

#### **Dear Friends**

We will enter this month as Europeans by law, status and, for some, inclination. How will we end it?

We live in most uncertain times, and are entering a collective no-man's-land without confidence as to how this will work out.

- In our own province the two leading political parties have formed a united front in their intention not to proceed to work together or govern the country together - at any level - without the other party backing down on matters of principle.
- The 27 remaining nations of the European Union are unwilling to tweak the hard won agreement in order to placate the sense of national betrayal that the current backstop of the agreement has raised in the hearts of people.
- The threatened economic effects of leaving the European Union were illconsidered when we as a nation voted for it, and are foreboding like a darkening sky on the other side of 29 March.
- Multiple promises have been made regarding our ability as citizens of the UK to travel and enjoy other European countries, but some contradictions make us uncertain as to the holidays we hope to take this year.

The get-out route, that many of us have considered and taken, is to take up the advantage of our birth in this island to obtain Irish passports.

What would have been unimaginable for some loyal and essentially British fellow citizens has now become the most secure way to guarantee some level of European rights of access to the countries we have increasingly seen as good neighbours, since the European project was imagined after the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War.

There are times when the long-held sense of British-ness we have claimed is less tightly grasped as our nation has become dominated by the English nationalism we have seen in the Referendum's advocates.

May God have mercy on us all as we venture forward to a new status, the structure of a new legal framework, and the same confused inclination to be British Irish Europeans - in whichever order you choose!

# March will bring a very busy month for the Mothers' Union.


Weekends, in Ireland, the UK, Germany, Thailand, Austria, Turkey and Cannada.

#### **Observing Lent?**

Seriously?

Instead of self denial this year, I want us all to consider self dedication, doing something new. What will you choose?

Perhaps your way of examining your life in Lent will be to take up a new health discipline. Nowadays, the challenge is to walk so many steps a day, or to drink so much water every day. Whatever it is you choose to do, do it well. As you do so, thank God for the walk and the water you enjoy. Or maybe your inner reflection is a new intellectual pattern. You might turn your few pages of reading each day into a dedicated chapter each day! And if that reading includes Bible reading then even better.

Last year we did a Lent Study reading book in the parishes. We are going to challenge you to do this again in 2019. The book is called "The Beauty of the Cross", and it will help you remember each day that Lent prepares us for Easter.

Or, maybe your inward resolve will concern people. Relationships can become shallow or strained if we do not invest time in them. This March and April you could make a phone call to an old friend every other day, or pause to chat with a person you pass by on the street most days. Your neighbour can get lonely too, so a word with them will bring them blessing. All of this takes time, so, while I have called this self dedication, there is a fair bit of self denial in there too!

Jesus said, "Deny yourself and take up your cross and follow me." Not just denial, but following Jesus day by day. Let us do it during this season of Lent.

### **TearFund Sunday**

Many people in parishes around the country love the work of TearFund. Since the 1960's [or is it 70's] this valuable organisation has gathered funds from churches in this part of the world to be used to enable churches overseas to help the people in need around them. We are used to local charities dictating how aid can be used overseas. TearFund utilises the local expertise in churches overseas to determine the most effective way to show the love of Christ to the people of their locality. Sometimes this involves a church project to church families. Often it involves supporting a cross-cultural local initiative to help a community in need to survive.

On Sunday 24 March a member from the local **TearFund family** will speak to us in Carryduff and Killaney, to share how we can help from here. As the youngsters from the Sunday school and J Club will be present, this will, hopefully, inspire a new generation to think of new ways of supporting people in need around the world.

#### **Torch Trust**

Do we meet and worship in sight loss friendly buildings? Do we take into account the needs of those who do not have 20:20 vision when we gather for worship? Have we ever considered the needs of disciples of Christ who cannot see too well?

Leonard Campbell, who heads The Torch Trust locally, is visiting our churches at the end of March to share the work of his organisation. It takes place on Mothering Sunday, and a key part of his presentation will be given by a guest whom he is bringing with him, Margaret Davidson, herself a mother.

#### **Lenten Services**

I t is a great opportunity for those in the Bowling Club, the Word Alive group, the Choir and many others to come together during Lent for a midweek service.



We encourage you to try it this year, especially if you have not done so before. Just over half an hour of hymns, and prayers, a bible reading and a reflection takes place at 7:30 pm each Wednesday, from 6th March to just before Holy Week. 

#### St Patrick's Day at Down Cathedral

The diocese is partnering with Open Doors UK & Ireland for the annual St Patrick's Day Festival on Monday 18 March.

The theme is "Counting the Cost – Standing with the Persecuted Church" and we will have a unique opportunity to hear from an Egyptian Christian known as Michael Jones and the President of Open Doors, Eddie Lyle.

"Michael" is a Cairo-based businessman and evangelical Christian who has addressed the UK Parliament. He will speak at the Festival Service in Down Cathedral (11.45 am) and Eddie will speak at the service of Holy Communion at Saul (9.15 am). The Prayer Pilgrimage from Saul to Downpatrick will also focus on the persecuted church and will be led by Chris Philips from Open Doors.

Christians in Egypt make up 10% of the population but around 50% of all the Christians in the Middle East. They face daily discrimination and intimidation. Christians are overlooked for jobs or promotion, university students are given bad grades or failed, schoolchildren are made to sit at the back of the class, shop owners are boycotted and hospital patients are not given proper treatment. Yet they refuse to give up their faith.

Please join us on Monday 18th March in standing with them and the persecuted church worldwide.

### That Intractable Problem

We have just emerged from an unusually mild winter and now, as we approach the season of Lent and launch into Spring, the temperature is rising. This would be a good time to spare a thought for Christian Aid.

It's not just the changing season I have in mind. There is also the growing clamour of informed opinion about climate change. There is no denying the scale of this problem. It is not merely a local thing; temperatures are rising world wide – blistering heat, within the past year, in Japan, California, The Philippines, Kenya, Sierra Leone and Bangladesh – although we tend not to hear very much about it.

Perhaps we don't feel able to take it seriously; but it is real, long term and intractable. Who cares? Somehow there are influential political and industrial figures with itchy Twitter fingers who simply dismiss any facts that do not fit with their world view (I wonder if you can guess who I have in mind). Climate change is inconvenient.

It would be a delusion to think that we have an answer; but we need to acknowledge that a great many human activities – travelling, power generation, industrial processes – contribute substantially to climate change. We are all, collectively, at fault and, more seriously, there is a pressing need for complex agreements between nations to be nailed down in order to cut the world's carbon dioxide emissions down to size.

All of this means, inescapably, that climate change is personal. In many parts of the world lives and livelihoods are being torn apart, and it is largely the world's poorest communities who will continue to be most affected.

That is where Christian Aid comes in. This year the charity is presenting a Lent and Easter Appeal under the heading "Rise Up Against Climate Change 2019." Their literature highlights Sir David Attenborough's stark observation that climate change is humanity's greatest threat in thousands of years, and further states that "we have reached a point where we simply cannot ignore its effects any longer and, in particular, the effects on the world's poorest communities." Many communities at the sharp end of climate change have been pushed to the edge of survival. Besides, we should note that our own children and grandchildren stand to suffer by virtue of failure to deal now with this intractable problem.

Of course eating far less meat, paying more for energy and foregoing exotic holidays abroad might be small and useful (if unpopular) steps; but we might also make a donation to the Christian Aid Lent and Easter Appeal; and what about hosting a Christian Aid lunch?

There are lots of possibilities. You can get all sorts of ideas by logging on to info@e-mail.christian-aid.org. There you can catch up on the process of lobbying influential financial institutions and see the extensive range of Christian Aid Climate Change Projects to which we could individually, or collectively as a parish, give support. As the writer of Hebrews observes:"Let us consider how we may spur one another on towards love and good deeds (Hebrews 10 v.24)."



A Dog's Way Home tells the story of Bella, a beautiful dog who becomes separated from her beloved human family and embarks on an epic 400-mile journey home. For those of us who have despaired at films filled with ear-splitting explosions or salacious storylines, A Dog's Way Home will be a breath of fresh air (indeed you can almost feel the fresh air as Bella travels through wonderful scenery beautifully filmed). But this is more than a feel-good movie for dog-lovers, as it illustrates important lessons for our own journey through life.



Though Bella is ceaselessly focused on her goal, yet she still stops to provide comfort and support to those she meets along the way. And, although her love for others is unconditional, the help she provides subsequently leads to assistance for herself in her own time of need. Sometimes this is reciprocated directly, as with the orphaned baby cougar whom she adopts and feeds. At other times the benefit is tangential, as with the man she digs out of an avalanche. But, in each case, her gift of love is selfless and the benefit is serendipitous.

**B** illy Wilson passed away in the City Hospital in the middle of February. This was after several months of hospitalization, which had begun after a fall at his home in Carryduff. His courage in the time of sickness reflected the positive and engaging way in which he faced all of life.


Billy and his brother, Samuel, were born in North Belfast, and Billy served his time in Belfast Shipyard as a fitter. Along with his immense skill with his hands, he was a man of great intellectual ability, and soon gave up the day job to study and then serve as a teacher in the Construction Department at Downpatrick Tech. He later earned a degree in Humanities at the Open University. He and his late wife, Ethel, enjoyed life in Carryduff, where they bought their home in 1963. Their daughter, Fiona, remains a faithful member of the parish and Select Vestry, and, along with her family, will remain in our prayers in their loss.

Many of those gathering at St Andrew's for Billy's well-attended funeral, represented his life as member of the Caravan Club, which he had served as chairman locally and in Ireland as a whole. Others were present from his Masonic Lodge, teaching community, and from his many friends and neighbours.

To Peter and Fiona, Keri and Marc, Linzi and Eamonn, and Sophie we extend our ongoing sympathy and wish them well with their plans for this year.

A Roselawn after a long fight with illness. Albert was from Co Fermanagh and moved to Belfast to recover his health after it suffered through the struggle to work the difficult ground on his farm there. He and his late wife, Olive, raised their family of three in Belfast. Albert worked in the Harbour Police and in his own shop on the Lisburn Road, before taking up employment in Stranmillis College as Head Janitor with responsibility for cleaning and cecurity services there. He was a keen member of his parish bowling club at St Nicholas' Church, and also Balmoral Outdoor Bowling club, and was "grandfather" of his Masonic Lodge.

Albert was friendly to all and sundry, and was often greeted in hospital by the people he had said 'hello' to on their way to and from work on the Lisburn Road. He had a great sense of fun, and a quiet and determined faith, which expressed itself in his requests for Home Communion in his latter years. 
During Lent read through the Gospel of Luke and each day pray for God to help you become more like Jesus
