

SOUTH SUDAN: The Country

South Sudan, the youngest and least developed country in Africa, gained independence from Sudan after the continent's longest running civil war. Since its independence just 6 years ago the country has struggled to control rebel militia groups. This conflict between government and opposition forces led to a humanitarian crisis at the end of 2013. Millions of people were displaced, thousands killed and food supply became insecure. In 2015 a peace agreement was reached but then last year fighting again broke out between the groups. South Sudan has been plunged back into conflict.

The Children

Children in South Sudan have experienced trauma. For some their whole lives have been affected by conflict and violence. Families have been torn apart and thousands of children have been displaced trying to escape the violence. Girls have been sexually abused and tortured. Many watched while their families were killed and their houses burned. Children in South Sudan have had to flee for their lives. It is hard for us to imagine the trauma that children have been through.



Pray

Please pray for this work...

1. For the children of South Sudan. Pray that God would protect them and that they would know His love and care in the midst of conflict.

2. That the Church would be equipped by the Bible Society in South Sudan to work with children who have experienced trauma. Pray that Christians in this place would continue to be shining lights for God.

3. For the staff of the Bible Society in South Sudan. They are faithfully carrying out God's work in very difficult circumstances, through conflict and famine - pray that they will know God's presence and provision.

A Bible-A-Month Gift of £5 would help equip churches throughout South Sudan, enabling them to be a place of healing and refuge to so many lost children. BAMG is a way of supporting 12 projects around the world each year. Ask Stephen about it.

Trauma Healing Project

The Church in South Sudan wants to reach out to these children who have experienced trauma, so they're working with the Bible Society to run Bible-based trauma healing programmes. The Bible Society hopes that by training church leaders in Bible-based trauma healing and counselling, the churches will become centres of healing for the children.

Bible-based Trauma Healing is an amazing programme that allows children to work through their problems in an engaging and

appropriate way. Counselling sessions are put in place for trained staff and volunteers, who get alongside these children and help them to recover from their trauma - physically, socially, emotionally and spiritually. Children learn about Jesus and are helped to discover how God loves them and cares for them.

It is so important that children learn to deal with how they are feeling. Their experiences and emotions shape who they are and who they will become. Helping children who have experienced trauma to come to a place of forgiveness, acceptance and love is key to them moving on with their lives and finding peace.

Each child who attends these sessions receives a Bible. The comforting, healing Word of God gives children, who have lived in darkness, a hope and joy.

Ayesha's Story

Ayesha (not her real name) was only ten years old when the war reached her town along the eastern side of the River Nile. Everyone ran for their lives and, in the confusion, Ayesha lost track of her parents. She didn't know what to do. She ran to the river to try and cross it, thinking that that's what her mother would do. Ayesha was standing at the water's edge crying when another woman from the town found her. The woman took care of Ayesha and together with her own children they walked for a week to reach Juba.

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Ayesha became a member of this new family. Efforts were made to find her real family but today there is still no word of them.

One day, close to where they were staying, a trauma healing programme was set up by the Bible Society in South Sudan. Ayesha went along to the first workshop and that day she accepted Christ as her Saviour. She said, "Although I am an orphan, God gave me a mother and father. Now trauma healing of the Bible Society has opened my eyes to know Jesus. I feel free and the heavy burden in my heart is gone."

There is a deep and telling significance in a comment that Jesus once made to a group of Pharisees. They had asked him when the kingdom of God would come. Jesus' penetrating reply contained the observation ".....the kingdom of God is within you" (Luke 17 v.21). I imagine that might have stopped them in their tracks. It was surely unexpected. How, I wonder, can we best interpret and understand what this might mean?

I think I can grasp what lies at the root of it. The crunch issue is really to do with personal lifestyle. In two famous quotations, both from Matthew's version of the gospel story, we get some helpful insights. The words I have in mind are: "Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6 v.33) and ".....whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 18 v.4).

In our age we seem to have a great deal of trouble with humility. Why is it so difficult? Is it something to do with peer pressure? Could it be that we don't want to admit that we are not completely on top of things? It must surely be the case that one of the greatest obstacles to belief and faith in God is personal pride. I am only too well aware of all this. I feel greatly challenged by the discipline of humility.

It could be argued that deep within all of us is a resistance to any notion that we have a need for guidance, for protection, for forgiveness. These things are at the very heart of the kingdom; and accepting them brings us to its doors. Humility is a telling factor in all this and, without humility, I think that the kingdom could remain beyond our reach.

It seems to me that the kingdom would be beyond us if our lifestyle was unduly selfcentred or built around the acquisition of personal wealth or influence. This can all too readily rub shoulders with the easy availability of a host of temptations and subtle social pressures. But these things are not the way of the kingdom. On the contrary the kingdom is characterised not by the display of power or authority, nor for that matter by mere sentimental religiosity, but by something much more approachable and welcoming.

In his letter to the Galatians, Paul puts it very clearly. He writes:"....the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control" (Galatians 5 v.22-23).

These, in seems to me, are the values of the kingdom. To live by such values is a matter of personal choice or lifestyle. Is this not what was in the mind of Jesus when he said to the Pharisees that "the kingdom of God is within you?"

I can think of no convincing reason to reject these values. To accept them is to be content within yourself and to receive the keys of the kingdom. Does it not seem, therefore, that we do not need to await the coming of the kingdom at some time in the future? If we hold on to and live by its values then the kingdom is alive and well in the here and now. It is within you. Denis Carson

Summer Bible Reading 2017

Many people enjoy the challenge of a season of Bible Reading, such as we had in Lent, where we read the whole of the gospel of John. Why not, in this year of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, re read the letter of Paul to the Romans, together with your fellow church members?

While it may only take a few moments to read each daily section, you can add to your appreciation of it by asking yourself some questions: how about asking one or two of the questions included with the readings below:

1 July Romans 1:1–7

How does Paul describe the people to whom he is writing (in v7)? Ask God to help you know that about yourself.

Sunday 2 July Romans 1:8–15 3 July Romans 1:16–17 4 July Romans 1:18–23 5 July Romans 1:24–32

Paul's experience of people had left him feeling that God had given up on them! Do you feel that way sometimes, as you hear the news and read your own heart?

6 July Romans 2:1–11 7 July Romans 2:12–15 8 July Romans 2:16–21

Paul warns those who judge others that they are, in effect, judging themselves. Is there hypocrisy in you life? Ask God to help you change it by his power. (1:16)

Sunday 9 July Romans 2:22–29 10 July Romans 3:1–8 11 July Romans 3:9–13 12 July Romans 3:14–20 13 July Romans 3:21–31

Verse 23 sums up what has been said in the last few chapters. Do you agree with Paul? How should this affect you the next time you confess your sins - in church or in private prayer?

14 July Romans 4:1–5 15 July Romans 4:6–12

The key verse here (4:3) is repeated several times in the bible. Paul wants us to remember that righteousness is a gift given to us, not a standard we reach. How will that help you pray today, for God's help in being good?

Sunday 16 July Romans 4:13–17 17 July Romans 4:18–25 18 July Romans 5:1–4 19 July Romans 5:5–11 20 July Romans 5:12–21

You may be finding these verses difficult and demanding, but they tell us that God's grace (gift) through Christ is much more powerful than our sin. Re read 5:1 and turn it into a prayer of thanks.

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21 July Romans 6:1–5
22 July Romans 6:6–14
Sunday 23 July Romans 6:15–23
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6:23 is another key verse. What is the difference between wages and a gift? How should we come to the God who gives as opposed to the God who pays?

> 24 July Romans 7:1–6 25 July Romans 7:7–11 26 July Romans 7:12–17 27 July Romans 7:18–25

Does verse 21 describe your best efforts sometimes? How does Paul's admission that he is a "wretched man"encourage you to know that he too had such moments?

28 July Romans 8:1–11 29 July Romans 8:12–17 Sunday 30 July Romans 8:18–22 31 July Romans 8:23–30 1 August Romans 8:31–39

Romans 8 is often read at funerals: What comfort is there for you in verse 18 and verses 38-39? Thank God for this.

2 August Romans 9:1–3 3 August Romans 9:4–9 4 August Romans 9:10–14 5 August Romans 9:15–22

Abraham and Sarah were key figures in Jewish history and self-identity. Why do you think Paul spends so much of his letter writing about these people? Where do we read about them?

Sunday 6 August Romans 9:23–29 7 August Romans 9:30–10:4 8 August Romans 10:5–11 9 August Romans 10:12–21

"The Gentiles" are a group which includes the Romans and also us. In the next verses Paul says we have been grafted in to the old root of Israel. Does that make us more or less members of the fruit bearing tree, which is God's kingdom?

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10 August Romans 11:1–4
11 August Romans 11:5–10
12 August Romans 11:11–16
Sunday 13 August Romans 11:17–24
14 August Romans 11:25–36
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Another key passage (Romans 12) comes next. As you read these verses, explore some guidelines - which you currently are ignoring - which you need to remind yourself to follow daily.

- 15 August Romans 12:1–8 16 August Romans 12:9–13
- 17 August Romans 12:14–21

Ask God to help you put into practice the lessons you have seen as particularly relevant to you in chapter 12.

- 18 August Romans 13:1–7 19 August Romans 13:8–14 Sunday 20 August Romans 14:1–5 21 August Romans 14:6–12
 - 22 August Romans 14:13–23

Sometimes people - who appear to be strong - have a very inflexible attitude to issues and to others, which suggests that they are weak. Others - who seem a little weak - are able to adapt better when their lives take an unexpected direction. Ask God to help you be strong in the face of changes you may face this week, and for compassion towards those around you, who appear to be weak.


Cyril Gardiner


