A Damp Squib.

I never, repeat, never, called a firework a squib. There were Bangers, Catherine Wheels, Roman Candles, and, of course, Rockets, but never Squibs. But I know a damp squib whenever I see one.

We had booked the main assembly hall at Lisburn Tech for a community event to celebrate something or other. We had advertised the event on posters and in letters to various groups. We had even arranged for chairs to be set out to accommodate the 100-200 people we expected to attend. I will not say no-one came, but almost nobody was there, apart from the organising committee. That was definitely a damp squib. (BTW it was 40+ years ago!)

Talking of fireworks... Before the days of health and safety, when we all took enormous risks with matches and "squibs", it often happened that a firework was lit, it was called lighting the touch paper, and, after a few moments, nothing happened, no flame, no bang, no sparks. The wise people (all older) told us to stand back, and we waited sometimes for several minutes until we could be absolutely sure the touch paper had gone out. Then the match was struck again and before we had a chance to escape the rocket or whatever had exploded into life.

A little bit of dampness had spoiled the effect, reduced the enjoyment and exposed us to a risk we had not anticipated. Disappointment followed by a threatened disaster!

As the church seeks to awaken after the months of reviving hibernation, we can be threatened by damp squibs among us; the people who are so overwhelmed with fear or anxiety that they can see no light at the end of the long tunnel. I hope you and I will be spared from becoming those people, or being surrounded by such people. Managed risk is what life has always been about, and we need to face up to a level of uncertainty with a bit of hope within.

We have tried as a parish to be "ahead of the game", as our parishes were the first to hold a drive-in service in the diocese, as we opened both churches for services within weeks of permission being given, as we began soft singing behind masks as soon as it was possible, and as we ventured to celebrate communion "in both kinds" in preparation for a long term change in communion etiquette, which we anticipate.

Is it perfect? No. Is it completely safe? No. Is it the best we can do? Probably not.

But the damp squib would have put off drive-ins for a few months, held back on in-person services until now, and certainly would have had no thought of holding any sort of communion service. Let us be wise and brave, loving and bold, trusting and trying, as we emerge from hibernation in September and onwards. Let us give God glory.

In the absence of any small group study or prayer meeting, Stephen has decided to begin a short series of events - while restrictions remain in place - including contributions from other members of the parish.

It will take the form of a talk on a theme from the bible, including some major topics that a short Sunday morning service cannot handle. Please bring a bible with you, a notebook or tablet for notes, and an open heart as to what God may wish to say to you.

The first series will take place in St Ignatius' Church, which is well served by media, and will start at 7:00 pm and end before 8:00 pm.

Sunday School - Carryduff

Following the successful relaunch of activities in June, we hope to resume weekly Sunday School from 5 September. We thank those who have undertaken to create a roster of leaders so that we get a good start to the season. An outline programme has been formed and teachers will guide the children through materials, designed and produced in our own diocese by Julie in the Diocesan Office.

A similar programme to that organized for Carryduff will resume in Killaney on Sundays when our weekly activity gets started. We do not yet have a date for this, but hope to announce it soon. Climate Sunday 5th September

Sunday 5th September is being designated Climate Sunday, ahead of the UN's climate change conference, COP26, in Glasgow during November. How should we approach the challenge of climate change?

We have damaged God's creation: God delights in His creation: 'God saw all that He had made, and it was very good.' (Genesis 1:31). However, we have damaged this world and impacted people, created in His image. The burning of oil or gas and cutting down forests is increasing the concentration of greenhouse gases like carbon dioxide that trap heat in the Earth's atmosphere. The global average temperature could increase by 1.5°C in 2030, resulting in significant damage to our planet. Already, increasing temperatures are melting ice caps, raising sea-levels, changing rainfall patterns and creating extreme climate events. It's the 70% of the world's poorest population who are being impacted most!

Hope is found in Jesus: He has an intimate knowledge of the workings of creation.

'For in Him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through Him and for Him. He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together.' (Colossians 1:16,17).

Our hope for the future lies in what Jesus has done and continues to do in the world. He is the one who sustains creation and will bring everything to completion.

An invitation to respond: Simple everyday actions can help to sustain our planet, including recycling of waste, energy saving and changes in our lifestyle and diet to help the planet. We can fix our eyes on Jesus, as we pray for our world, for our world leaders, gathering in Glasgow, asking that they may reach a good agreement for the future of our world.

Parishes and congregations all over our nation are marking this day in an effort to encourage prayerful reflection on the state of our planet and the need for people in all walks of life to take a fresh look at how we are treating God's world.

Services in Killaney and Carryduff are marking the day.

Slavery still exists because traffickers and abusers can freely exploit people living in poverty. This is possible when police, judges and other officials are not equipped to enforce the laws. Woke and Welcome

A strange new word has come in to common use recently. Lots of people and, in particular, media pundits are taking about being woke. It also seems that many younger people have adopted this word. So what does it mean?

In simple terms it is a new slang expression that has become a byword for social awareness, injustice and racial equality. As such, its emergence into mainstream language is closely associated with the Black Lives Matter (BLM) issue. It urges us to develop a greater sense of welcome and fairness towards people with whom we are not entirely familiar. The word "woke" was officially added to the Oxford Dictionary in June 2017. It literally means "to be awake." The BLM movement has brought to our attention a need to wake up to social inequalities. We are urged to stay woke.

It is, indeed, a wake up call and, even more tellingly, a prompt to do and be as the Christian faith clearly proclaims. We have always been directed to reach out to our neighbours both near and far; to be kindly and fairly disposed towards all people irrespective of race, colour, background or social standing.

When viewed in this way it is entirely clear that this is what Jesus urged us all to do. The gospel record of John quotes Jesus as saying "My command is this. Love each other as I have loved you......(John 15 v.12)." Then He goes on to say "This is my command. Love each other (John 15 v.17)."

There are a great many further references in the New Testament to this crucial and inescapable element of our faith. Among them three that come readily to mind are:

- 1. "If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal (1 Corinthians 13 v.1)."
- 2. "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you (Ephesians 4 v.32)."
- 3. "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: To look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world (James 1 v. 27)."

All these texts point us unarguably in a very definite direction. The word "woke" may not have been in vogue in New Testament times. However, it is perfectly clear that we, who claim the Christian faith, need to wake up – to be woke – to the racial and social inequalities that are everywhere around us. It is merely a new word breathing fresh life into an important issue which has always been there.

The Church urges us to be welcoming and to stay woke.

Church Cleaning

We are grateful to members of the vestry and organisations at Carryduff who, recently, have been assisting in keeping church and halls clean in line with Covid Guidelines, which are in effect at the moment.

The Select Vestry is seeking to regularise the process of cleaning the church and hall buildings by employing a "service" to do so. If any member of the parish, or the community, wishes to volunteer to serve in this way, with an allowance, please contact the churchwardens in the first instance.

When suitable options are available, a decision making process will take place. Key to the role is Saturday work, as the church and halls are used extensively on a Friday Night, and need to be ready for Sunday Worship, Sunday School, and activities starting on Monday. We have been seeking commercial firms to manage this process but are open to other suggestions.

Road Works

We thank the team from Frazer Homes and their contractors for the mannerly and careful way in which they have sought to develop the road scheme around the church grounds in Carryduff. Among the tasks they have undertaken and plan to accomplish, affecting us, have been:

- 1. The removal of two trees at the Traffic Lights on the Comber Road as their roots would have been compromised by the necessary preparations for the road widening.
- 2. The replacement of the fifty(?) year old surrounding wall with a new brick wall and some fencing for both the rectory and church surrounds.
- 3. The provision of new (improved) water main connections to enhance the supply to both the church and the rectory, which were previously supplied by a much slower connection.
- 4. The resurfacing of part of the driveway to the rectory, which has been damaged by the heavy vehicles involved in the work.
- 5. The provision of new ground cover and trees on banking between the new wall and the church grounds.
- 6. Partial re-alignment of the Comber Road entrance to the car park.

Farewell: The Big Tree

Looking at the rings on the large pine which commanded the corner of Comber Road and Saintfield Road revealed its relatively young age. 64-70 rings indicate that it was probably growing from the time the church hall was built in 1954. For most of us it has "always been there" but actually, its size was due to a fast growing tree, not its mature age.

We hope that the sadness we feel for its departure is compensated for a little by the security its absence brings to the church building, and the much more open look to the external East Wall of the Church.

Flying bishop



The pilot was silent for a moment. Finally he stammered, "So, what you're telling me, is, you're NOT my flight instructor?"




