

James Boyd on the move

As indicated in the letter, James and Shirley Boyd have faced big changes since the last issue of the magazine in July. James has been appointed as Vicar of Willowfield, a new role, to work alongside Archdeacon David McClay in this major local parish.

This will be a big change for James who has been up to now the rector in a small town, Dromore Co Tyrone, and for their two children as they have to move to a whole new community as well, including attending a new school.

"Vicar" is a word used differently in separate situations: for Willowfield it is an appointment made for a fixed period of time which is more permanent than that of a curate, but still is answerable to the incumbent. The setting in Saintfield and Holywood where the incumbent is called Vicar is a different historical arrangement. We wish James well as he comes to live nearer to us and then comes to lead our mission in October.

South Sudan News

A letter from Jenny Smyth, CEO of CMSI. (Abridged)

Insecurity continues across the north of S. Sudan and around our partners in Maridi, Yambio and Ezo. People are still moving towards the towns where they feel safer at nights, fearing random attacks in the rural areas. In Ibba town a senior police lieutenant and his wife were killed. These incidents cause distrust of the army, build resentment and spark off revenge attacks. Ordinary people find it hard to know who can be trusted.

PLEASE PRAY for the peace negotiators that they will be given wisdom, boldness and patience"

During my recent visit to Uganda, I was able to meet up with Bishop Justin from Maridi, who is currently studying at Uganda Christian University in Mukono. Bishop Justin has decided to return to Maridi with his wife, Mama Joyce, until Christmas, postponing one module of his studies, so that he can be present in the diocese at this time of uncertainty.

PLEASE PRAY for his children who will remain at boarding school in Mukono.

Alex Amvuti (Archdeacon in Olo diocese) emailed Stephen:

Thank you for your prayers, we believe one day peace will come to our country south Sudan. It is our prayer that God may change the hearts of our politicians to bring everlasting peace so that development can kick off in our country. Greet all the Christians who are bearing with us in this situation where we are. Thanks.

PLEASE PRAY for the people of Olo diocese and their Bishop, Tandema Obed Andrew, as they work and pray for peace.



Spare a Thought for Nebuchadnezzar

Around fifty five miles south from Baghdad lie the ruins of the ancient city of Babylon. It was in this city that Nebuchadnezzar reigned as king for 43 years – from 605 to 562 BC – and it was here that many leading citizens of Jerusalem lived in exile for seventy years after the fall of their city to Nebuchadnezzar's army in 597 BC.

In 598 BC Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Jerusalem, and on 16 March 597 BC the city fell. King Jehoiachin, his court and several thousand of the people were deported (see 2 Kings 24 v.10-14). Why, we may wonder, should this have happened?

The Old Testament overflows with accounts of conflict and the rise and fall of nations. During the period from c.1900 BC (i.e. the time of Abraham) to 500 BC an international age developed with several larger nations competing for supremacy and control of trade routes between the Mediterranean lands and the Middle East. By the end of the seventh century the major protagonists in these conflicts were the Egyptians and the Babylonians.

At that time control over all the territory from the Persian Gulf to the Egyptian border was in Babylonian hands. Then came the inevitable clash between Egypt and Babylon.

In all of this the small kingdom of Judah had aligned itself politically and economically with Egypt. However, in 605 BC Nebuchadnezzar overcame the Egyptians and Judah became subject to Babylon. Subsequently the Judeans rebelled against the requirement to pay tribute to Nebuchadnezzar and their punishment for this was the siege of 598/7 BC and consequential deportation.

Then, ten years later (587 BC), Nebuchadnezzar returned to quell a further Judean revolt. His army ransacked Jerusalem, destroyed its Temple and took many more people into captivity. The ensuing exile lasted until 537 BC. It was a difficult and unhappy time for the Chosen People. The mood is caught by the psalmist who wrote "By the waters of Babylon we

sat and wept when we remembered Zion" (Psalm 137 v.1).

All of this was predicted by the prophet Jeremiah, who had repeatedly condemned the growing practice among the Chosen People of worshipping false gods. He went on to announce "Therefore the Lord Almighty says this: Because you have not listened to my words, I will summon all the peoples of the north and my servant Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon and I will bring them against this land and its inhabitants I will completely destroy them and make them an object of horror and scorn" (Jeremiah 25 v.8-9).

In this way, according to Jeremiah, Nebuchadnezzar became God's instrument to punish His people. We also know that Nebuchadnezzar transformed Babylon into a magnificent walled metropolis – and we can be sure that this required a vast amount of slave labour. He was, understandably, proud of his achievement; but he was also a man troubled by strange, disturbing dreams.

The prophet Daniel (one of the Judean exiles) became a member of Nebuchadnezzar's court and offered profound interpretations of these dreams. The king, acknowledging Daniel's insight, said "Surely your God is the God of gods and the Lord of kings" (Daniel 2 v.47). By this time the Judean exiles were increasingly turning back to the one true God, and this appeared to be accepted by Nebuchadnezzar. He had, indeed, become God's instrument of correction of the Chosen People BUT he had acted cruelly in the first place and God's judgment was upon him. Jeremiah had made this clear when he proclaimed "I will punish the king of Babylon and his nation declares the Lord, and will make it desolate for ever" (Jeremiah 25 v.12).

Although Nebuchadnezzar lived on into old age, his kingdom fell to the Persian army in 538 BC. Cyrus, king of Persia, released the exiles. They were free to return to Jerusalem and, by 520 BC, they had rebuilt the Temple. Undoubtedly this re-engagement with the one true God was influenced substantially by the captivity under Nebuchadnezzar. Nevertheless, the Persian conquest ended Babylonian domination of the Near East and the city of Babylon was destroyed in 482 BC.

Somehow I can't help feeling just a tad sorry for old Neb.




