Each gentleman present was given an illustrated bookmark, and each lady present a card. Sets of cards for sale were also








Getting Married?

Generation Y still hope to walk down the aisle

Millennials still value marriage with almost three quarters of those who are unmarried (72%) intending to tie the knot, according to new research by the Church of England.

While official figures recently showed a decline in the marriage rate, a study commissioned by the C of E's Life Events team suggests that 18-35-year-olds still dream of having their big day. Among those who were single, almost 6 in 10 (59%) said that they would like to marry at some point. Just over 1 in 10 (12%) of respondents said they were engaged and planning their upcoming nuptials.

Significantly, the survey also suggests that millennials attach a special importance to church weddings, with more young people preferring to marry in a church or chapel (47%) than a register office/town hall (34%).

Those who would consider a church wedding were asked why it appealed to them from a list of options. Almost a third said that it felt like a 'proper' wedding (31%). Marrying before God or receiving a blessing, was also in the top 10 (the seventh most chosen option). They were also strongly drawn to 'traditional/conventional' wedding venues (72%).

The research shows that for those considering marriage, almost one in six (17%) said that faith or religion had influenced their wedding ideas.



World Cup Fever

The former Liverpool Manager Bill Shankly famously said, 'Some people believe football is a matter of life and death, I am very disappointed with that attitude. I can assure you it is much, much more important than that!'

This month sees the start of the World Cup in Russia; a truly global event watched by billions on television. Yet this competition illustrates some key points about the Christian life. As Paul writes: 'But one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and straining towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 3:13b,14).

A prize to be won: The dream of every player in the competition is to be able to hold up the World Cup themselves. For us the prize is the eternal life, God's gift of relationship with him for now and eternity through Jesus. But there's an important difference between football and the Christian faith. To win the World Cup you have to be good enough, while Christ's love for

us is undeserved and is not dependent on how well we've done.

Training to be undertaken: If a team is going to win the World Cup, they have to train hard beforehand. Our training, as Christians, starts the moment we accept the gift of God's life. On a daily basis, we train ourselves to say no to the wrong things in our lives. As we build up our godly muscles we are better able to choose to do what is right in God's eyes. To enable us to do all this we need to engage in the spiritual disciplines of prayer, studying the Bible and being part of a church and small group. How is your training going?

The children can be collected from Fantastic before 12.30pm.



Archbishop Justin Badi speaks:

The installation took place on 22 April. Justin Badi Arama is the fifth Archbishop and Primate of the Episcopal Church of South Sudan.

Following his consecration the new Archbishop announced a decadelong focus on the Lord's Prayer as a tool for making and teaching disciples. He wants Anglicans in South Sudan "to do the Lord's Prayer and to live the Lord's Prayer in their daily lives." The new Archbishop listed objectives that he wanted to fulfil, including the unity of the Church. "In our country and our communities, it is clear that the devil has seized the hearts and minds of our people with a spirit of tribalism, politics, division, hate and violence," he said, adding that he would make "every effort to teach and unite to see themselves as brothers and sisters in one family of God." Other objectives include the construction and improvement of church buildings, mission and evangelism, peace building and the provision of social services. "We thought having our own country would improve our situation," he said. "But our own politicians have made everything worse for their own citizens. Life for ordinary citizens is so hard and miserable. Our people continue to suffer in refugee camps, internally displaced camps and UN protection camps. Therefore, we are appealing to the opposition to put an end to this meaningless war and enable their citizens to experience what is God's peace."



Changing the world

Something needs to change. Our world, in its present unsettled state, is in a bit of a mess right now. Political instability at home and abroad, civil wars in the Middle East and ever increasing levels of poverty, malnutrition and disease across much of Africa and South East Asia are all part of everyday news bulletins. It's easy to get bored with all this, but we have a Christian calling to do what we can to help - to do something to change the world.

In all this, our fascination with triviality gets seriously in the way. For example, there was a programme on Channel Five a few weeks ago called "Britain's Favourite Abba Songs." In their time Abba were both very good and undeniably popular. I liked them - and they certainly made a big impact in the pop music world. They satisfied the crowd.

I watched with genuine interest. But that interest flagged significantly when the story line went just a bit over the top. The commentator, referring to "The Winner Takes it All", made the bizarre statement that this song "changed the world." Really?

I wouldn't doubt for a moment that it was a good and very popular song with a clear social impact. Besides, it was well presented, and it clearly satisfied the crowd. However, this poses the question of the status and moral influence of popular entertainment. Surely being the most popular hit song of its time is not the same thing as changing the world.

I could be wrong, but I am inclined to think that the world of pop music, and of popular entertainment in general, takes itself much too seriously. Does the light of heaven shine through this music - or, indeed, any music?

Recently I came across the text of a BBC interview from July 1993 with the marvellously gifted classical guitarist Julian Bream. Here was a thoughtful man of prodigious talent who did not take himself too seriously and who used his gifts thoughtfully. He and his music had something important to say. He was not about simply satisfying the crowd. Instead, he was offering something of real depth and, somehow, managing to do so in the common tongue. If you have never heard him you have missed something very special.

His outlook in that interview was conducive to a frame of mind that does, indeed, let the light of heaven shine through music. If only we, as the listening public, could latch on to the real substance of what Bream had to say we would be significantly enriched.

Bream went on to express very perceptive views on the influence in our age of the electric guitar. While noting the lack of variety in its expressive range (I wholly agree) he said that "if you listen to the sound, I mean REALLY listen to it, it's a coarse and nasty instrument. But in its context it fits the bill." Isn't that just another way of saying that it offers almost nothing of real depth - but that it satisfies the crowd?

We really ought to try to reach beyond this all pervasive influence on our present day culture; and consider how we might contribute more positively to changing the world. Abba's enormously popular "The Winner Takes it All" does not change the world; it merely satisfies the crowd.


All of this calls to mind the outlook of Pilate at the dreadful mock trial of Jesus. Whatever his innermost thoughts may have been he simply pandered to the crowd. In his account of the gospel story Mark expresses it very clearly. The text reads "Wanting to satisfy the crowd Pilate released Barabbas to them. He had Jesus flogged, and handed him over to be crucified (Mark 15 v.15)."

Pilate's decision represents a challenge to our relatively indifferent age. No item of pop music, however enthusiastically received, is likely to go far beyond satisfying the crowd; but it is our privileged duty to look beyond that towards something more genuinely uplifting.

In every sense Jesus rose well above Pilate and the brutal crowd. By all means enjoy what Abba - or Julian Bream - have given us; but let's not just be a satisfied crowd. We have both a duty and an opportunity to lift high the cross and to do our bit to change the world.
