out crackpots.

Such people – often sincere but just plain crazy or wrongheaded – can, by the sheer force of personality, attract a substantial public following and, in some cases, lead people into serious danger.

There is a long and occasionally unfortunate history of strange personalities within the various Christian traditions. Not all of them were heretics or in any sense harmful. Think, for example, of Simeon Stylites (388-459) who simply withdrew from the world and, for thirty seven years, lived out his faith in isolation on the top of a stone pillar.

On the other hand, there have been those who were more dangerously deluded. Two quite alarming characters within the 20th Century come readily to mind. One is the Rev. Sun Myung Moon (1920-2012), from North Korea, who claimed to have had a personal meeting with Jesus on Easter Day 1936. Thereafter he became an active Christian evangelist. This, inevitably, brought him into conflict with the North Korean government. He was later released from prison by UN forces, during the Korean War.

Subsequently his teachings were collected in a text – the Divine Principle – which he claimed both interpreted and completed the Bible. According to this text the world was divided between God centred (American) democracy and Satan centred communism. He further claimed (outrageously) that Jesus was crucified before He could fulfil His divine mission (of raising a God centred family) and, therefore, a second messiah was required. He went on to state - without mentioning his own name -that this second messiah would emerge from Korea. A crackpot? Perhaps it is also worth

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mentioning that Rev. Moon became the founder of the cultish (and very strong) Unification Church and that he adjusted his notion of a God centred America after being indicted and imprisoned in the US for tax fraud.

The other character I have in mind is the American Pentecostal preacher Jim Jones (1931-1978), who established a ministry centred on faith healing, social service and racial integration, all with a distinctly socialist emphasis. He thus attracted a large, primarily African-American, following to whom he depicted American capitalism as racist and oppressive. Thereafter his story gets rather more contentious.

He proclaimed himself as Christ and, in one sermon, said "You can call me an egomaniac.... with a messianic complex. I don't have a complex, honey. I happen to know I'm the messiah." A crackpot? Things then get a great deal more alarming.

Jones assured his congregation that "evil American capitalism" would suffer nuclear destruction in a Third World War. Almost inevitably he had to flee the country and, in the end, he led over 900 of his followers into mass suicide by cyanide poisoning (on 18 November 1978) in what became known as the Jonestown massacre.

I imagine we all know of other much publicised outspoken preachers and media stars who have landed themselves in financial scandals and other difficulties. Mercifully, we are relatively free of these things in the Anglican tradition and I, for one, am most grateful that we have a reliable written liturgy and an ordained ministry characterised for the most part by clergy with a secure sense of the absolute essence of Christian faith.

Finally, your time to read arrives

- 1. Wait for everyone to settle, especially if sitting down after singing.
- 2. Allow sufficient time after you have announced the passage (if required) for everyone to find the starting point giving a page number is helpful.
- 3. It may be helpful to give a one-sentence summary of what you are about to read.
- 4. Read at a good pace, but don't rush, even if you feel nervous. You are trying to convey the meaning as well as the words of the passage.
- 5. Remember, you want the people at the back to hear you clearly.
- 6. When you are finished, remember to add the customary words, and walk carefully back to your place.
- 7. Afterwards, thank God for the privilege of reading this special book.

We hope that our hints have helped you to read the Bible in public well.

Easter Eggs! For the love of chocolate

Are you going to indulge in Easter chocolate this year? Ever wonder where it first came from? We have the Aztecs of equatorial Central America to thank: it was they who discovered that a certain tree, later named Theobroma Cacao, was well worth cultivating. The Aztecs considered chocolate the 'drink of the gods' (Theo means God, broma means drink; hence the name). The Aztecs credited chocolate for everything from spiritual wisdom to sexual prowess; Emperor Montezuma is reported to have drunk more than 50 flagons of the stuff each day.

The Spanish explorer Cortes also called it 'the divine drink', and the conquistadors brought chocolate back to Spain. From there it travelled north, and reached England about 1849. It was first served as a drink, until during the Industrial Revolution it caught the attention of several leading Quaker families, (including the Cadburys, the Frys, the Rowntress and the Terrys. Mr Courtney Fleming passed away peacefully following a short illness in hospital. He spent his entire career working for the company finally known as Dalgety's who were involved in selling and distributing farm feeds. As sales director there he insisted on keeping out on the road to keep in touch with the people he supplied. An avid traveller and keen rugby fan, Courtney also was a part time poultry farmer at the home which he extended and improved at Drumalig. Courtney is survived by his wife Jo and their sons Ian and Roddy and six grandchildren. The service at Roselawn was well attended and his ashes were buried the following day at Killaney.
