As I write this, I see a prison van stopping at the lights outside the rectory. My heart sinks when I imagine how those on remand feel as they go to and from Downpatrick Courthouse. The regret, the anger, the frustration or the faint hope which accompanies them to and from the dock!

The miracle of Easter is that an utterly innocent Man, Jesus the Messiah, was charged in court and found guilty, while we, the guilty ones, go free! See https://goo.gl/Jc39KV

Enter, if you can, the joy of Easter by sitting in the dock for a while, hearing the court reporter pronounce all the self-centred and self-glorifying acts that have marked your life. And then, in a complete turnaround, the dock is opened, and a glorious Substitute takes your place, accepts the judgement of the court, and you are set free.

- * Would you stay in the dock refusing to accept the Substitute's offer?
- * Could you believe your good fortune in being offered such a release?
- * Would you then keep quiet about your good news?

The formerly guilty ones, now set free by the grace of God, are invited to celebrate the good news of their release this Easter.

And those aware of a need to be set free; you are warmly invited to take the place offered to you. The prison van is empty. The judgement has been given. The rest of your life is His for you to share the good news.

He reported that there were about fifty active subscribers. Donations range from a few pounds a year, to significant amounts. Average giving for envelope holders is just over £300:00. He thanked all who donated to church funds.

The Select Vestry had met eight times in the year and, as well as approving accounts, decided on the right ways to maintain and improve the church, hall, and graveyard. The Quinquennial report of some years ago drew attention to the need to repaint the metal window frames and other paintwork. This matter is now in hand. The Church Hall was repainted during the year. Following recent stormy weather, the sign beside the road is being remade using stronger materials and will be put back in place shortly.

Following the presentation of the accounts, which had been distributed the week before, the Independent Examiner, Mr Francis Buchanan was proposed as a suitable person to review accounts next year.

Marking Easter

Easter Day marks the day when Jesus of Nazareth, who had been crucified by Roman authorities, was raised from the dead. It is the chief festival of the Christian church and yet...

When I was a child Easter Day was a big day in church. The congregation was larger than usual, the people attending wore brighter clothes. and the ladies wore special Easter Bonnets. I did not live in a posh part of Belfast, yet the atmosphere was markedly different as we gathered.

Today's world of greater wealth and lesser nominal faith sees a dip in attendance as often as not. Many people can afford to take time away from home and so Easter Day becomes just another day in the holiday, not the reason for the holiday.

In order to compensate, churches now try to make Palm Sunday more of an occasion and certainly at KandCd we try to make that happen. It can be difficult to squeeze Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter Day messages into one service, but we don't want occasional worshippers to miss out on the good news of Easter!

Wherever you are at Easter, make a point of visiting a worshipping community and identifying with them and us by celebrating the Resurrection with God's people... and you can even put on a special outfit if you want!



God in the Arts

The art we see in churches, on banners, carvings and windows is often full of monograms. It may be IHS: the Latin words for Jesus, Saviour of Mankind; or INRI:



Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews above the figure of our Lord on the cross. And this month, the Chi-Rho: the first two letters of Christ in Greek with the X superimposed on the P. Placed inside a wreath it is a symbol of the Resurrection.

This month's art shows the Chi-Rho filling a page from the Book of Kells - that amazing creation of the scribes and artists in the monastery of Iona in the 8th century. This Gospel book was taken to Kells in Ireland to escape invaders ravaging the island in a later century, and is now in Trinity College, Dublin. The Chi-Rho begins the Latin text of Matthew chapter 1, verse 18: 'Christi autem generatio.' The letter X dominates the page and P lies beneath with I rising through it. The opening letters of the name of our Saviour have inspired the artist to create intricate patterns that weave in and out. We see wheels within wheels, like Ezekiel's chariot, spirals and discs. The page seems alive with colour and tracery threading its way through and around the letters.

When we were younger we might have enjoyed doodling - perhaps embellishing the letters of our own name or of someone special with decorations, and so making that name precious. Here in this page of the Book of Kells is embellishment of a greater order, but with the same aim. For the monastic artist, the Chi-Rho announces the name of Christ as the name above all other names: the only name under heaven given for our health and salvation.



Susan Creber reports on a visit to NI by

Vera Zhuravleva

I first met Vera when Stephen and I were invited to a friend's 60th birthday party. It was a different party from the norm as Vera was the main attraction. Our host had been one of the first helpers from Northern Ireland to go out to Russia to help Vera run her Scripture Union summer camp. Vera is from St Petersburg, Russia and is a Christian working for Scripture Union. In fact she is THE Scripture Union presence in St Petersburg (an area of over 10 million people). I found her talk fascinating, and since then we at St Ignatius' have been supporting her work through our Missions envelopes.

I was very pleased that a number of people from our church joined other churches at Saintfield Road Presbyterian on Sunday evening, 11th March to hear Vera speak. Vera was again inspirational, telling us of her family background and life, her thirst for the word of God and her enthusiasm for spreading His Word to children and teenagers through youth clubs and camps. At first, under the relaxed freedom of Glasnost, Vera was a volunteer working in schools spreading His Word to young people but in the last number of years these avenues of evangelism have had to be stopped as the laws against gatherings in Russia have been tightened. Now Vera runs help groups for single women and their children, and clubs for parents and their children where she spreads God's Word. Vera also works alongside a local Orthodox priest to help encourage children into church to hear God's Word.

The Scripture Union also have two small houses in a small village outside St Petersburg, which she uses for camps throughout the year. These houses are very basic as they have no running water or electricity but the families and children love going to stay in them. There they have reached out into the community, encouraging the local children to join in their groups and helping the elderly by collecting wood for the very harsh winters.

I am sure everyone who heard Vera speak, could not have failed to be infected by her enthusiasm for SU and will join me in praying for

- Vera and her helpers
- For the young people and families in their group
- For funding to repair their prayer room roof.

The collection last week raised over £1200 from the gathered congregations at the event, and I hope this will go some way to helping Vera in her mission in the St Petersburg area. Please keep Vera in your thoughts and prayers. Susan Creber

Hey Jude

You might remember Jude. He was a big hit for The Beatles in the sixties. The song about him begins with the words:

> "Hey Jude, don't make it bad Take a sad song and make it better....."

Was Jude someone that The Beatles knew in Liverpool? You could argue that Jude is an unusual name – even an obscure one. As far as we know it is an Anglicised form of Judas. What does that make you think of?

A few generations before The Beatles burst onto the scene there was an influential English novelist called Thomas Hardy. You may have heard of the novels "The Woodlanders" or – perhaps his most famous one – "Far From the Madding Crowd"; but what do any of us know of his last completed novel, "Jude the Obscure?"

The story portrays Jude as a young man of very humble birth – in effect, a country peasant – who yearns to be a scholar. Although he taught himself classical Greek and Latin the circumstances of his everyday existence were difficult and he experienced more than his share of disappointment. By the social standards of his day he was, indeed, obscure.

Yet there is another Jude of whom we know very little, and whom we might even think of as obscure. He is the accredited writer of the Letter of Jude, the penultimate book in the New Testament. It's very short – only one chapter, running to 25 verses.

Let's think for a moment about who this man was. He was not Judas Iscariot. His letter begins with the words "Jude, a servant of Jesus Christ and a brother of James." In general, scholars agree that he was the brother – or perhaps a half-brother – of James. That also makes him the younger brother of Jesus, and this view accords with references to him in the gospel narratives (see Matthew 13 v.55 and Mark 6 v.3).


Although not much is known about Jude himself we can assume that he must have been associated in some way with the ministry of Jesus and may well have been a prominent figure in the early Church in Jerusalem.

So, what did he have to say?

In essence his short letter (very similar in scope to part of the second Letter of Peter) was intended to be circulated and read in all the church communities in his time. He exhorts them to hold firmly to the words spoken by the apostles and expresses an impassioned warning against false teachers and against slanderous speech. The crux of his letter is his call to all believers to persevere; to live in the light of the second coming of Christ.

There is nothing obscure about this. What's more, it is entirely relevant – even crucially so – in our sadly distracted age. He exhorts us in urgent language to persevere, to "keep yourselves in God's love as you wait for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ to bring you to eternal life (verse 21)."

There is surely no better way in which to "take a sad song and make it better." I hope youagree.page 13Denis Carson


