

Dear Friends

"Look at the birds of the air...Consider the lilies of the field" were words of Jesus used to encourage all of us to learn from nature around us. In particular, Jesus wanted people to see how God had created a rich supply of resources to help his creatures survive and thrive. "They neither toil nor spin yet your heavenly Father feeds them".

Recently, we bought a new type of bird seed, new to us, which is very attractive to garden birds. From nowhere, so it seemed, a dozen or more little birds of five or six varieties started making regular visits to our garden, creating a cheerful flurry of noisy activity which helped transform our garden.

In the early hours our newly sensitised ears hear a panoply of songs emerging from the well fed wildlife of the rectory garden. It is inspiring stuff.

I have learnt a few lessons from watching them in action:

- Large birds too big for the feeding device hang about the edges to see what falls nearby: I learn that just hanging around a richly resourced community has spin offs from which I can benefit.
- In daylight hours the birds feel safe to feed, but at dusk they stay away: I learn that opportunities need to be taken before they pass.
- Birds come back to the same perch time and time again, having begun to digest the food they have just eaten: I learn that I can gain little from one experience of blessing and need repeated exposure to God's love.
- Pigeons, doves, blackbirds, goldfinches, chaffinches, blue-tits, robins, greenfinches, crows, magpies and even a heron have found a welcome in our garden since we started providing the specialised food: I learn that the smallest effort of generosity brings blessings to a huge variety of others.

Consider God's world this summer! Let me know what you learn!

Thoughts of a lone walker

Recently I have been walking along some country roads in our neighbourhood. I'm not fanatical about it; I just find it refreshing and hope that it's good for my general health. So it was that on a cool, dry Saturday afternoon in late April I set off along Killynure Road West. In no time at all I was passing Cheeky Cherubs nursery, and the thought of it made me smile. I smiled even more as I waved to a passing motorist who spontaneously returned my greeting.

A few horses in a roadside paddock took a look at me and one of them, coated and saddled, snorted a kindly welcome. Then, just round a bend, a young couple wearing jodhpurs managed to ignore my greeting. One up for the horses.

Turning into Killynure Road I caught sight of a male pheasant appearing over a hedge and landing at the roadside in front of me. It glanced up and raised its tail feathers. I think it was saying "Hi there, good to see you." At any rate it made me feel welcome.

I pressed on past a profusion of bright yellow whin bushes and found myself greeted by two friendly donkeys while, in an adjoining field, a family of rabbits grabbed my attention. Then my ear picked up a whirring sound as I was overtaken by a helmeted, hard pedalling bunch of MAMILs (middle aged men in lycra). They had no time to raise a hand in greeting, but I sensed their enjoyment of the open road and, just like the donkeys and the rabbits, they enhanced my day. So, too, did the panoramic view of the Dromara hills and, beyond them, the Mourne Mountains as I turned into Oughley Road.

I was still appreciating that view when a tractor pulling a trailer came along. Its driver responded to my raised hand with an exuberant wave. That seemed to set a tone since, within the next few minutes, another half dozen drivers and a man on a motorised lawnmower all made me feel welcome. There were some further delights in the form of herds of contented cattle and a flock of sheep with a great many healthy looking spring lambs among them. I suppressed an unseemly thought about mint sauce.

Turning into Drumalig Road I couldn't help but notice lots of roadside bluebells, a great abundance of oxeye daisies and some wayside primroses. All of this complemented the deep yellow of the whin bushes and, of course, the dandelions. I might not have noticed any of this had I simply been driving through the countryside. But, if you walk and take time to look around, there is much to see that can enrich your experience of life. That sentiment called to my mind an observation by the painter Vincent van Gogh that "the best way to know God is to love many things."

As I approached Rockmount Golf Club another betractored farmer gave me a wave. Then some quite classy cars passed by on their way in to the golf course. I raised my hand as

usual in greeting. None of them responded - perhaps a lone anoraked back packer is below the radar for Saturday afternoon golfers.

Never mind. Lots of other people, and quite a few animals, had cheered me and enriched the quality of my day. In any case I conjectured that not only they but also the selfabsorbed golfers and the jodhpurred young lovers all belonged within what is sometimes called the BOMFOG (brotherhood of man, Fatherhood of God – no I didn't make that up).

I saw much that was life enhancing on that walk. It also gave me an opportunity to think beyond the everyday and, thereby, appreciate that "if we walk in the light, as He does, we have fellowship with one another.....(1 John 1.v7)."

5th June Gran Fondo Cycle Race: Change of Service Times



For the third year a major international cycle race takes place in Northern Ireland in these months. Last year the Gran Fundo passed through Moneyreagh on one side of Carryduff, and through Middle Road in Killaney Parish, closing down parts of Moneyreagh, Ballygowan and Saintfield for most of the day in the process. This year the route has been amended to incorporate Comber Road and Killynure Road in Carryduff so both parishes are affected on a Sunday this year.

On Sunday 5th June, in Carryduff, the two morning services will merge: Holy Communion from 9.00 to 9.30, and the main Morning Service will move from 10.30 to 9.30 am, leaving time for the congregation to scatter before the Comber Road Crossing is closed by the PSNI at 10.45 am until 3.15 pm. We will ensure the service is over by 10.30 am and we will not have refreshments that day to enable people to leave promptly.

The traffic lights will be suspended and "gated access" will be provided to all cars to pass through the junction to and from Saintfield when no cycles are crossing from Church Road to Comber Road. Killynure Road will be closed too.

While there is no impact of service times in Killaney, we remind worshippers from Saintfield and Middle Road to ensure they are not "trapped" by the closed roads if they want to get to church that day.

Intercontinental Society, or ICS for short, is one of the missions we have supported in Carryduff over a number of years. Despite this, few people know much about it so, hopefully, the following will give you some helpful information.


The roots of ICS go back to the Evangelical Revival at the end of the 18th and early 19th centuries. Initially, it was a ministry to English-speaking people in the colonies but, by the mid-1800's, chaplaincies had been set up in Europe, and it was called the Colonial and Continental Church Society. In 1958 it became the Commonwealth and Continental Church Society, and in 1976 the name was changed to the Intercontinental Society as, by then, nearly all the Society's work was carried on outside the Commonwealth countries.


There re 23 chaplaincies in Europe, and other churches in the Diocese of Europe are associates of ICS. Seasonal chaplaincies on camp sites and in other tourist areas on the Continent operate from May until September. These provide an opportunity for people on holiday to go to a Sunday service. In the event of illness or some other crisis, the chaplain is there to give both practical and spiritual help, if needed.

The mission statement of ICS is 'Mission and Ministry in English for Everyone'.

Until last year our financial support helped the chaplaincy in Famagusta in Cyprus. Sadly, it had to close, so the Select Vestry has decided to redirect our giving to Izmir in Turkey, where an opportunity has arisen to work with the Diocese of Europe to develop ministry amongst the sizeable population of English speakers and to encourage the ongoing ministry of the ancient church of St John the Evangelist. Izmir is the biblical city of Smyrna, mentioned in the book of the Revelation. Today, it is an important, strategically placed city, and unlike other parts of Turkey, it has an openness to the Christian faith, which reflects a strong Christian heritage from the past. Given the numbers passing through and living in Izmir, ICS believes that this is a unique moment for the church to be a place of welcome, reaching out to those of a different faith or none at all. To that end it is hoped to appoint a Minister with a heart for the Gospel and a yearning to see people wishing to find out more about Jesus.

There is free literature in the Jeremy Taylor Chapel giving up-to-date news about ICS and prayer needs and requests. Please do take it and learn more about this Anglican mission society.
