I hope you make him, Jesus, welcome in your lives this Christmas.

- maintain an adequate supply of communion wine and church candles
- ensure cleaning materials are available and maintained

Joy to the World

There is a great sense of thrill and uplift in the Christmas hymn "Joy to the World." It seems to capture the true spirit of Christmas and completely clarify why we should be joyful – "The Lord is come."

It is not about tinsel or office parties or over indulgence. This is a hymn that bursts into allembracing Christian love built on reliable, lasting values. It is an unselfish love to be shared with everyone, even with those – in fact especially those – who in the past we might have regarded with unease or hostility.

That thought brings to mind the contact I had in the early 1990s with a woman from Co. Offaly called Mary O'Farrell. Mary was born in 1923 in Tullamore, about 50 miles west of Dublin. She entered religious life in her late teens as a Daughter of Charity and became known as Sister Genevieve. It was under that name that, in 1963, she was appointed principal of St. Louise's Girls Secondary School on the Falls Road and led that school with amazing courage throughout all The Troubles until her retirement in 1988 – by which time St. Louse's, at her insistence, had become a Comprehensive School.

My contact with Sister Genevieve arose out of her membership of the Standing Advisory Commission on Human Rights of which, at the time, I was Secretary. My most particular recollections include her invitations to join the Sisters for lunch and to speak to the senior girls at St. Louise's. But my most abiding memory is of her recounting the day when she was handed a note before morning assembly. It read "Would you please pray for a first year's daddy who was shot dead last night."

Sister Genevieve did her utmost to make her school as normal an environment as possible throughout all the trouble and violence that was just beyond the school gates. Her achievements were astonishing and more than worthy of the OBE awarded to her in 1978. She ruled her school rigorously and with a blend of truth and grace – qualities that capture the very essence of godliness. If we all had the same courage and qualities of inspired leadership I would think that much of the worst of the N I Troubles could have been avoided.

That brings me back to our great Christmas hymn. In order for the "Joy to the World" to be real we need to seriously acknowledge the lasting validity of those telling words from the third verse- "He rules the world with truth and grace......." This is the very essence of godliness and the bedrock of the real joy to the world at Christmas. That would be a good thought to carry forward into a new year.

This year we managed to fill up 104 boxes. They were delivered to the local collection centre in Connsbrook Avenue from where, on 18 November, they were loaded on to a lorry to be taken to a group of destitute children in Ukraine in time for Christmas.





The bag of hand knitted children's clothes is now on its way to an orphanage in Romania.


Remembrance Day Carryduff 2017


