

Dear Friends

"Can I help you with anything?"

Like many of you we enjoyed a lovely summer holiday during the last few months. We were delighted to get home again, of course, but the idyllic NI weather of May through to July was excellent preparation for the intense heat we experienced in the USA.

On our first day the weather was a rather hot 103 degrees, 39 in Celsius. But it dipped to 93 most days thereafter (a mere 34 degrees). It even got to a chilly 78 some nights! Brrrr.

Enough of that! One of the persisting memories of the trip was the ever present greetings we received at every shop or restaurant we entered. A cheery smile from a nearby waiter or shop assistant meant we knew we were *noticed and valued* as potential customers. I found it threatening at times, especially when they followed up the inquiry with a surreptitious attack from the flank with the question **"Can I help you with anything?"**

In the "olden days", pre 1970, every shop had a shopkeeper and he or she was entirely responsible for giving you what you requested: think "The Two Ronnies" and "The Four Candles" sketch. Gradually the service model was replaced and self-service became the norm. Except when you were too long at a particular rail and the assistants suspected you were planning to *help yourself*.

When we come to church to worship God, we are often looking for more than a service, even though we are not sure what it is. Perhaps it is a cheery welcome? Maybe a warm handshake? Possibly someone to "talk to me"? That is where the shop assistant's question needs an answer. We arrived at one exciting and lively church venue and were offered a service sheet: but just **one between the two of us**. Must be expecting a big crowd, I thought. They were. But they hadn't made enough service sheets and the print was difficult to read in the dimly lit auditorium, especially when sharing! It was a wonderful document, with about 20 pages, the size of many of our monthly magazines!

So I decided two things: I am going to use a bit more paper to produce weekly news sheets, and I am going to let the text get a little bit larger. The purpose is to help people engage with the worship programme, especially the more prayerful times.


I hope you come, get a copy for yourself as well as one for each of those with you, and that you can read it easily and worship freely. Tell me what you think!

Ordination Prayers

Mothers' Union

The Mothers' Union begins again on **Thursday 6th September at 8pm** in the Mitchell Room. This month we have a representative of **Women's Aid j**oining us. The talk is entitled "When Home is where the Hurt is ".

Women's Aid is the lead voluntary organisation in Northern Ireland addressing domestic and sexual violence and providing services for women and children.

This promises to be an eye opening and thought provoking evening. Everyone is most welcome to join us.

On 22nd August two of our members travelled to Dublin to see the '**Souls of our Shoes' Exhibition in Christ Church Cathedral.**

The shoes on display represented the kinds of abuse endured by victims. Some of the shoes had been used by the abuser to cause injury and inflict pain.

Detective Sergeant Laura Sweeney from An Garda Siochana was the guest speaker. She said that abuse is everywhere, affecting men, women and children, and there are no stereotype abusers. Abuse can take many forms, including domestic violence, financial control, coercive and controlling behaviour.

Citing statistics, Sergeant Sweeney said that on average there are 35 incidents before a woman will report abuse. She will show resilience and be resourceful to cover it up. Globally, around one in three women and one in six men will be affected by abuse at some time in their lifetime. Abuse is always wrong and never acceptable, and it is never the victim's fault.

South Sudan: Pray with Hope.

Like our own experience here of never ending conflict between tribal groups, the people of South Sudan have had a life time of conflict. Yet their suffering has been considerably greater than many of us have ever experienced. Back from the 70's they lived with bombings by government planes, wanton destruction of schools and property, squads of gun carrying fighters and the breakdown of society structures; starvation and exile were faced by many.

The Civil war continued for decades: When I was at Queen's a student called Francis Paul from Sudan recalled how the conflict had , even then, being going on for some 17 years.

When we pray for our brothers and sisters in South Sudan today we must recognise the great sense of pessimism which must threaten to diminish their faith. Despair must be overcome with hope. Maybe as we pray - each day or week or month - for them we can remember the words from Hebrews 10

35 Do not, therefore, abandon that confidence of yours; it brings a great reward. ³⁶ For you need endurance, so that when you have done the will of God, you may receive what was promised. ³⁷ For yet "in a very little while,

the one who is coming will come and will not delay;

³⁸ but my righteous one will live by faith.

My soul takes no pleasure in anyone who shrinks back."

³⁹ But we are not among those who shrink back and so are lost, but among those who have faith and so are saved.

9-11 Recalled

I had just purchased a new overhead projector for the parish, and was excited to be using the new "slides" which could be used via a newfangled dot matrix colour printer to project images onto a big screen.

The plan was to display some holiday snaps from a recent holiday in Portugal to the "Evergreens", a group of older people who met on the 2nd Tuesday of each month in our Church Hall.

There was a warm response as the six or seven photographs we could afford to create and display were watched by the fifteen people there.

As the "show" drew to a close my colleague called in to say there was "something happening" in America; it was "all over the TV."

And soon the 11th of September 2001, "Nine Eleven", entered our vocabulary.

I left the ladies home and swiftly took my post beside the emerging pictures.

Visiting the walkway at the top of one of the buildings, the World Trade Centre North, had been the highlight of a trip I had made in a previous year. Yet here was that magnificent edifice penetrated by a fully laden passenger aircraft, now burning, on its way to destruction . . .

I couldn't tear myself away. As the hours passed we all saw the optimism

and joy of New York fade under huge clouds of dust and debris.

The months that followed featured daily news bulletins containing exactly the same images and the growing sense of loss that it had caused.

It seems like a long time ago. Do you recall what you were doing that day?

Forward seventeen years and this summer I had the privilege of returning to the site, seeing the moving memorials placed there by a grieving nation, and admiring the huge new World Trade Centre built nearby. (featured on front cover)

Common phrases of today, like the Department of Homeland Security, or the Axis of Evil were created in the years that followed.

I found the whole memorial experience unsettling.

In January 1999, there had been no sense of danger to me as I went up 104 floors of the North Tower, yet disaster happened a few years later. This time I wanted to be away from the place as soon as possible, just in case...

At a distance of both time and space, I feel safe again. Yet the security of existence, of yours and mine, is never guaranteed in this life. My faith gives me confidence for the future, but not future ease or comfort or even earthly life: confidence in God.

Remember 9-11. Trust in God alone.


'Whatever YOU do':



Famous yet Unknown

It sometimes strikes me that we have a tendency to be critical, even resentful or suspicious, of cultures and traditions which are unfamiliar to us. That was a thought that came to me from reading Jesus' observation: "Do not judge, or you too will be judged. For in the same way as you judge others, you will be judged (Matthew 7 v 1-2)."

This, in turn, prompted a further thought that the two main traditions which inhabit our island need to develop opportunities to become more approachable to each other; and to allow ourselves to be enriched by each other's cultural heritage.

To cut to the chase, I wonder how many people of Irish Celtic heritage are familiar with the poetry of Robbie Burns or the musical legacy of Hamilton Harty (who was at one time the organist at Hillsborough parish church). Similarly - and this is an issue close to my heart - I would venture the thought that not many people of Ulster Scots or any other Protestant background are familiar with the performing practice and priceless legacy of two great Irish musicians who died earlier this year.

I am thinking here of the quietly unassuming traditional fiddle player Tommy Peoples and the equally modest yet outstanding uilleann piper Liam O'Flynn. Without doubt both these artists were world famous, yet I would venture to suggest that to many people in this neck of the woods they are relatively unknown. It has been my good fortune to have heard both of them in their prime.

Tommy Peoples came from St. Johnston in east Donegal. You simply had to hear him playing *The Quiet Glen* or the pair of hornpipes - *The Mouse in the Attic* and *The Fat Cat* (all of which he wrote himself) to realise that this music was in his bones; he was playing his life. Without question he was a master of his craft and an inspiration to countless traditional musicians worldwide.Strange as it may seem, I heard Liam O'Flynn (from Co. Kildare) playing the uilleann pipes in Armagh Cathedral (C of I) in a concert which also featured the cathedral organ - two great sets of pipes. That was one of those happy occasions during the Armagh Pipers Festival some years ago when the audience was quite broadly based. Isn't it good that the C of I could play host to such an event?

O'Flynn treated his audience to some traditional reels, jigs and hornpipes including, for example, *Spellan the Fiddler, O'Farrell's Welcome to Limerick*

and *The Rocks of Bawn*. These treasures may not be familiar to everyone, but it is widely acknowledged that O'Flynn was Ireland's foremost exponent of the uilleann pipes (he also played the tin whistle) and brought this music to a worldwide audience. He was, in Seamus Heaney's words "a master at ease in his art."

It would be no exaggeration to claim that these two marvellous musicians were to Irish traditional music what the late Aretha Franklin was to American blues and black gospel music. I may not have taken so much to the tradition which she championed, but have no hesitation in recognising the splendour of her voice and the inspirational impact she made on the world stage.

I began with the suggestion that we do not always take readily to cultures which are unfamiliar to us. However, there is a wealth of unknown treasure to be found within many of them. Let's try to be more welcoming to such things. In so doing, we might find ourselves greatly enriched; we might even come to love some cultures and the personalities who present them to us. Would that not be in keeping with the commandment of Jesus "that you love one another, as I have loved you (John 15 v.12)?"

In the now and beyond

Ten years after the release of the original, *Mamma Mial Here We Go Again* wonderfully takes us back to the same beautiful island and glorious sunshine. But perhaps it is the difference between the two films that is particularly powerful. The first was primarily themed around discovering one's individual identity and freedom, whereas the sequel explores the enduring nature of relationships.

This is symbolised physically in the hotel which Sophie has renovated to fulfil the vision of her mother, Donna, who has recently died. We see in flash-back the young Donna singing 'I Have a Dream' as she wanders through the original ruins, intercut with shots of Sophie's completed rooms.



It is symbolised relationally by the arrival of Sophie's estranged grandmother, who has not forgotten her family, and who herself discovers a long-lost love at the hotel.

But it is a scene in the beautiful hill-top church which most powerfully takes this theme to a whole new level – physically, relationally, and spiritually. Even Mark Kermode, the hardened film-critic says of it *'I wasn't just crying, I was convulsing with tears.'* Here, the film reworks the lyrics of ABBA's little-known 'My Love, My Life' to change it from a song about ending relationships to one about their enduring nature: *'I can see It all so clearly, all I love so dearly... I know I don't possess you, with all my heart God bless you ... As one are we, in the now and beyond'*.



In our culture, recently dominated by a focus on individuality and freedom, perhaps reflecting on this film, and its changes to the song's lyrics, might cause us to think again about the enduring nature of relationships. And, perhaps we may then heed some of the other reworked words: *'I see a road ahead*.

I never thought I would dare to tread'.
