

The series of sketches was written for the Fringe at Queen's in 1979. An esteemed cleric-to-be of the Presbyterian church and a skilled doctor-to-be performed the leading roles in one sketch. "Is it time?" was the recurring call of the ginger haired lead - though the ginger hair was so well doused in talcum powder that the twenty year old made quite a convincing senior citizen.



We knew the play had some sort of Christian message so we presumed it was a reference to a response or decision.

The rich deep voices of the actors resonated around the McMordie Hall. The two men were clearly looking for something, or maybe someone, to help them find out about the time.

Maybe they were planning their imminent death! Not much fun for a Fringe Festival, but the sort of thing student Christians might come up with, if their sense of humour was a bit warped or missing.

Or perhaps it was meal time, yes, they were in an old people's home and awaiting tea.

"Is it time?" his reverence asked again. A little bit demented perhaps, or was he more sure of himself than we expected?

But it made me think? As Ecclesiastes 3:1-2 states:

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens: a time to be born and a time to die.

So the sketch was meant to make the audience think about the limits of life and their readiness for the 'end'.

Is it time? Ah! It is, and with that the opening music of Coronation Street began. *No one wants to miss Corrie.*

When "it is time" for your call home, I hope you are ready to meet our Lord and Saviour - not just to catch the latest soap . It is by the grace of God alone that we can be ready for that time.

Join with us in Holy Week to help us all get ready.

p oth parishes now hold their Easter Vestry meetings in Sundays.

It has proven to be a valuable change with numbers attending greatly increased, and the combination of a short service and a business setting helps all involved to recognise that worship is more than a few hymns, and vestry duty is more than a bit of business!

T he times are different but, starting with a short service at 10:30 or 12:00, the programmes continue as follows:

- Time of worship, including opening prayer
- Apologies (please send these in good time)
- Minutes of previous year's meeting (these will be "taken as read" if everyone agrees)
- · Chairman's comments on Trustees' Report
- Financial Report and any questions arising
- Nomination of Examiner for next year's accounts
- Nomination and proposals for Church Wardens and Glebewardens
- Proposals for Select Vestry (12 additional names elected to join wardens and rector)
- Proposal for Person aged 18-30 to serve on Diocesan Synod (and a supplemental)
- Refreshments
- Votes of thanks
- Announcement of Results and Close

Those whose names are on the General Vestry List are permitted to serve on the select vestry and to vote for new members. A small number of persons have indicated that they are stepping off the vestries, so members are asked to prayerfully consider service in the incoming year. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Discovering Your gifts

I t is great to have natural skills which we can offer to the community around us. There are people who serve in the various teams, cleaning and flower arranging, bible reading, screen operation, welcome at the doors, and setting up and tidying away at events. A smaller number are invited to lead prayers and assist in leading services from time to time.

God gives his followers spiritual gifts, which we are invited to use to serve one another. Debate continues over the connection between natural and spiritual gifts. Are spiritual gifts turbo power addition to our natural gifts, or are they different?

An example is the gift of teaching: many followers of Christ are dedicated teachers, and they have a natural gift which they use in their profession, but the same godly people would not dream of becoming Sunday school or bible study group leaders! Teaching is a gift, but other less technically accomplished people sense God leading them to nurture children in the faith, despite this.

We do not look for professionalism but willingness, always with an enthusiasm to improve. We hope as you sense a nudge from God, or even a direct word from him, that you will offer yourself to the ongoing ministries of your church.

Expanding the Technology teams

W e have three areas in Carryduff and Killaney which require volunteer help to monitor and use technology in the churches.

The screens, currently only in Carryduff, involve an operator to control the computer progressing from slide to slide. The team needs two new members. Training is offered and will be easy to understand. In addition, if anyone would like training on preparing the screens, a lot of help will be offered you. You need greater computer skills to do this, and, hopefully, your own laptop.

The Sound System, in Killaney, involves sitting near the amplifier during church and adjusting levels from time to time, depending on what is happening. We would like an additional team member (or two) to serve.

The organ in Carryduff has a device called ChoirMaster which is used to provide organ accompaniment through our new organ. We would like one (or possibly two) additional operators, who are willing to undertake an hour or so of training. This job involves a few minutes of preparation prior to the service at which you are assisting. A musical ear is helpful but not essential. Online familiarisation with the device is also available.

Finally, **all the parishes' teams** need fresh skills and new volunteers to ensure we are not over stretching the current members. If you would like to offer your help in any particular area, please offer your help. Flower donations and arranging, cleaning teams at Killaney, magazine distributors in particular (we are down three at the moment), and lesson readers in both churches. You do not need to wait to be asked!

What will you do with your Palm Cross?

F rom time to time the worshippers at our churches are given a Palm Cross: it is a very popular gift, and it is a pleasure to provide it, but what, exactly, are we meant to do with it? That is the question!

I see many of them on display in people's houses; they are a very hard item to throw away! It seems like a rude thing to do so, year by year, they are put up on a wall, set on a table, squeezed behind a picture frame . . you know the kind of thing I mean. Where is yours?

If only we would all be as careful with the ACTUAL "cross" as we are with the African Palm Crosses from Southern Tanzania that we will be given on

Palm Sunday! Villagers in the Masasi area of the country gather the leaves from naturally occurring Dwarf Palms and form the simple cross shape with which we are so familiar. In some traditions, the palms used on the Palm Sunday Procession are later burnt and used as ash for daubing on foreheads on the following Ash Wednesday. It isn't my way of 'secretly' proclaiming my faith, but each to their own, I suppose!

If we are not going to burn them, then how about placing them somewhere that your neighbours might seem them. They may ask you: "Why did you plant that cross in the earth?" Have a quick answer ready: "It reminds me how Jesus' cross was planted in the earth so that he would draw all people to himself."

If that doesn't suit you, then how about sending them in a letter or card to a family member with an Easter Greeting: "Let's celebrate the empty cross! Iesus is alive!"

Unfamiliar Names

There is a very clear directive of Jesus set out in the gospel record of Luke. Quite simply it is: "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who ill-treat you (Luke 6.v27-28)."

We need to take this seriously to heart; not least in the wake of the unspeakable hatred resulting in the death of fifty people of Islamic tradition in Christchurch, New Zealand on 15 March this year.

There was, of course, world-wide condemnation and a surge of heartfelt expressions of love for the families of the victims. Then, within a matter of days, we saw on television an elderly member of the Islamic community in Christchurch saying that he forgave the man who had committed this appalling brutality, and that he would pray for him. That was truly amazing and heart-warming.

Among those who lost their lives were Daoud Nabi, Syed Johandad Ali and Osama Adnan. These names would have been entirely unfamiliar to the gunman and, indeed, to all of us. All we really know about them is that they were among the fifty innocent victims whose lives were so savagely ended.

It is alarming to think that this is by no means the only mass killing in recent years brought about by cultural or racial intolerance. There have been more shocking incidents in the Middle East, in Nigeria, in Sudan and in South East Asia than most of us can remember; countless unknown, unnamed innocent lives have been lost on the premise of some sort of twisted fundamentalist hatred.

Here is another list of unfamiliar names: Francis Xavier Heran, Matthew J Burke, Monique Effie De Jesus, Darryl Leon McKinney and Pedro Francisco Checo. We know nothing about the hopes and ambitions of these people. They, too, had their lives brutally cut short. Their names are among the many carved into the polished stonework that surrounds the 9/11 memorial in down town New York. They, too, were the innocent victims of an appalling racist mindset.

Although we do not know, personally, the names or the life expectations of any of these our fellow human beings, it is not given to us to exhibit callous indifference. It isn't even good enough to merely feel disgust. We have a collective moral responsibility to press for a more peaceful, shared understanding of differing traditions. What can we do?

We can, at least, pray sincerely and continuously for the many persecuted communities the world over and those who oppress them, setting aside the sometimes all-embracing attachment we might have to our own will and judgement. This is a tough, yet inescapable Christian discipline, especially as it seems that global politics are currently tending towards the hardening of borders.

We could also pray helpfully, for example, that political figures and celebrities might refrain from self-interested and irresponsible behaviour and language – and we must forgive them.

In all of this we would, among other things, show that our life of faith is directed towards the genuinely sacred rather than towards fundamentalism – and this outlook is very succinctly expressed in Paul's letter to the Philippians, where he states: "Let your gentleness be evident to all.......and the God of peace be with you (Philippians 4. v 5 and 9)."


described as their "Halcyon Days".

Henri had also invited the congregation to adopt a note of thanksgiving rather than any sadness on the occasion.

We were honoured to do so, and, with the choir leading worship and parishioners providing refreshments afterwards, old friends enjoyed the opportunity to share

happy memories of her and her life over 86 years. She was buried with her late husband in Killaney Churchyard.

We sympathise with her children and grandchildren, and will continue to remember Henri fondly in the years to come.






