



Can I admit something? I am neither a politically active type, nor an agitator, but I think these people have a point. Please give me a moment and imagine with me . .

The conductor has the full Mozart Score before her on her lectern. The assembled orchestra are bringing their classical instruments out of their cases. The audience, comprised of first-time attendees and several season ticket holders, take their seats and study the programme.

The concert draws near.

The conductor takes a look at her musical score and quietly slips **out** two main sections which she has had trouble directing. Also, she slips in some short compositions of her own.

The wind section was surprised when two of the original members of the orchestra produced unfamiliar brass instruments which looked the worse for wear. They were now tuning them to a note, somewhere sharp of the Concert A the others were seeking.

The audience was thrilled to see the running order had been adapted to suit the local sports teams who were playing an end of season match that same evening, and the interval would be extended to allow a broadcast in the hall of extra time if it occurred.

A number of the orchestra, the new audience members and season ticket holders stood up in protest, and, one by one began to walk away. You could hear them muttering:

This is not Mozart. This is not Classical Music, This is not a Real Orchestra.

When you select the portions of the bible that you obey. . . when you insert different teaching to suit your taste. . . when you abandon the gifts God has given the church and bring poorer replacements for them.

This is not Jesus. This is not Christianity. This is not the Church.

I suspect this is what GAFCON is concerned about. What do you think?


hear more of their plans or to see the detailed poster of events.

What is Truth

It's the ultimate question. In everyday life we are bombarded with statements purporting to be the truth. Yet no sooner have we heard them than we are presented with quite different messages, from

different sources, advising that what we have been told, or what had been put out by certain news media. is "fake news."

In the secular world of power and influence truth – the real truth - is often a notable casualty. It becomes, simply, what certain high profile people want us to believe. In the political sphere, for example, influential figures with widely differing agendas offer noticeably contrasting views on significant and often disturbing world events. Each claims to be true. The phrase "fake news" has become a commonplace, and it is increasingly obvious that what is true for one camp is clearly not true for another. Truth in the everyday world, it would seem, has parted company with reality and is determined by context and social location rather than by objective, verifiable fact. It appears to depend on the agenda of whoever is expressing it.

So, what is real truth? What should we make of the modern fascination with the idea of something simply being "true for you?" It's an idea that I instinctively dislike.

Has anyone ever said to you (as someone once said to me) something like "Christianity may be true for you but it's not true for me?" This is a prime example of a careless modern trend known as relativism. Yet, when you think about it, the atheistic "not true for me" notion is indefensible – in short, it is only an expression of an opinion – and it is an opinion which is unsupported by fact; in other words an opinion that is objectively wrong.

In more stark terms what I am suggesting is that many atheists do not believe in the message or the godliness of Christ because they simply don't want to believe in it. They don't want God to exist. God is inconvenient for them. God gets in the way of pride, self-interest and personal sinfulness. The "not for me" notion is simply a cop out; a denial of the truth.

When brought before Pilate by a rampant, self-interested mob, Jesus said to him that "...... everyone on the side of truth listens to me (John 18 v.37)."Then Pilate, perhaps rather cynically, asked Him the ultimate question: "What is truth?" Although there is no indication that Jesus responded, it is evident from the written record of His ministry that Jesus is, within Himself, the objective standard of truth. There was never any agenda of personal interest, nor any suggestion of relativism.

The message and the godliness of Jesus are real and incontestable. We know instinctively and within ourselves that Jesus is "the truth." We know that what He said, what He did and what He claimed to be are all trustworthy and verifiable.

I go further. If Jesus had not been raised, then Christianity would not have emerged. The resurrection is not just "true for you," it is objectively true.

Christian Funeral

19 April William Morris Moore, Hollygate Park, Carryduff.

"Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord
They are blessed indeed for they rest from their labours."

The Rev Canon William Morris Moore, Billy as his friends knew him, was educated at Porter's Primary school and Belfast Inst before teaching science in Edenderry Secondary School following study at Queen's and Stranmillis. He grew up in the parish of St Mary Magdalene on Donegall Pass, Belfast, and is survived by his brother Raymond.

He was a member of the 1st Belfast Boys Brigade, and while attending an Officers' Training Event in England, he felt the call of God to be ordained.

Following training at the Divinity Hostel in Dublin, Billy was made a deacon in 1961 and began three years' service as curate in St Michael's Belfast. After six happy years doing a second curacy in All Saints', Belfast, he was made rector of St Michael's, and for ten demanding years through the heart of the troubles, he identified closely with his people and served them without reserve.

Billy's preaching was direct and unapologetic: people need to be saved by the grace of God, and they needed to hear that message. It was a message which brought him respect in a time when it was difficult to be so outspoken in church circles. How it has changed in the decades since!

It was while in All Saints, that Billy met and married Marlene Hutchman, and together they had three children Michael, Judith, and Naomi.

For the next 23 years, Billy served God among the people of St Jude's Parish in Ballynafeigh. While there he suffered a heart attack and later, over the next 30 years a series of strokes. He continued his faithful ministry of pastoral care and preaching despite this and retired to live in Carryduff. He and Marlene belonged, for the first part of their retirement, to Saintfield Parish. They then joined us here at Carryduff. The faithfulness and loyalty of his wife and the extended family meant that Billy was able to continue to play a semi-active role in this parish where he lived and to remain a prayerful supporter of God's work around the world.

His funeral service took place in St. Ignatius', Carryduff on Thursday 19th April and included a warm tribute from a fellow curate of All Saints' days, Canon John Dinnen. Bishop Harold conducted a short act of reception on the evening before the service as he was unable to attend the funeral. Canon Walter Laverty brought the service in church to a close on the bishop's behalf.

The church was packed to overflowing with well-wishers and friends and, following the service, excellent refreshments were served by parishioners. Rev William Jeffery conducted the burial service at St. Andrew's, Killaney afterwards.







Data Protection Forms: PLEASE RETURN BY HAND/POST to RECTORY

If your inbox or letter box is anything like mine, you have discovered a Europe wide programme called GDPR. It is a set of regulations designed to help protect the data which public bodies hold on us.

In the parishes, we welcome this development and also are challenged by it.

While designed to keep multinational organisations in check, it is the small local charity or business which will face the steepest learning curve. The process involves identifying the data held, ensuring some sort of permission or consent is available to use and store it, having a facility to report the data held on any individual upon appropriate request, having the facility to delete or correct current data held, and ensuring that access to the data is limited to persons who have been given the right to use it.

What does that mean for KandCd?

Well, we carry several unconnected sources of data, including the list we use for magazine distribution, lists for FWO envelopes and Gift Aid Forms, and names and addresses on clergy technology. Organisations in the parish also hold some names and addresses and phone numbers relating to the safety of the children in their care or the ability to communicate with parents and other carers. There are other older address lists in written form.

In the next few weeks, we hope to gather written or digital consents from each person on the databases.

We will do this in several ways and would value your positive response if and when you are asked for written consent. According to the training we have received it seems that most of our usage of data does not need written or digital consent. However, as we seek to respect both the letter and the spirit of these regulations we are planning to obtain formal consent for all but the most trivial of cases in the first instance and from all in due course.

Who will do this?

Hopefully, you will play the most critical part and give permission for us to hold and use limited amounts of data for the promotion of the charitable and communication objects of the church. The sooner you do this the better, as we will not have to adapt our working processes unduly. If you decline to give permission by not replying - or by replying stating so - then we will need to follow guidelines as to the next steps. We have a fiscal duty to keep some data, e.g. Details of donors and donations for which Gift Aid has been claimed, but even these can be dispensed with after the statutory period has elapsed.

The security of your data is important to us and we welcome your interest in the ongoing process. This article has been prepared carefully but is not intended to be a complete account of this complex new regulation. Visit www.ico.org.uk for more information: see GDPR.


