The trivial cost of adapting to the newcomer is nothing compared to the joy of sharing the good news.




Mrs J was also thrilled with the very generous House of Frazer gift card she received at Carryduff.

## The Right Risk?

Is a risk-taker a hero or a fool? For many, it simply depends upon whether the risk paid-off. Steven Spielberg's film The Post could perhaps cause us to reconsider that assumption.

Set in the time of Richard Nixon's presidency of the USA, the story begins with the military analyst, Daniel Ellsberg, so disgusted by the government's deception about the under-resourcing of soldiers in the Vietnam war that he



copies top-secret documents - the Pentagon Papers. Eventually these pass to the editor of the Washington Post, Ben Bradlee (Tom Hanks), who asks the paper's owner, Kay Graham (Meryl Streep), to approve their publication, despite a restraining order that could get her indicted for contempt of court. In nail-biting scenes, as the print room waits, she must decide whether to take the risk of fighting for freedom of the press.

Kay has much to lose; not only for herself but also for all women, because many doubt a woman can run a newspaper. If she takes the risk and it pays off she could be a hero, but if it doesn't then she would be the fool who damaged the advancement of women in the workplace. The fundamental question is whether a decision to take a risk should be calculated on the odds of success, or on a point of principle.



Spielberg builds the tension brilliantly. And with a device reminiscent of the red-coated girl in his award-winning Schindler's List, this film has its own little girl, Bradlee's daughter, starting her life as an entrepreneur. Perhaps, the value of risk-taking should not be assessed by looking back at consequences, but by looking forward into the type of world we can build together if we remain true

# MISSION Intercontinental Church Society

Marlene Moore, our ICS rep, reports: From time to time we receive updates from the mission agencies we support and the following stories from ICS give us cause to praise God and to keep us praying for them.

On Trinity Sunday four adults from St John's, Izmir in Turkey, were baptised by full immersion. After morning prayer a group of twenty five travelled to Ephesus to a retreat centre where there is a baptismal pool, and the four were baptised during a service of Holy Communion. To prepare for their baptism the candidates had attended the full Alpha course, which had lasted sixteen weeks. In February of next year they will be confirmed by the Bishop.

On the Saturday before Pentecost, the chaplain of St. Peter's, Chantilly in the north of France, baptised four young people by full immersion. They and eleven others were confirmed by the Bishop the next day, Pentecost Sunday. For them and the congregation it was a joyous and memorable weekend. Some in the congregation were surprised that the Anglican Church practises total immersion. The chaplain explained that at the Reformation the Anglican Reformers attempted to recover the practices and theology of the early church, and that some very ancient churches have a font big enough for immersion baptism.

In addition to permanent chaplaincies, seasonal chaplaincies in Switzerland, Italy and on the island of Corfu make provision for Sunday worship, and offer help, when needed, for English-speaking tourists and others. This is mission, which reaches out to people who are on holiday and who may be more open to the Gospel in a relaxed setting.

For a number of years Billy served as a seasonal chaplain in several locations, including Belgium and France; our accommodation was a caravan on the campsite where we lived amongst the people we sought to befriend. Some came to the Sunday service out of curiosity, while for others it was part of their normal routine. Chatting with our 'neighbours' over a meal or at the poolside provided opportunities to talk about faith in a nonthreatening way. Some shared their problems and we became firm friends with one couple who, on their return home, went back to and got involved in their local church. Those experiences were enriching for us and, hopefully, gave a little encouragement to others on their journey of faith.

Jesus said, "I will build my church and the gates of hell will not prevail against it."

Perhaps we could set aside some time during the summer months to pray for those involved in mission, especially our friends in ICS.

## **Checkpoint Martin**

I didn't count the steps on the way up to the dome gallery but, on the way down to the souvenir stand in the crypt, the count stood at 289. This was in an outstanding high-renaissance baroque building in the centre of Berlin. It is known locally as Berliner Dom or, as we would say, Berlin Cathedral.

The Dom began life in the 15th. Century as a collegiate church and has, since then, undergone several phases of architectural renovation until as recently as 1905. The building was damaged during the Second World War and remained closed throughout the years of the German Democratic Republic. It was reopened after restoration in 1993.

Apart from the panoramic view across the city from the dome gallery and the spectacular organ (with 7200 pipes), the Dom is best known as the largest Protestant church in Germany. Thus, sitting in the nave and looking upwards, you are immediately struck by the statues of four great 16th. Century reformers - Martin Luther and his most notable early colleagues, Philipp Melanchthon, Ulrich Zwingli and John Calvin.

Then, in an alcove on the way up to the dome there are two large friezes depicting Luther's famous statement of belief in 1521 at a conference known as the Diet of Worms (pronounced Vorms). Luther had famously challenged the practice of offering forgiveness of sins in exchange for the payment of subscriptions (known as indulgences) to the Church.

There is, of course, no basis in any biblical text for such a possibility. The Church was simply wrong and Luther insisted that it is only through faith in God - and faith alone - that we may be forgiven. This was Luther's famous protest, based on Paul's forthright letter to the Romans, which states "......a righteousness that is by faith from first to last, just as it is written: The righteous will live by faith (Romans 1 v.17).

"Here I stand" Luther is reputed to have said - and it is our privilege to acknowledge the clarity and rightness of his stance. The conference at Worms dismissed him and he had to face much further opposition before glimpses of a more firmly biblically based church came to prominence.


Luther stood almost alone before the Emperor Charles and the German Princes (representing the authority of Rome) at Worms. Yet he was resolute and there is no doubt that the depth of his solitude gave strength to the language of his writing and his arguments. All this can be deduced from the collections of his works and the many biographies available in the crypt of the Dom - but only if you can understand the German language.

It is worth noting, nevertheless, that Luther's translation of the scriptures from the original Greek and Aramaic sources into everyday German had an influence well beyond what he could have imagined.

My brief time in Berlin (with my two sons) also included a visit to Checkpoint Charlie. This was the point during the cold war where Allied and Soviet tanks faced each other across the divided city. The hostility was deep and real; fortunately Checkpoint Charlie is now only a tourist attraction.

However, it conjured up in my mind the hostility towards Luther at Worms. This, too, was a hostile Checkpoint.
