

Freedom Sunday

What is Freedom Sunday?

It is a Sunday (22nd September this year) in which churches are encouraged to focus on issues of international justice, slavery in particular. Across the world many thousands of churches use liturgy, prayers, resources and teaching suggestions to help them understand the range of freedoms denied to over 40 million people.



Slavery can include forced labour, sex trafficking, abuse of power, child prostitution and human trafficking.

Why are we observing Freedom Sunday here?

Recently, I heard an interview featuring Jim Martin, one of the leaders of International Justice Ministries. IJMUK is the branch working in our area. He spoke of the opportunity Freedom Sunday gives to enable people - to whom God has given a heart for justice - to initiate local justice programmes. I believe justice is a key part of the whole gospel ministry and, since I am currently unsure how to progress this in the life of our parishes, I am looking forward to a response from you, the parishioners, after Sept. 22nd.

How can we prepare for Freedom Sunday?

Becoming aware of the types of slavery which exist either, directly in Ireland, or indirectly through the products and services we employ from overseas, is a key part of our preparation. For the two or three readers who regularly consume Twitter or Facebook feeds, search for @IJMUK and you will find useful information. www.ijmuk.org is the website if you care to go directly.

Holiday Homework:

If you have the privilege of going on holidays this summer, take a look around you in your resort or locality and try to identify where children are being forced to work, where hotel staff seem to be on duty from early morning to very late at night, where you are offered hand made items for sale at ridiculously low prices: here you see modern slavery in action. Share it with us before Freedom Sunday.

Glimpsing the face of God?

'Extraordinary', 'transcendent', 'spine-tingling'. This is just some of the praise from reviewers of Amazing Grace, the film of Aretha Franklin's 1972 recording of what became the best-selling live gospel album of all time. Intimately filmed in a small church before a local congregation and brought to our screens just as it was recorded almost fifty years ago, why has the film provoked such a positive response from contemporary film critics?



Its huge impact is clearly due to Aretha's deeply personal rendition of so many powerful gospel songs such as 'What a friend we have in Jesus' and 'Precious Lord take my hand'.

Singing at the church pulpit, with a cross in front of her and a mural of Jesus behind her, Aretha uses her amazing vocal mastery and artistic excellence not to draw attention to herself but rather to draw out the message of the music. No wonder Rolling Stone magazine says: 'It will make you feel as if you've seen the face of God'.

Halfway through, her father Rev C.L. Franklin, gives a short talk in which he refers to criticism of Aretha that she should come back to church (until 1961 she had mainly sung gospel songs, but in the intervening decade she had recorded a string of 'secular' hits). Quite rightly, he says, 'she never left the church.'



Certainly, Aretha faced many trials and challenges in her life and faith. And one can palpably feel them through this intimate recording of her emotional rendition of these powerful songs. Watching it on the big screen, we are not distant observers of a slickly packaged musical performance. Rather we feel right there with her, in the midst of the

intimate reality of an open-hearted woman honestly expressing, through her music, the grace that she has received - the amazing grace through which we glimpse the face of God.

Wonder and Worship: Reflections in a Scottish Rainforest

I t can be easier to notice things away from home, when we are relaxed and surrounded by unfamiliar sights in an exotic location. But sometimes the same wonders are there in our own back yard. GK Chesterton was a great advocate of intensive observation, and he invited his readers to take a fresh look at things that might be taken for granted. The rewards for this mental adjustment are great, and can feed into our worship in new ways.

I first learned to appreciate old growth forests on the West coast of Canada: the centuries-old tangle of logs and underbrush, and thick layers of moss and lichen, that provide rich resources for countless organisms. Several years later, in Scotland, I stumbled over a few acres of birch and hazel, lush with moss and ferns, and humming with insect and bird life. Fallen logs lay everywhere, vegetation grew up the trees, creepers hung down, and sunlight slanted through clearings.

I later discovered that this patch of woodland is one of the few remaining areas of old growth Atlantic rainforest, so I visited one sunny morning when I had more time to linger. The wood is home to 140 species of lichen and 100 of moss, so I found myself looking very closely at tree trunks and boulders. Each lichen is a unique relationship between a fungus and a particular collection of single-celled algae – an example of the collaboration that is so essential to every ecosystem.

Places like this are worth preserving, respecting, and appreciating as much as a work of art or a historic city. I'm so grateful to the community that chose to preserve it, and the Creator who used such intricate and patient processes to create it. As the animals and plants around me did what comes to them naturally, I did what I was made for - thanking God for everything I saw. I found myself praising God alongside all those species of lichen, moss and trees. "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord" (Psalm 150).

There is a growing call to take both our personal devotions and our church services outside from time to time, and there are a growing number of resources to help us do this. As you go through your week, can you find one new way to appreciate your surroundings, and praise God alongside the rest of creation?

It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. Swithun was Bishop of Winchester in the 9th century, and famous for his charitable gifts and for building churches.

When he was dying in 862, he asked to be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door. But on 15th July 971 Swithun was dug up and moved into the cathedral itself. That same day many people claimed miraculous cures, but the heavens opened.

The unusually heavy rain that day, and for days following, was attributed to the power of St. Sw.

Don't Throw it Away

What ought we to do about plastic waste? It is an issue of increasing concern world-wide, causing great environmental damage. Furthermore, it challenges our God given responsibility to take care of the earth that sustains us (Genesis

2:15). Wouldn't it be a tremendous step forward if we could dispense with plastic altogether?

In the meantime we ought to be very careful in the way we deal with all our plastic waste. Don't just throw it away. If carelessly discarded we cannot know where it will end up or what environmental damage it might cause, even in the most remote or inaccessible places. What about this for an unlikely story?

The Mariana Trench is a long distance below the surging waves of the Pacific Ocean, stretching down to 11 Km. beneath the surface. That's a long way down. However, last month the American explorer Victor Vescovo piloted a submarine into the Trench. His dive took him deeper under water than anyone had ever been before and permitted him to identify four marine species not previously known. Then, at the bottom of the earth's deepest sea bed - many thousands of kilometres from the nearest human population – he discovered a plastic bag.

Last December a study published in the journal Science Advances examined the fate of all plastics ever made. The study concluded that of the 8.3 billion tonnes of plastics that have been produced, almost 80% has become waste. This is the shocking evidence of our careless culture of disposable consumerism.

Just think about the amount of plastic we use and how we take it so much for granted. We probably bring home the household shopping in plastic bags; and that shopping might include, for example, milk, yoghurt, strawberries, shower gel and toothpaste all packaged in plastic.

How we deal with all the plastic waste is a matter not just for the local council but for each and every one of us. Don't throw it away. We can, at the very least, place much of it in the recycling bin. Or maybe we should raise the bar and campaign actively for the reintroduction of glass milk bottles – do our little bit to save the earth. After all, as the psalmist reminds us, "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it (Psalm 24:1)."

All this is only a small, yet very significant, element in our abundantly rich life of faith. It is a faith that we need not only to hold on to, but to make known to all those scoffers and sceptics around us.

On that score I will leave the last word with the writer of the letter to the Hebrews, who says ".....do not throw away your confidence; it will be richly rewarded." *Hebrews 10:35*Denis Carson

Being baptised as an adult

F or many of us, our baptism was a photograph in a family album, an event our parents and godparents tell us about: who was there, what we ate, where we held the party! Significant, among those details, was the place where it took place, most likely our local church.

K atie Maginn's baptism was rather different: she will not need family albums to remind her of it, she was wide awake and playing her part throughout. She will not be relying on the faith of her sponsors to qualify her to be baptised, she was able to express her own faith before the congregation gathered on Children's Day in St. Ignatius', Carryduff. She will not need others to tell her who was there: she was at the heart of it.


And it was a wonderful privilege for all of us to be part of it too.

A t the heart of the service was her testimony, given from the Lectern before she took the promises required of everyone coming or bringing children to baptism.

In her story she told how her journey of faith was not smooth, and involved several stages of commitment and growth before the baptismal day. She expressed appreciation for the team on the local CSSM, and her time at J Club as a junior leader in helping her to grow as a Christian.

A part from the testimony, the service was virtually identical to the one that little babies and children have experienced as their parents declare their faith and commitment to Christ before the congregation. Of course, having sixty children and young people present gave it a bit of a boost!!

We hope those in the congregation who have not yet been baptised will consider Katie's witness as a challenge to them. As adults, young people and children, or as parents of small children, let us follow her example and dare to profess our faith and seek the blessing of Baptism.




