I haven't done it yet, as I write this, but I will have answers by the time you read this.

It is not too late to start.

These and all our intentions may have been turned upside down as we engage with this unnamed "war", but at best they are only delayed or postponed, not totally frustrated. The challenge in the world of distractions is to direct our gaze at the One who created the world, to turn to the One who gives us each day to use for the best, and to trust the One who gave his life "to forgive us our trespasses".

Today is a new day, a fresh start; whether we did well yesterday or last month or last year, God can turn us around as we yield our lives to him.

It is not too late - for you reading this - to start, but one day the opportunity will have passed! Stephen

Olo Diocese, South Sudan

Linda Abwa reports on a recent conversation with Bishop Tandema Obed Andrew, of Olo Diocese, South Sudan.

Two years ago Bishop Tandema explained the generalised fear that gripped his people: "attempts made to heal have not been enough." A strategy of trauma healing commenced, supported by parish links in Ireland. So far, 300 people have been able to attend the workshops.

"Participants had time to express their anger. There was an atmosphere of forgiving those who have died and those who looted property. They understand that life can be so difficult and hard at times but that doesn't mean the end has come.

Participants expressed their happiness to friends of the Diocese who have committed themselves to supporting the three phases of the trauma counselling and healing conference in Olo Diocese."

This time, participants were also given C19 awareness training and a gift of soap to take home with them.

We thank Linda for continuing to keep us in touch with Olo.

STOP PRESS: for the first time in ten years Stephen received an email from Bishop Tandema as this page is being written. The communications between rural Olo and the outside world is virtually non-existent. The Bishop needs to travel for several hours by rough road on a motor-cycle to get to a location which has internet. In his email he said:

"We wish vou all God's blessings and prosperous new 2021, after the difficult times of COVID19 and economic hardships. I am very grateful to meet with you in CMSI zoom meetina."

I hope that the good parishioners of Killaney and Carryduff will rise to the

challenge to make transport and communication easier for our brothers and sisters in Olo Diocese.

Mission Fund 2021

Killaney Parish Vestry responds to needs expressed from sermons by visiting preachers, news from mission agencies, and TV news. This process benefits from the keenness of members of the parish and vestry who encourage the vestry to use resources in this way. We thank you for your vigilance. Appeals are sometimes raised and often a simple allocation from funds is made. A separate collection for Bishop's appeal is normally collected, though not in 2020.

Carryduff Parish Vestry launched a Mission Fund many years ago to help parishioners give regularly to causes outside the parish. At the end of the year this fund was used to support the specific causes identified at the start of the year. General funds were also used for urgent needs which arose during the year. A separate collection for Bishop's appeal is normally collected though not in 2020.

The Mission Fund in 2020 has been used to support the following agencies and missions, using a formula to divide them fairly. 2021 will follow approximately the same pattern.

Small Acts of love

The consequences of the Covid 19 virus, and all our attempts to deal with them, have brought a few relevant New Testament observations to the foreground. One which comes readily to mind is an observation in the gospel record of John about loneliness.

Quoting the words of Jesus about the coming of the Holy Spirit he writes ".....I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you.....because I live, you also will live.....(John 14 v.18-19)."

Our collective experience has made it very clear that loneliness is, indeed, a major and widespread issue throughout this pandemic. Many of us have become aware of it to some degree; and there is no doubt that we all know of others who have been – and continue to be – significantly affected by loneliness, anxiety and feelings of isolation.

There is an imperative here to which we ought to respond. Even doing something as basic as making a telephone call, sending a card or calling briefly at the door could mean a great deal to someone who feels isolated or anxious, even abandoned.

Such simple acts can be greatly welcomed as expressions of sympathetic interest; even better if we do them humbly as members of the wider Church community. Indeed, in this simple way we would be in tune with the words of St. Peter: "....live in harmony with one another; be sympathetic, love as brothers, be compassionate and humble (1 Peter 3 v.8)."

All of this was very apparent in the Archbishop of Canterbury's five minute televised New Year message on 1 January. On that occasion he was filmed during a visit to St. Thomas' hospital – his local hospital – to offer assistance to a much over stretched hospital Chaplain.

We saw him in protective gear in both Covid and regular wards, engaging in moments of warmth with several patients. He emphasised how important it could be to just sit with someone, letting them know that they are not alone. Further, he invited all of us to be generous with comforting words and "small acts of love."

It's only a short step from there to come to realise that we are deeply connected to one another, and that we can all have a shared hope. As the Archbishop said, there is no doubt that Jesus cared about people in this way. He is our peerless example; and by both following Him and trusting Him we, and those whom we try to support, may come to recognise that "the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus (Philippians 4 v.7)."

In conclusion I readily acknowledge that all these thoughts came to mind simply by giving the Archbishop of Canterbury a mere five minutes of my time on New Year's Day. **Denis Carson**

Christmas Services


A much restricted worship calendar made our usual Christmas gatherings in the church very small affairs. Because of the prevailing health concerns, many faithful parishioners chose to avoid mixing when crowds might have been present and this ensured there were very few attending. Confirmation 2021

This year we hope to hold a service of confirmation in our parishes. Adults and young people who are interested should **contact Stephen in the next few days**, say by 7th February, to indicate they are considering confirmation.

What is confirmation?

If you . .

- determine that you wish to express a commitment to serving God in the life of the church OR
- reach an age where you can understand that you need to affirm the vows of baptism made for you when you were small OR
- you have made a personal commitment to Christ and wish to affirm it publicly OR
- .you have come back to faith

.... then you should consider taking part in a confirmation service.

This year, as well as inviting baptised young people to get confirmed, we encourage any member of the congregations who has (quietly) rededicated their life to Jesus, to take part in the Renewal of Vows which is at the heart of the service.

The service will probably be held after the summer break to give a chance for normality to return, at least in part. The bishop suggests that candidates for confirmation be adults having reached a minimum of 14 years of age, though I will also consider those who have reached the age of 13 by the date of the service.

Valentine's Day

What do you think of when the date is 14th February? Is it just another day, a painful anniversary or Valentine's Day, also called Saint Valentine's Day or the feast of Saint Valentine? It originated as a western Christian feast day honouring one or two early Christian martyrs named Saint Valentine and is recognised as a significant cultural, religious and commercial celebration of romance and love in many regions of the world. So, if you think of it as a day of love and romance, do you, if single, send a card and hope to receive one and maybe flowers or chocolates, or, if you are married or in a relationship, do you cherish a similar hope?.

Indulge me, if you will, and fast forward to 14th February 2021 and the postman puts a card through your letterbox. You are intrigued as you pick it up because on the envelope it just says, to "Whosoever", and the envelope holds no other clue as to who it is from. So you open it and yes it is a Valentine's card covered in verses and they all have one theme, "Love". You start to read them, "I love you with an everlasting love..... a love that is perpetual, unending and eternal", "I created you, I knit you together in your mother's womb.... you are fearfully and wonderfully made".

You think to yourself, these are not the usual "roses are red, violets are blue, sugar is sweet, and so are you "verses you normally read on a Valentine's card, and so you read on, "Nothing can separate you from my love". You open the card again to look for clues as to who the sender is and are immediately drawn to the artwork of a faceless man with a blood-stained forehead, hands, side and feet with arms outstretched as far as they can be. The caption below reads, "I love you this much". Turning to the back of the card you read, "Behold I stand at the door and knock, if anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in".

I know that what I have described is fictional but the verses quoted are not. They are all from the greatest book ever written and still the world's best seller, and yet there are many who have never read it! Just like a Valentine's card which you open and read, you need to open your life to receive the greatest love of all, "God's Love" - a love that is patient, kind, does not envy, does not boast, is not proud; a love that does not dishonour others, is not self-seeking; a love that is not easily angered, keeps no record of wrong, and does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It is a love that always protects, always trusts, always hopes and always perseveres: a love that never fails. He, who is Love, is gently knocking on your heart's door! Will you let Him in? That book, the bible, "God's love story", which is gathering dust on many a shelf, is well worth a read.

He chose to be buried at Killaney after attending a family funeral there last year, and it was a privilege to give thanks to God for his life and faith as our small numbers gathered in the beautiful setting of St Andrew's. He was a good friend to have, and to those who knew him, he was a true gentleman of the utmost integrity and grace.

We extend our sympathy to his wife Louise, their children Arthur and Emma, his father and brothers, and the entire King and Hutton family circles, both here and in England.

Bishop David's Lent Series

Hand me a trowel This Lent, please join Bishop David for a series of daily reflections in Nehemiah. The diocese will be sharing a short film online every day from Ash Wednesday, 17 February to Palm Sunday, 28 March.

Bishop David explains why he has named the series, "Hand me a trowel".

"My father was a farmer and not a builder, but as a young boy I remember him rolling up his sleeves and doing a lot of building around the farm. I would be hanging around at the foot of a ladder as my Dad was building, and he would shout down the ladder to me, 'Hand me a trowel.'

"That's the sort of picture we have in the Book of Nehemiah. Everybody's involved in the work of building. They may not actually be builders, but they roll up their sleeves and they're involved in this important work of building a people for God.

"Hand me a trowel.' I think God is saying this to us in the Church today. God wants us to be those who have an open hand and open hearts to work for his kingdom and to build a Church that is strong and healthy for these days.

"We need to be getting ready for a season of building and rebuilding. As we all get vaccinated and, hopefully, emerge back out into our churches and into the world to live for Christ, our prayer to God should be, 'Lord, hand me a trowel. I want to be one of your workers, help me to be one of your builders.'



Giving During Lockdown

We are deeply grateful in both parishes for those who have continued to give to church funds during months when we have been unable to meet. You have done this by storing up your weekly donations, writing a cheque to cover weeks you have missed church, and by donating using standing orders to parish funds.

However, there has been a shortfall in income. By way of example, in Carryduff our FWO was down £6000, loose collection by about $\pounds 1100$ and Mission fund giving by $\pounds 800$. A similar proportional shortfall could be reported for Killaney.

The Select Vestry at Carryduff have asked us to reproduce the bank account details to help you give to either or both funds. We use this opportunity to give Killaney details too though no request has come from the Killaney Vestry at this time.

World Day of Prayer

Friday 5 March



The familiar service booklets for the annual World Day of Prayer service have been shared with us in KandCd. The reason? The service is not taking place locally this year because of the current pandemic, but, rather, it can be watched online as it takes place in a number of venues which can safely host them. For those unable to take part remotely, the order of service will be able to give them a taste of the theme developed by the people of Vanuatu.

"Building a Strong Foundation" is the theme, and the idea is drawn from the need in this South Pacific island group to protect buildings and agriculture from the repeated storms which continue to over-run these islands. Situated 1100 miles to the East of Australia they have suffered from major Cyclone events, "Pam" in 2015 and, the latest in 2020, another called "Cyclone Harold".

Hymns like "My hope is built on nothing less" focus on the foundation, while "The day thou gavest" reminds us that Vanuatu is one of the first countries to enter each new day and each new year. "The sun that bids us rest is waking our friends beneath the western sky"

Each year offerings are received at the services. The monies go to support the WDP Movement internationally, the Office and its staff in Tunbridge Wells, the production of the following year's service materials and the organisation of conferences during the year. In addition, generous grants are allocated to support Christian Literature Societies, eg. Bible Society, Christian Educational Projects and global projects which come within the Charity Commission's guidelines.
