Christian Aid Carryduff Area Collection Week (12-18 May 2019)

S cripture tells us that we should love our neighbour and that our neighbour is everyone in need. Christian Aid works hard to alleviate poverty and injustice across the world. The money raised by individuals, communities and churches in Christian Aid week can make a real difference. Over the last 15 years over £100,000 has been collected in the house to house Christian Aid Week collection in the Carryduff area!

In recent years, because some of our collectors have retired, increasing areas of Carryduff are not being covered in the house collection. In response, this year Christian Aid will be delivering a different type of donation envelope to SOME areas including large parts of the Meadowvale, Muskett and Baronscourt developments. These envelopes will NOT be collected. Instead, those receiving these envelopes (labelled with a sticker) are asked to donate by returning the envelopes to the Carryduff Pharmacy, Hillsborough Road.

E ven at this late stage, the local volunteer group could still use additional help! You can help by being a collector, with 2-3 hours of your time being required in total or by delivering the new type of envelope door-to-door (and

not collecting!). You can also help by encouraging the collectors, by giving generously and by praying for the work of Christian Aid. Christian Aid does marvellous work in Christ's name.

Celebrating difference?

'The message in this film is one of inclusion, not just accepting difference but celebrating difference' said the actor Colin Farrell at the world premiere of Disney's new film *Dumbo*.

In the opening scenes his character, Holt Farrier, returns from the war without one arm, which shocks his children. 'It's still me' he says, and that is perfectly true. But his follow-on 'everything is going to be just like it was before' is more wishful



thinking than reality. He can no longer perform on his beloved circus horses, so is assigned to dressing as a clown and cleaning up the elephants' dung.

And it is in their cage that he discovers the newborn baby elephant with big ears. The ringmaster who had hoped for a 'precious bundle of joy' calls Dumbo 'a monster... damaged goods' and tries to cover up the ears with a special bonnet, in the same way that he tries to cover up Holt's missing arm with a fake one.

Dumbo is the quintessential outsider who is rejected and ridiculed just because of his looks, whilst Holt also faces his own rejection because of his disability. Tim Burton, who directed the film, not only brings to it his well-known talent for the fantastical but also his skill in provoking the audience to think about the value of the outsider – those who don't fit the popular mould. And as the film progresses, Dumbo's large ears enable him to



rescue others in a dramatic scene in which Holt also plays a key role, regardless of his disability.

So, we are caused to think about the value of 'difference'. If others make us feel unhappy with how we look, or if we face sudden changes to our bodies, do we feel pressured to cover up and try to continue just like we were before? Or can we celebrate the

differences and embrace the changes, bringing them out into the open and using them for the good of others?

God among the ruins

The tragic fire at Note Dame Cathedral shocked the whole world. Seeing such a magnificent building engulfed in flames saddened all who saw the devastation unfold. It was a monumental blow to the nation of France. It will take years to rebuild this famous place of worship.



One striking image from the fire showed the interior of the church scorched and ruined, its art treasures lost, its contents still smouldering. But high up in the background, unbowed by the flames, stands a golden cross, brightly shining in the darkness of the surrounding debris.

Since the fire took place at Easter, it is hard not to see this picture as a parable. One Anglican vicar made this comment: 'Notice what is left inside, untouched, after the destruction of all sorts of 'priceless' works of arts at Norte Dame Cathedral? The Cross. What an image for Holy Week and what a picture to describe secular Western Europe.'

As I pondered the picture it spoke to me of the abiding value of the Cross. The words of a hymn came to mind:

In the cross of Christ I glory, Tow'ring o'er the wrecks of time; All the light of sacred story Gathers round its head sublime.

The place of worship may be destroyed, but not the God we worship. The message of the Cross, at the centre of our faith, remains a timeless, undamaged truth.

The hymn continues:

When the woes of life o'ertake me, Hopes deceive, and fears annoy, Never shall the cross forsake me, Lo! It glows with peace and joy.

Even among the ruins of our own lives the Cross stands tall, reminding us of the presence of God and His grip on our lives.

Elijah in our Time

N ot everyone would know that the prophet Elijah made a spectacular appearance in Birmingham in 1846.

I suppose it's hard to believe that this most courageous (and often frightened) prophet of Old Testament times could reappear in a much later age. How could this be?

E lijah lived during a very unsettled time in the history of the Jewish people and found himself dangerously at odds with Ahab the king of Israel during the period 874-853 BC. In brief, Ahab had married Jezebel, a princess from the land of Tyre and Sidon. This was, in essence, a political alliance between neighbouring countries; but it brought about a serious spiritual conflict between church and state.

Jezebel introduced Baal worship and the kingdom of Israel became overrun by the prophets of Baal and their idols. Ultimately it seemed that Elijah was the only one who stood up against them in defence of the one true God – and there was trouble ahead. There is a serious drought and Elijah says to Ahab "As the Lord, the God of Israel, lives, whom I serve, there will be neither dew nor rain in the next few years except at my word (1 Kings 17 v.1)."

The drought took hold across the land and Elijah, directed by the word of God, hid himself in a valley east of the Jordan. Here he was fed by ravens and, later, looked after by a widow in Sidon. Meanwhile, although there was a severe famine, the prophets of Baal prospered and Jezebel brought about the killing of the Lord's prophets.

E ventually a very frightened Elijah confronts the prophets of Baal – all 450 of them – and challenges them to call upon Baal to light a sacrifice. Elijah would prepare a similar sacrifice and call upon the true God of Israel to light the fire. The outcome was that no matter what the prophets of Baal tried, their sacrifice would not burn. Elijah then prayed to the true God saying "......0 Lord, answer me, so these people will know that You, O Lord, are God (1 Kings 18v.37)." In response the fire of the Lord burned up the sacrifice. Following this the prophets of Baal were discredited and slaughtered – Old Testament times were brutal.

Things happened quickly after that. The rains came for the first time in three years. Jezebel blamed Elijah for the drought and sought to have him executed. Afraid and deeply depressed he fled for his life, travelling for forty days until he reached Horeb, the mount of God.

I t was here that the writer of 1 Kings tells us that a powerful wind, an earthquake and then a fire occurred; and after the fire came the still small voice of God (1 Kings 19 v.12). Elijah is restored.

The whole dramatic story was set dramatically to music by Felix Mendelssohn. The music features great choruses of the people singing biblical texts such as: "Baal we cry to thee, hear and answer (1 Kings 18 v.26)"; "The fire descends from Heaven (1 Kings 18 v.38-39)"; "Thanks be to God, he laveth the thirsty land (adapted from Psalm 93 v.3)" and "He that shall endure to the end shall be saved (Matthew 24 v.13)."

Mendelssohn's music is thrilling and involving, at times making a powerful sound and, sometimes, a penetrating whisper. It was this music that received its first, rapturous performance in Birmingham in 1846: and you can hear it too. Elijah is coming to Belfast. This great story of the battle between good and evil will be presented by the 120 strong Belfast Philharmonic Choir and the Ulster Orchestra in the Ulster Hall at 7.45 pm on Friday 7 June. It would be great to see you there.

We extend our sympathy to her son Thomas, and daughter, Meta and their families at this time of parting.


Robert Wilson


