

We can all be blinded by self interest and self delusion into imagining such episodes will only remain the stuff of history. May God preserve us from such a shallow understanding of the persistence of evil.

Our magazine cover this month features a photograph of a new installation at the Ulster Museum beside Botanic Gardens Belfast.

It portrays a river of poppies flowing over the side of the Museum, perhaps intended to represent the blood which flowed in historic battles of our time. I am indebted to Brian Thompson and Darren Kidd for the use of the photograph.

While such installations are beautiful and moving, and while they place in the public square the violence of the past, we do well to recognise the significance of the poppy. I like to think that each becomes a symbol of a life laid down in pursuit of a just peace.



We invite the young people of the parish to be present at the Remembrance Day Service. This is to ensure that they, like their parents and grandparents, are aware of the huge sacrifice that had to be made when the evils of expansionist ideology went unchecked in the past.

If, like me, you want to honour the survivors of war in a practical way, then please do two things. First, buy a poppy, or if you own a 'metal' one, then make a fresh donation to the appeal. Second, make a silent stand against the men and women of violence in our world, and pray for them, be they part of a small localised force, or part of a nation posing a real threat to international peace.

Two Minutes Silence

In the month when we think about those who have given their lives in war, the **two minutes silence** is a familiar act of remembrance. We can use the silence to reflect on those who have suffered in war or on what it means to work for a peaceful world. Or do we end up thinking about lunch or panic that we haven't switched our phone off?

Victor Frankl, a victim of Auschwitz, suggested that the most intolerable of all human conditions is not imprisonment or hunger, but lack of meaning. The two minutes silence enables us to connect with Jesus' message, which offers true meaning to our lives and world. He spoke of giving ourselves in love for each other and the world, 'Love your enemies and pray for those that persecute you' (Matthew 5:44). He also demonstrated such love in sacrificing His own life, 'Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends' (John 15:13). In observing the silence, let's use it to reflect on this sacrificial love, as we remember all those who have experienced pain and conflict.

Of course, we should be serious about silence and stillness in the whole of our lives, not just for two minutes at an act of Remembrance. In busy lives where so much is clamouring for our attention, silence enables us to reassess our priorities and rediscover true meaning in our lives. Jesus made a habit of withdrawing to experience silence. He did this before choosing his disciples, after He heard of John's beheading, after feeding the 5000, after healing a man with leprosy, at the Transfiguration and to prepare for His death. 'The seeking out of solitary places was a regular practice for Jesus. So it should be for us.' (Richard Foster).

Bible Transformation at K & Cd

The bible is a gift from God to us, comprising the inspired word of God as communicated to us through forty different writers speaking over a thousand years. At Word Alive we spend an hour reading, talking, sometimes praying and generally exploring God's word to us.

If you haven't joined us yet then you and we are both missing out: you miss out on the opportunity to discover fresh truths from God's wonderful book, and we miss the chance to hear what you sense God may be saying to you too.

Let's make a change, a change for the good, and make our bible study programme a source of blessing for more people, yourself included.

Never again

The soft flat landscape of ripening fields of maize, interspersed with clusters of tall spindly pines and silver birch is deceptively calm and quiet. This is southern Poland and we are on our way by coach from Krakow to the small medieval town of Oswiecim.

It would be fair to suppose that few people outside Poland would ever have heard of Oswiecim. However, it lies in that part of Poland that was annexed by Nazi Germany during the Second World War. The name of the town was germanised by the invading Nazi army. They called it Auschwitz.

The extensive Auschwitz-Birkenau site, just outside the town, became Nazi Germany's largest and most lethal concentration camp. Everyone should get to know about this place and its terrifying history. It is for that reason that in 1979 it was named by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site.

Our guide – a quietly spoken young man – opened our eyes and ears to some horrific details. He told us, for example, that the first mass exterminations occurred in early September 1941 when 900 inmates were gassed in a basement block. This was hard to take in – but then we were told that subsequent mass murders took place in the crematorium where more than 700 could be killed at once.

The victims, mostly European Jews or people of Jewish heritage, were transported to the camp by rail from all over German-occupied Europe. Many were herded into the gas chambers and murdered on arrival. Others, considered fit for manual labour, were dressed in striped uniforms and set to work in brutal conditions. They were, in practice, worked to death. Some were then gassed. Many others died on account of starvation, forced labour, individual execution or medical experiments. An estimated 1.3 million people were sent to the camp of whom at least 1.1 million died.

We were shown the crematorium and given access to several of the sombre dark brick compounds where the prisoners lived and worked in wretched conditions. Here it was in shocked and absolute silence that we saw hundreds of prisoner identity photographs, and huge glass fronted display cabinets filled with the spectacles, the shoes and, most shocking of all, the head hair of countless victims. Apparently the Nazis intended to use the masses of head hair to stuff mattresses. It was all harrowing beyond belief.

The camp was eventually liberated - by Soviet troops – on 27 January 1945 and this date is now commemorated as International Holocaust Remembrance Day.

On the coach journey back to Krakow there was almost absolute silence. I was in Poland as a member of Belfast Philharmonic Choir. We had been singing sacred music in the cathedrals in Opole and Katowice. Our programme had included a modern setting of the medieval Latin poem Stabat Mater about the mother of Jesus standing at the foot of the

cross, weeping and knowing within herself that He had been tortured and put to death for the sins of the world.

No-one felt like singing on the coach – not even something as devotional as the Stabat Mater. It was a welcome relief to simply look out at the fields of maize and the clusters of trees.

My own response to what we had just seen was an internalised silent prayerfulness and a fervent hope that such an immense cruelty would never happen again.

Down & Dromore Synod's Reformation Year.

Bishop Harold Miller spoke in his presidential address of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. He suggested that, 500 years on, the church is going through a time of great change. We were encouraged to hold on to the faithfulness of God and his sovereignty as we face change.

There was some debate about the nature of the Diocesan Accounts! Our auditors had qualified their report with several statements. Synod was undecided about whether to adopt the accounts. A separate vote was required to pass the accounts, the first time I recall such a decision being made in this way. After a simple but satisfying lunch, Synod resumed with what is known as a "conversation about the work of God". Those taking part shared various experiences in their local churches, and in their own lives and the diocese, leaving those presemt encouraged about God's power in our midst.

At the heart of the event was a communion service at which Bishop Justin, of Maridi diocese, shared the gospel.


Bring Back The Blacksmiths!

During the conversation on the work of God at Synod the last speaker shared some thoughts about blacksmiths. Glynis, from Willowfield shared a verse from the Book of Samuel where the people of Israel lamented that they had no blacksmiths! In effect, the occupying Philistines blocked Israel's ability to build weapons for war, or develop tools for trade and industry. As long as the nation had to go, cap in hand, to the "enemy" for their blacksmiths, they would never be free. Glynis invited us to pray that God would raise up people who were prepared to go close to the "fire of God" as they engaged in building the kingdom. I think she meant that as long as the church is dependent on finance from those outside the church, as long as the church relies on others to influence society and to fight battles with their weapons, as long as we have no blacksmiths, we are ill prepared for the spiritual battle.





In Memory: Geoff Burke

Geoff Burke was born in Cheshire. He grew up in Beverley, in Yorkshire. When he began work he headed to the Royal Air Force. He was assigned to various locations, reaching RAF Bishopscourt, in 1966. He married Helen and they lived there until moving to Carryduff in 1975. As a capable TV repairman and work shop manager, he took early retirement in 1991. He was involved in the life of the parish through the badminton club, and was a good friend to members of the congregation and community in Carryduff. He and Helen moved to Saintfield a few years ago.

His death, after two and half years of increasing disability, has left us all saddened and sorrowful; the family wished to thank all who helped him and Helen through the last years.

Some thoughts on remembering


Remember me as the poppies fall On the shoulders, heads, and at the feet Of young and old, All gathered for the Festival.
