

We gathered on a recent Wednesday with thoughts of a good friend who had passed away. It made me think of the cost and value of friendships.

The joys and pains of friendship

There is a real and deep emotional attachment that the healthy human being makes with the people around them, which is at the same time both joyful and painful.

The first days at a new school were moments of panic: will I have any friends? A few weeks later we know the answer, hopefully, yes, but occasionally not yet.

1 Friendship involves risk

You have to reach out to others if you are to make friends and often the first few words you say make all the difference. You may be rejected, or you may be accepted. Friendships involve risk.

2 Friendship involves joy

When you click with a colleague at work or a friend in church or a person in your class, you get inner energy which gives you a real boost and a deep joy. The risk is worth it because Friendships involve joy.

3 Friendship involves pain

However, there is also the issue of the ending of the friendship. Sometimes the person is not what you thought they were: their outer performance hid an inner nastiness, or their apparent niceness was just a cover to find someone to inflate their ego. Friendships involve pain.

4 Friendship involves loss

When we mourn the loss of a friendship, through the death of a friend, aspects of their memory are special to each of us. So we need to share ourselves, take the risk together, enjoy time and talk together and build the life together if we are to become real friends.

I hope you have good friends and that you use our midweek fellowship, our church groups, our times of worship and refreshment times, organisations and activities to make some new friendships and to strengthen those you already have.

Jesus said to his disciples "I call you friends". It is wonderful that our relationships in the church can help us come closer to God as well

In these studies in November we will ask God to show us where we have gone wrong, and, more importantly, how we can be made right in these areas of life.


While the studies will be at a surface level, it can help sometimes to begin a conversation with others, and then continue it later.

Remembrance Sunday

2018 marks the 100th Anniversary of the ending of the war.

One hundred years ago this year the armistice was signed at the end of the "War to end all wars". The aspirations of those involved were positive and forward looking, yet, sadly, their hopes were not fulfilled.

When the practice of remembering Armistice Day became widespread, the season gradually came to be used, not just for one war, but for all wars. The poppy became the symbol which we continue to use today.

Let us be notable in our era as those who stand up for peace, even though working for peace often means laying our lives on the line.

On 11th November our parishes will join with people all over the world in remembering the end of World War 1.

Not every offer can be accepted as the specific safety demands of the movement involves strict control of the numbers of children and leaders accommodated in each case.



The Love in a simple gift

I have always been encouraged by our combined parish response to the annual Shoe Box Appeal. That appeal, under the name Operation Christmas Child, has been a significant and clearly visible part of our outreach programme since the year 2000 AD, and it is heart-warming to know that we are part of a large and well established world-wide mission effort.

It would be good to think that we could contribute about one hundred boxes to this year's appeal. We just about reached that figure last year, and in 2016 our total ran to 126.

The mission of Operation Christmas Child is to show the love of God in a tangible way to needy and suffering children around the world and, together with the local Church world-wide, to share the good news of the real message of Christmas.

It is a sobering thought that the children who receive these boxes will probably get nothing else this Christmas. Our boxes offer Christmas joy and, at the same time, help to meet the critical needs of the many innocent child victims of war, poverty, famine, disease and natural disaster.


BUT that's not all. In many parts of the world, wherever it is possible, the children receiving the boxes are told the Christmas story and introduced to the Christian faith. I once heard this whole outreach effort referred to as the biggest Sunday School in the world.

So just how big is this outreach effort? Well, last year four lorries were loaded with shoe boxes from Northern Ireland. One of them (containing our 100 boxes) went to Ukraine. Another lorry went to Romania and the other two travelled to Belarus. Of course we are just a small part of the overall programme. In fact the total number of gift filled shoe boxes sent from Northern Ireland was 37,462.

And there's more! The total from the whole of the United Kingdom was 678,942 and - hold your breath - the total number of shoe boxes distributed world-wide was a staggering 11 Million. In other words, the love of God and the joy of Christmas has touched millions of young lives through the power of a simple gift.

It is our enduring privilege to be a part of it.

Sadly that hope faded within weeks, and she slipped away at Marie Curie.

The church family knew Edwina as a regular worshipper, a tireless worker, a faithful friend and a valued member of the Mothers' Union. We remember in prayer Edwina's sisters, daughter Claire with David and little Jorja, son Christopher with Helen, and Raymond.

Organ

Arriving just in time for a Harvest Wedding and the Annual Harvest Services, a new organ produced by Viscount Classical Organa Ltd and installed by Jeffers Music of Co Cork, was well received by the congregation at Carryduff.

The instrument features an array of sounds and stops which promise an excellent background for both formal and contemporary worship in the church building.

Dean Geoff Wilson, of Dromore Cathedral, dedicated the instrument to the glory of God as a token of thanksgiving for mothers and all they mean to us. We thank those who donated towards the cost of our new instrument.

Some of the Harvest flowers were displayed this year in delightful arrangements which could then be given out - without any rearrangement - to various parishioners and friends. We thank those who created these on the Friday and then distributed them on the Monday.

Lantern

Killaney's Harvest, likewise, began with a dedication. This time the Lantern in the Porch was dedicated by the rector in memory of Barry Finlay. Barry was a much admired member of the local community in Boardmills and Downpatrick, where he worked as a solicitor. His devotion to our church was a blessing to all of us and his sudden death is still remembered. The Lantern is made of glass with three lights which greatly improve the welcome given to worshippers as they enter the building.

The Harvest was doubly special with people attending for the first time in what seemed like a best ever Harvest congregation, as well as the very tasteful traditional decorations in the church. From the flax at the door and the turf on the turf barrow to the bread and grapes on the Communion Table, each window and pew spoke of the glory of God's gifts at the Harvest.

We thank all who provided and presented the floral gifts and those who created and served the Harvest Tea. After a slight delay everyone was able to return home safe and well, by the end of the day.

Harvest Appeals

Both parishes are undertaking some painting, and Harvest Appeals were issued for both. It is too early to report final figures but we appreciate all that has been given so far, and encourage those who want their church buildings to look their best to continue their generous support. The repair and painting of the exteriors of windows of Killaney will be started soon, as will the interior painting of St. Ignatius'.
