### **Dear Friends**

"The ayes have it" . . .



... and so the tortuous and confusing exit from the European Union continues. For many the uncertainty of the future arrangements of our economy and relationship with the rest of this island are a cause for anxiety. For many, and judging by the national referendum they form a majority, this very uncertainty is a cause for excitement. How is it for you?

The spread of ages in our congregations is such that a significant number of us have always lived in the EEC/EU, while a large number are still not quite used to "life after 1975". The younger members of the congregation have no memory of border controls between ourselves and the Republic of Ireland, while for others coming home on the train from Dublin with a few pounds of butter in the bottom of the suitcase is still a fresh memory.

When we talk of the "status quo" we are speaking of the situation as it prevails at the time, and it is the status quo which will be changing as a result of the recent votes in Parliament. I, for one, am glad that parliament has a say in the outcome of the negotiations, but I am not entirely confident of their ability to change any agreement when it first debates it. We shall see.

What faces us in Northern Ireland is even more urgent than Brexit, for on 2nd March we have to elect local politicians to go back into Stormont to try to reform a government. The danger is that the status quo going into the election will be completely unchanged after it, and that the parties elected will continue to stand their various grounds despite the impasse that inevitably results.

The challenge facing us in a democratic society is the realisation that every one else has a democratic say, and the outcome of my vote is merely to sway the arguments in one direction or another, not to ensure that any one group's opinions are dominant. Quite the opposite in fact. In discussing temple and government taxes with his disciples, Jesus instructed Peter to pay them, even though he, Jesus, was decidedly against the policies they adopted. See Matthew 17.24-27 and Luke 19.45.

As the Tory government in London needs to take into account the large swathe of British people who did not want to leave the EU, so the governing parties here need to realise that we need to live together as a prosperous nation in this land and together with the rest of this island. The ayes may have it, but the noes need heard too.

Here is news from Bishop Justin, of Maridi Diocese, who has visited us in Carryduff and Killaney.

#### Dear Friends

I write to express our thanks for the contributions we received for the construction of pastors' houses. We are glad this has strengthened the faith of many people in the recent incidents.

Two weeks ago there was an incident in between Amaki and Kozi in which a vehicle was ambushed by unknown gunmen. The following day the Army came and started burning houses, looting and destroying properties from Amaki to Kozi covering a distance of 23 miles. in all this destruction, the only houses that survived are the pastors' houses that were constructed by the partnership contributions. I have attached here the pastor's house at Amaki, which is one of those that has survived the destruction.

The people of Amaki are now all displaced at Nambia which is 2kms north of Maridi town on Rumbek road. As we are landlocked, there is no where to go and we continue in prayers that God will bring these sufferings to an end. Within Maridi town, the situation is

peaceful, but all the people from the outskirts of Maridi town are now being forced to come into the town. This has brought much suffering in all aspects. We are preparing for our seventh synod to start on the 9th of March. Pray with us for its success. Greetings to all and thank you.0

#### Vote for me!

We have a huge privilege in our democratic state to place our votes at election time. Did you know that someone has already voted? **Voted for you?** 

The business of deciding whom we will trust, whom we will back at election time is a tricky one. Chances are we do not agree with everything any one candidate says, but, after long consideration, we give our single transferable vote to that one candidate, knowing that if they get elected our single vote is virtually used up and only a small percentage goes on to influence any other candidate's prospects.

Imagine if we were "standing" and got the vote of someone who disagreed with us, who reckoned our destiny was disastrous, and could see that we had broken our own principles! Someone who, nevertheless, believed in us, and gave us a chance to serve! Who gave us their vote even though we did not deserve it.

Such is the reality of God's involvement in our lives: he chooses to give us the opportunity to be part of his kingdom, and he invests not merely a vote for us, but backs that up with the self giving of Christ on the Cross. He determined to make you or me his number one candidate, and he chose to demonstrate his love for us and all that we could become (with his help) by the Cross.

Many candidates will receive votes this year, and we wish them well; but one vote is guaranteed, the vote of Jesus for YOU; will you accept his vote (the analogy is shaky here: but stay with me) and relying on his support go on to serve him by serving the world in his name?

### **Carryduff Easter Vestry Notice**



### Please Come in

I don't know what you might have thought, but I felt relieved that the evening of the Grammy Awards is now behind us. I'm not even vaguely interested in the relative merits of Adele or Beyonce and simply saw the event as a long night of noisy extravagance and self-indulgence. It had very little to do with music, at least in the sense that I understand it, but quite a lot to do with empty glitz and glamour. It was all a bit too worldly – too Babylonian - and inconsequential for my taste. There are much greater riches elsewhere.

By way of contrast I recall, from an earlier age, hearing an old Victorian ballad on the radio when I was still a small child. That was longer ago than I now feel prepared to reveal. The only things still lodged clearly in my memory are that the singer had a clear, soft baritone voice and that the opening words of his song were:

"Come in to the garden Maude, I am here at the gate alone."

It could be that the reason I still recollect those words is that Maude was my mother's name. I am unsure if Maude accepted the invitation (although I hope she did) but I have no doubt that it was genuine and sincere. I am also sure that the song wouldn't have stood a chance at the Grammy Awards. It was much too good for that.

Come in to the garden. That, in poetic terms, is the invitation offered to each one of us to enter The Kingdom. We are not compelled; but we are warmly invited. We can choose, if we wish, to leave the worldly and the inconsequential behind at the garden gate and embrace the welcoming reassurance of The Kingdom.

The prophet Isaiah also had a poetic take on this crunch issue. At a time when a great many of the "chosen people" were enduring captivity in the worldly city of Babylon with all its idol gods of wood and stone he set before them a vision of the one true God – He who fashioned and made the earth. He said:

"He did not create it to be empty, But formed it to be inhabited."

Then later, in the same passage, he imagines the voice of God saying:

"Turn to me and be saved, all you ends of the earth For I am God, and there is no other." (Isaiah 45 v.18 and 22).

Are we ready to do this and, even more pointedly, are we willing and able to connect with other (younger?) people in our noisy, self-seeking, Babylonian age of "unfaith"? Could we

persuade them? Would they come in to the garden with us? I imagine that very few of us feel either capable or confident about this. Our sense of freedom to do what we believe is right is violated by the toxic external pressures of the material world.

The story is taken up in the Prayer of Humble Access from the order of service for Holy Communion. It speaks for us when it states that "we are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under thy table."

The way of faith – the path into the garden – is always there. Maybe we need a bit more courage to take that path, even though we know within ourselves that it is the road from darkness to light. Like the singer imploring Maude to accept his invitation, the Son of God invites each one of us to take that path. He implores us to come in to the garden.
