

Dear Friends

The Christian Community needs to be careful when it asks for justice for itself. For, unwittingly, we can make a rod for our own backs. You see justice, to be justice, needs be fairly applied. Not only to those demanding it for themselves, but also for those from whom they demand it.





- That people's employment opportunities will not be limited in interviews because of their faith.
- That people will be able to use their understanding of Christ's call on them
 to influence their behaviour at work, bearing in mind the need to do so
 sensitively and without coercion.
- That people will be free to express the fact that they have faith without fear of discrimination from management.

But for justice to be done such treatment needs to be *experienced by others*.

- If Christians have the right to wear crosses, an optional religious symbol, then people of other religions may, surely, be permitted to wear their optional (or core) religious symbols.
- If recognised Christian leaders have the right to enter schools and lead public worship, then surely similarly recognised people of different religions (or none) may expect similar rights.

And so the arguments go on.

In the context of Christian worship and teaching we cannot be expected to espouse and teach views that are contrary to Christian understanding, but we would be unwise to ignore those views as we try to find ways of church and society practising justice fairly. See some details later in the magazine.

P lease pray for me as I seek to address some of these contentious issues in the course of sermons and studies in September. I need your prayers for this and every aspect of my service with you.

I hope you are able to participate in this month of reflection.

Created for love?

Toy Story 4 is bright, colourful, funny, exciting and engaging from the opening scene to the closing credits (don't leave too early or you'll miss even more funny and poignant scenes). It is a family film in the widest possible sense of that word, with



something for everyone, whatever your age and life experiences.

Ostensibly it follows the familiar simple story arc of toys going missing and being rescued. But this film also delves more deeply into themes of rejection and restored hope. From Gabby Gabby, a doll who was discarded because of her disability, to Duke Caboom who was unwanted because he didn't live up to the media image, the film explores what it feels like to be devalued and rejected. These mini storylines are resolved as the toys find a restored hope. Gabby Gabby develops empathy for a lost child and, in turn, finds the total acceptance she sought. Duke Caboom develops a renewed confidence in his abilities and rediscovers the value he had lost.

Most significantly, wrapped around these many short stories is the overall narrative of Forky, a toy created out of rubbish by a little girl who needed a friend. In contrast to the others, Forky is not rejected by others, but by himself. "I'm not a toy", "I'm trash" he says as he repeatedly throws himself into rubbish bins. How is that story resolved? By Forky discovering that he is unique and beautiful in his own way, because his




value does not come from what others think of him, or even what he thinks of himself, but from the fact that he was created for a purpose and is loved by his creator.


At a time in our culture when many are struggling to find a sense of self-worth, perhaps there is much we can all learn from Forky's journey of

WHY? On 10 July 2019, the Westminster parliament voted in favour of an amendment to the Northern Ireland Executive Formation Bill that would liberalise abortion legislation in Northern Ireland. The bill, including this amendment, will take effect after 21 October if the Stormont executive is not reinstated by then.

This silent protest at both the vote and its repercussions says:

- **a)** We were not asked. Westminster has legislated for us without hearing us. Every sitting Northern Ireland MP voted against these changes, the people of Northern Ireland were not consulted, and there is no public support in Northern Ireland for the kind of wholesale legalisation of abortion that has been planned.
- **b)** They cannot speak. Westminster has ignored the unborn child. The human individuals whose lives will be ended if abortion is legalised have no voice in the debate and many speeches in parliament concerning this amendment dehumanised the unborn child and disregarded its value and right to life.

WHO? People of all ages and all religious and political persuasions are welcome – anyone who objects to this planned change to the law. We need as many people as possible to express their concerns in silent dignity. This protest is not affiliated with any religious or political organisation and is not coordinated by any organisation or campaign group. It has been planned by concerned citizens of Northern Ireland who wish to express our deep dissatisfaction with this intended change in a law we consider to be good.

HOW? Gather at the lower gates of Stormont Estate for 7pm. At the blow of a whistle we will walk silently and slowly to the foot of the steps to Parliament Buildings where we will stand in silence, heads bowed and lights held high, for six minutes (one for each county) until another whistle is blown.

The Season of Justice

The month of September ends each year with a day called Freedom Sunday. For the first time, in 2019, we are using this observance to help us open our minds to issues of Freedom and Slavery in the world today.

As part of this season we will use several teaching moments in the services to focus on issues of Justice in the world.

These are important yet divisive issues, and, while the Biblical documents present clear teaching on many issues, they are complex to apply in the context of the world today. In Amos 5:24 the prophet proclaims God's desire to see community life change: But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.

Our task, in our age is to explore where justice is lacking and where we have power to influence change both in our own society and further afield.

Today society seems to be crying out for:

- Fairness for religious minorities
- Justice for the poor
- Compassion for the alien and stranger
- Support for the workers

These are some of the themes we will be exploring in September. As they are deep issues we will not be trying to reach a conclusive way forward to each issue, but rather to suggest new ways of thinking for ourselves and others, which may help influence wider society for good.

One small step

It's only a few weeks ago when all the news media reminded us about the Apollo 11 moon landing and the famous subsequent "one small step for man......" Maybe it's difficult to realise that just fifty years ago, on 21 July 1969, the American astronaut Neil Armstrong became the first person to set foot on the moon.

That first footprint was, at least in the mind of the general public, the climactic point of an amazing high tech programme set in motion ten years beforehand. What, you may ask, has happened since? Was this just, as Neil Armstrong said, "one small step for man" or was it really, as he went on to say, "one giant leap for mankind"? That remains a debatable point.

Since then there have been five further Apollo missions that reached the moon. Collectively they have brought back about 300Kg. of samples of lunar rock. Much of this material is similar in composition to the basalt columns of the Giant's Causeway. We now know for certain that the moon is not made of green cheese.

One giant leap? Maybe, on reflection, there was more popular appeal than real lasting value. Not so many people know about the work of the Hubble space telescope, yet it has revealed much more about the moon, the planets and the nature of outer space – several large steps perhaps. How will things develop in the future, and to what benefit? That's a question that has been asked many times in human history.

In that context I would argue that the disciple Thomas – the one who at first doubted the resurrection of Jesus – asked one of the most pertinent of all questions. He had become a follower (one of the original twelve) of this itinerant teacher and healer called Jesus. He was a confused, but eager, disciple who on one occasion said to Jesus: "Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way? (John 14 v.5)." Yet he put his trust in Jesus. He had taken a small but life changing step. It was a step that would lead, later, to an astonishing giant leap of enduring significance.

Thomas was at that time just one of the twelve; an ordinary unsung hero, not unlike Michael Collins who piloted the Apollo spacecraft round the moon but never got the chance to share the limelight. Yet he was to make a most significant step – in fact a giant leap – in the history of Christian faith. We all know that he found it difficult to believe that his crucified Lord had risen from the dead.

When the other disciples told him that they had seen the risen Lord he found it incomprehensible. He insisted that he could not accept what they said. He was, somewhat understandably, a doubter. He had to see the nail marks in

Jesus' hands and put his finger where the nails were (see John 20 v.25). Then – a week later – Thomas was with the other disciples when Jesus "came and stood among them" and invited Thomas to see his pierced hands and side and told him to "stop doubting and believe (John 20 v.27)."

It was at that point that Thomas took an amazing giant step. Without hesitation he said "My Lord and my God! (John 20 v.28)." There has never been a more life changing step in the history of faith. Thomas was, arguably, the first person to proclaim Jesus as "my Lord and my God." He was even prepared to risk his life for his faith. Can you think of a greater giant step than that? He became the example who cleared a pathway to faith and belief for countless sceptical people ever since.

Compared to this the discovery that the moon is not made of green cheese is merely a side show.



Christian Funeral

20th July William Desmond Pielou, Ballynahinch Road *Blessed are the dead, who die in the Lord.*

William Desmond Pielou

Desmond, a dear friend and staunch supporter of Saint Andrew's, Killaney, sadly passed away on 16th July, 2019.

Desmond led an amazing life. He was born in Ballymena into a French Huguenot family who arrived in Ireland in the 18th century and his immediate family ran an Hotel in the town. He once recalled, as a firewatcher during the Blitz, he saw Belfast burn from the roof of the Town Hall in Ballymena. He attended Ballymena Academy and obtained a place in Queen's University in order to study Chemistry. However, in 1943 he joined the Fleet Air Arm and was sent to Canada for pilot training but was unfortunately turned down as a pilot due to his eyesight. On returning to the UK he transferred to sea duties and took part in the Arctic Convoys to Russia. He has always been a very modest man and when quizzed about the convoys and the German attacks he would say "Didn't worry me – I was a radar operator in the centre of the ship". He was later awarded the Arctic Star and two Russian Decorations. On discharge at the end of the war he joined the RNVR on HMS Caroline. He also returned to Queen's University but changed disciplines specialising in Child Dentistry at the Royal Victoria Children's Hospital where he eventually rose to the position of Senior Consultant.

In 1961 he met and married Anita, a nurse at the Children's Hospital. They had a daughter, Gillian and a son David, who sadly predeceased his father earlier this year. Desmond was also father-in-law to Cathy and Chris.

On retirement Desmond took a course in welding and his work can be seen in the gates of Saint Andrew's and the ironwork around the basement steps. He also took up golf with his dear friend Prof. Jimmy Todd. He served on the Select Vestry for many years and performed various Warden duties.

Anita and Desmond were extremely fond of Saint Andrew's and have presented many items to the Church, including the Bishop's Chair, pew cushions and their generous donation of a Christmas Tree each year.
