Dear Friends

It is sometimes difficult to spot a church building.

L ast year in NY, NY, we were trying to visit a Presbyterian congregation just off Central Park. It is one associated with Tim Keller, one of the more famous Christian teachers these days.

We found a building which roughly matched the internet search, but outside the door was a huge guy, a bouncer, and a notice advertising some sports class. That can't be it. Where are the men in suits and ties with bits of paper to hand to the people attending? Where are the beautiful flowers on a table in the porch? What have they done with the A4 sheets advertising the rosters, the next meeting of the men's group?

A ten minute wander around the district found a few Sunday Morning coffee shops, more marvellous buildings, but no spire or gothic window or large arched doors. Let's try the coffee!

We went around the block again and took a second look at the original building. By now a different door was opened, a guy in a smart suit was carrying a skateboard up the steps, and families and singles were starting to appear. An interesting mixture was gathering. The cinema style seats made for comfortable "pews", and the jazz band ensemble was playing some fabulous music: yes, it was the stuff of fables. An hour and twenty later, we had been challenged, entertained, informed and surprised - in equal measure.

My lasting memory concerned how this church had adapted to where they were and what they were doing. The building belonged to a group founded a hundred years earlier to espouse humanism. The bouncer was operating the door for the previously booked users. The skateboarder was the preacher at our service, and even the New Yorkers thought that a board was an amusing way to arrive to speak. The cup of tea afterwards was almost as painful as any we have been to for thirty years: it lacked the warmth we normally feel in Killaney and Carryduff when we are among friends. The language of the speaker was probably correct but a little daring at times. The Bible teaching, however, was excellent, and I have thought about it often in the year since. Its theme? Stop complaining.

Hopefully, therefore, you enjoyed my letter this month, and are planning to come to worship before June is out. Because I wouldn't want to complain, would I, if you don't?

A smaller number may be invited to lead prayers and assist in leading services from time to time. The organ at Carryduff has an attachment which, with minimal training, can be used by a nonmusician to accompany hymns at smaller services. We want an additional operator (3 in total). The screens at Carryduff are operated by pressing one or two buttons as the operator keeps up with the services. A new operator "shadows" a more experienced one until they are happy to do this on their own.

On the day of Pentecost, the followers of Jesus met together in an upper room. Its location was probably on Mount Zion to the west of Jerusalem. The site can be visited although it's not the Upper Room. It's an ancient building dating from the 14th century and built on the site of a church destroyed by the Persians seven centuries earlier. But the first floor chamber is large with old paving stones, surrounded by stone pillars and arches. According to tradition, this is where Jesus ate the 'Last Supper' and His followers received the Holy Spirit.

On Whit Sunday, Pentecost's other title, we would do well to remember why the Holy Spirit was sent to us. We are given power to live God's way:

to lead us into the things God has prepared for us;

to worship and glorify Him;

to enable us to pray;

to lead us into truth;

to give us a desire to share the love of Christ with others and to help us trust God for all our needs.

This Pentecost may our prayer be for God's Spirit to transform us, for the gentleness of His Spirit to lead us, and for the gifts of His Spirit to equip us. Amen.

What is church for?

In Romans 1, the apostle Paul describes his mission and ministry, and therefore, by implication, the mission and ministry of the church in these terms:

"Bring about the obedience of faith."

As is often the case in Bible reading, I just have seen these words many times before, but today they struck me as never before. A strong connection is made between obedience and faith. We, the church, are in the business of helping people come to faith and, in doing so, to become obedient to the God whom we have come to trust.

It posed me a challenge in two measures:

- How was I, as a pastor and teacher, helping people like you to come to a faith in Jesus Christ?
- How was I giving leadership in the kind of obedient life such faith entails?

This led to two further inner questions:

- Do people attending the churches realise that faith is vital and that obedience is the natural outcome of faith?
- Do people who never attend the worship realise that faith in Christ and obedience to his word is a life-giving essential?

I hope, if you are still reading this far in, that you recognise that these questions are significant- that your response to the challenge of Jesus Christ to "believe in me" is of eternal importance, and that your active response to "Follow me" is the only real evidence of a faith inside.

I am not so naïve as to think every person's response to Jesus' call looks the same, but Paul's teaching implies certain similarities: we are trying to obey Christ's commands, and we are relying upon what he's done for us to help us do that.

"Trust and Obey" is an old hymn in our hymn books. Have a read at it sometimes. The hymn writer says that to trust and obey is the only way to be happy in Jesus. May you lean on Jesus for all your needs and learn from Jesus that his ways lead to life.

What is Technology Doing To Us

S ometimes the overwhelming presence of social media can strike me as both childish and unsettling, even dangerous. Of course we always enjoy sharing family photographs on mobile phones and the convenience of sending messages simultaneously to lots of people at the touch of a button. Such things are – to borrow a phrase from Prince Harry – both amazing and incredible.

Yet there are other, rather more alarming sides to all this technology. It is evident that Twitter, for example, tends to attract bullies; and the ever rising profile of Facebook has undoubtedly damaged social cohesion. We have become a less caring society because of these things. We have also become more careless with language and with truth. Beyond this, it would also be fair to say that public trust has been dented by a rising tide of electronically generated misinformation.

I s it just me, or do other people also find it hard to place much faith in this unverifiable deluge? Much of it is childish, the language often trite or insincere; and much of it is a lot more pervasive, sinister and, arguably, dangerously influential. Should we not be more mindful of the brutal crudities of social media and the impact it can have on the well-being of an impressionable rising generation? Does it not endanger their capacity to think sympathetically and rationally for themselves?

L ast year the Sunday Times ran a feature on a significant text by a high profile computer scientist (Jaron Lanier) called "Ten Arguments for Deleting your Social Media Account Right Now." Here are three of them -

Social media: 1. is destroying your capacity for empathy.

- 2. is making what you say meaningless.
- 3. is undermining the truth.

The author, nevertheless, remains hopeful "about the potential of technology to do good for society."

I both hope and believe this is achievable. In the meantime it would be wise to be aware of how childish the use of this wonderful technology can become. Surely no-one expressed this timeless caution more eloquently than St. Paul, when he said "When I was a child............ reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put childish ways behind me (1 Corinthians 13 v.11)."

 ${f M}$ aybe we all need to light a few candles and pass on faith inspired, reliable and lasting values to those around us.

Keep every other week after that free. We are thinking about nice local walks and will provide details soon – if you have any good ideas please send them by email to:


