Our end of year treat this year will not involve a long walk to McDonalds. Instead, it will be a short walk to Funtastic for some fun and food.

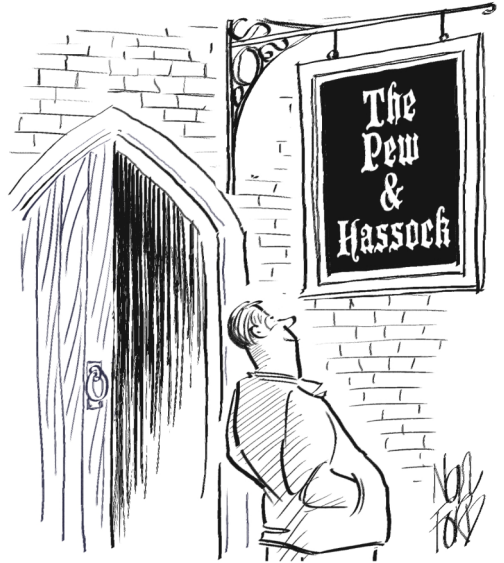
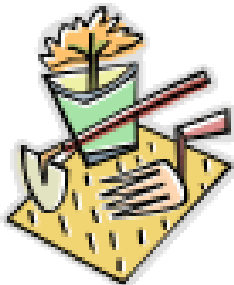
We hope to go to Funtastic in June although the day and date have still to be confirmed. To help us arrange the outing, please let us know if you would like your child to attend.

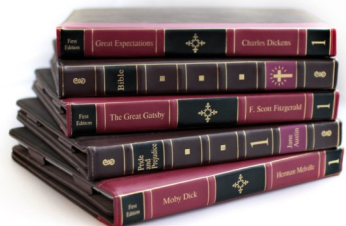
Ted worked for the Billy Graham organisation years ago, so we were looking forward to the film on Good Friday. There were only about 40 people present, but we don't know how many would usually be at a more traditional Good Friday service. It was good to see that, at 95, Billy Graham was still able to articulate his faith in a very clear and loving way. The film was an excellent production and very moving, but the life experience of the two people featured was not really akin to those watching. So the most memorable part of the evening for me, was Stephen's explanation before the film started, of how he had changed from being only a son of the church to a member of the family of God. This had not had dramatic effects on his everyday life, but definitely on the whole direction and focus of his life. On the day when we remembered the awesome wonder of what had happened on the Cross, this echoed with my own experience.

American Pie

“American Pie” has been in the news recently. This folksy song by the American artist Don McClean attracted enormous popularity when first released in 1971. It was a huge hit and, as McClean later said, “it made me rich.” It has never really gone away since, and it became a big news item last month.

Apparently McClean’s original unedited text, as set out in a sixteen page bundle of manuscript notes, has just been sold at auction in New York for £800,000

Not even my closest friends would claim that I have a deep interest in American popular culture. That’s true, and I suppose some might even agree with me that the words of the chorus hardly compare with Wordsworth or Shakespeare – e.g.

“Bye, bye Miss American Pie;

Drove the Chevy to the levee but the levee was dry.”

These are simply catchy rhyming words set to a catchy tune. In fact it’s the sort of tune you can’t get out of your head.

The verses, however, tell a deeper story. They speak with heartfelt regret about the passing of a time of innocence. When the text reads “Did you write the book of love; and do you have faith in God above?” it seems that McClean is looking back to a more wholesome way of living, perhaps characterised by gentle manners and grandma’s homely apple pie. Maybe he is recalling an age when you might drive up in an old pick-up truck with a red carnation in your lapel to be welcomed into the arms of a bright eyed country girl – his little Miss America.

But rock music changed all that. The apple pie innocence of the fifties had merged into the aggressive rock and roll years of the sixties – the time when John Lennon infamously claimed that the Beatles were more popular than Jesus.

The older, more homespun music, infused as it was by a flavour of faith and innocence, had come under threat. It was, according to McClean, “the day the music died.” Innocence had given way to turbulence and, by the early seventies, to an emerging cynicism. So McClean asks “Now do you believe in rock and roll? Can (this) music save your mortal soul?” He

seems disturbed by what is happening, and goes on to write "I saw Satan laughing with delight, the day the music died."

The mood of young America had changed. Older people – or so I suspect – felt alarmed by the erosion of their solid, traditional values "but not a word was spoken, the church bells were all broken."

According to some more recent commentators rock music concerts had become a competing religious option in popular culture. Some even suggested that such events were "occasions for an audience to participate in the ecstasy ritual of a new electronic paganism."

McClellan's song evidently recognised this as a growing and undesirable trend. In the last verse he writes, startlingly:

"And the three men I admired the most –
The Father, Son and the Holy Ghost –
They caught the last train for the coast
The day the music died....."

We are not immune to the consequences of all this; and we need to be in the business of developing new approaches to return the Father, Son and Holy Ghost to their rightful place in the hearts and minds of upcoming generations. I'm by no means sure how the Church can best approach this challenge but, right now, although I may not be sharing a bottle with "them good ole boys," I wouldn't say no to a slice of grandma's apple pie.

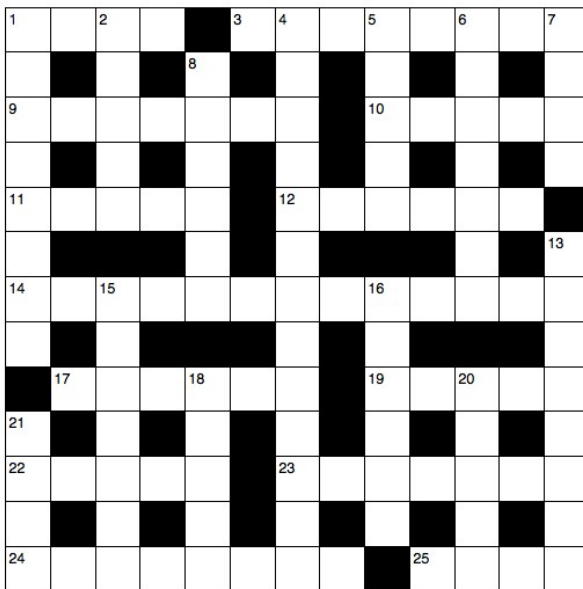

The Vicar of Baghdad

Have you heard of the Vicar of Baghdad? His name is Canon Andrew White and he was a special guest of Carryduff Elim just after Easter. He is a most engaging man and he spoke with a challenging honesty about life for himself and the people with whom he has



worked in Iraq. He currently spends time between Jordan and Jerusalem where he serves courageous Syrian Orthodox believers as their Abunna or Father. He told us of the needs expressed by the children and families with whom he works.

In a moving conversation Andrew told how the orphaned children asked for two things: education and their daddy back. As pastor, Andrew stepped in to be a daddy for many of the children and planned schools for the children in each place he is based.

Brad Turkington, a local man, was responsible for arranging for Mega Voice Bibles to be sent out to Iraq. These are solar powered devices which play the Bible in the local language so that people who cannot read or who don't have access to a written Bible can listen to God's Word. The excitement Canon White felt for his parishioners, who were given this opportunity to hear God's word, was infectious.

One of the most interesting aspects of his story was his family and faith origins: the family background of Pentecostal, Strict Baptist, and ultra conservative Presbyterian people makes his journey into Anglican ministry a most surprising one. He didn't tick many of the boxes to end up as Father Canon White! Yet, God in his mercy used this talented and intellectually skilled man to pastor God's people in Baghdad. If you get a chance to read more about him, tell others what you make of his story.

He stated that 1276 members of his congregation were killed in ten years, but that was before things got bad ten months ago!

During his talk, he repeatedly stated, "Many of the Christians in Jordan have fled Iraq with nothing, having lost everything. The one thing they haven't lost is their Jeshua, Jesus."

May God bless his continuing ministry.
