




John also won the longest drive prize. Sam Browne was nearest the pin at the nominated hole and Billy Clarke won the 2s Kitty.

Yes, we can

It's that time of year again - a potentially turbulent time in some parts of Belfast. Orange traditions are celebrated, orange blood gets stirred up, sometimes getting overheated; and in some quarters there can be an angry and opposite response. I wish it were otherwise – and it can be, for there is much that is good and wholesome across our society; and there is a search in many hearts for common ground and elements of shared understanding.

Whether we acknowledge it or not, we are all dependent upon each other; and we are called to engage in sincere efforts of reconciliation. This was a major theme in the Think Again initiative launched by Bishop Harold Millar at the start of the new millennium. What ever became of it? Perhaps at that time we felt unable to respond to the bishop's initiative. So now, some 15 years later, can we do better? Can we now feel more able to reach out in friendship to other traditions? The answer must be "yes we can."

The processes of reconciliation and peace building are integral to our pursuit of Christian faith. This is something that all of us on both sides of the divide must address humbly and sincerely. There is no place here for triumphalism or stern selfrighteousness. Sensitivity is of the essence.

Several biblical texts point us towards the best approach to the challenge. Consider, for example, the question (and answer) posed by the prophet Micah: "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and love mercy and to walk humbly with your God (Micah 6. v8)."

This message is clearly endorsed by Jesus in that famous passage which we know as The Beatitudes. He says "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God (Matthew 5. v9)." Then there is a substantial passage about reconciliation in Paul's second letter to the Corinthians (see 2 Corinthians5.v11 – 6.v2). At the heart of this passage he writes "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation." Of course this imperative extends beyond our relationship with people nurtured in the nationalist tradition. Northern Ireland is now home to many people from widely different ethnic backgrounds. It was my privilege to participate recently in an inter-cultural workshop in the library on the Ormeau Road. On that occasion there was a sense of welcome and shared experience that went well beyond mere tolerance. The event induced me to reflect on the extent to which we are all bound together.

All these people are part of us and need to feel a sense of welcome, and of empathy. That may seem like quite a challenge, but it is wonderful what can be achieved by a smile, a handshake or a cup of tea. People respond to empathy - to something that tells them they are connected.

I guess there are several active reconciling steps that we might all take either individually or collectively. We are called – even commanded – to engage in the healing of all the resentments between people of which we are a part. Concepts like collective willingness, shared involvement (even, perhaps, occasional shared acts of worship?) come to mind.

When will the Belfast Telegraph stop running headlines that contain the word "fury"? Perhaps only when there is an attitudinal change in which the summer's orange glow radiates the welcoming warmth of a glorious autumnal sunset. Can we muster the quiet courage to march along this road? I am bold enough to whisper "Yes we can."
