A year and a bit ago we imagined that "everything would be back to normal" by Christmas. A second Christmas is almost upon us, and yet ... normal it is not! Hopefully though, we have adjusted enough of our expectations to make the best of an imperfect festive season.



It makes me think of when Mary and Joseph were told the unexpected news that she would bear a child, to be known as the Son of God. Life would never be normal again. Politics then broke in, as an emergency measure to force every citizen to travel to their family's ancient hometown made a quiet birth at home impossible for Mary. National tensions then arose as foreign dignitaries appeared in Bethlehem and created a whole storm of controversy, dragging in Herod the local king. Threatened murder then drove the new parents to flee as refugees for a season in Egypt.

Dangers, untravelled paths, international tensions, competition for attention from leaders who were upset . . .it all sounds a little like the world of 2020-2021.

A lesson we can learn from Mary and from Joseph is their willingness to obey what they perceived to be God's will for them: "And Mary said 'Let it be to me according to your word" and "When Joseph woke from his sleep he did what the Lord commanded him."

We probably do not need the sort of visions and dreams Mary and Joseph were afforded to discover God's will for them. But we do need open ears and eyes to hear and see what God teaches us in his word and through his people.

The caution of this last year has been suffocating at times, but it has not choked the life out of our community. The limitations of this episode have reminded us of how important to us are our relationships with one another and with the church community. The proffered aids to survival in all this have strengthened the Christian conviction that we are never self-sufficient, but need divine help daily.

We enter the season of the Nativity of our Lord with hope stirred once more, and our longing for Christ to rule in our land and lives all the more deeply felt.

May he be present in your homes and hearts as you love one another and worship him this Christmas tide.

Christmas Communions

It is wonderful when disappointment turns to joy, and we were delighted that last year's Christmas Eve Communion at Carryduff, rescheduled at 8:00 pm last year to enable cleaning to happen between services, turned out to be as popular a time as ever. For that reason we will celebrate our joy together at the same time this year.

Home Communions are still unfortunately restricted, but where suitable precautions are able to be put in place, without diminishing the sensitivity of the service, we will try to arrange them. This may be due to serious illness or simply the length of time since we have been able to share together. Get in touch with me 028 9081 2342. Indicating for whom the communion visit is requested.

On Christmas Day at Killaney we have a family service including a Holy Communion celebration at 9:30 am. As I have to be at Carryduff at 10:30 it will be a short service overall. Children may like to bring a small gift they have received. . . .

Church Communion Services at Christmas

It has been wonderful to watch how parishioners of St Andrew's and St Ignatius' have willingly and quietly accepted the necessary adjustments to the process of receiving communion at the churches in recent months. This process will probably continue through Christmas and into the New Year at least. There are two significant changes. Our diocese has instructed us to offer consecrated wine in separate glasses. While some churches have used juice and wafer in repacked pouches, this did not seem to me to be in adherence to the principle of consecrating wine and then distributing it. The remedy was to obtain shot glasses (10-15ml) and pour consecrated wine into them before making them available for communicants to lift and drink the wine immediately, or to take them back to drink the wine whilst seated in their pews. The assistance of the wardens and readers in this novel process has been appreciated all round.

Many of you make an annual trip to come to communion at Christmas-time, and I want to assure you that with careful queuing, followed by an unhurried reception of bread (via a wafer) and wine (via the little glasses), we seek to make your gathering around the Lord's Table as meaningful as possible.

For any who are still uncomfortable with the slightly larger numbers at main services (60-75 in Carryduff and 20-35 in Killaney), midweek and early communions are also on the calendar where numbers are smaller.

Malachi



Buy them books


Buy your children some books for Christmas. It seems that more books in your home in childhood can help stave off dementia in later life, according to a recent study.

It found that children who are exposed to the written word from a young age, form more resilience against degenerative processes which can lead to Alzheimer's.

Nurturing our brain in our early years boosts our 'cognitive reserves', as intellectually stimulating activities like reading create extra connections in the brain. That acts as a long-term buffer against cognitive decline in later life.

The study was done at the School of Public Health at the University of Haifa in Israel.







Strength in Weakness!

In the second of his two letters to the fledgling church community in Corinth, the apostle Paul makes some quite striking observations. We become aware of the personal cost of his missionary endeavours. He writes of hardship and suffering but, above all, of his unshakeable faith.

To put this in context, we are in the early years of the Christian church. The faith community in Corinth (and elsewhere) is small, insecure and seeking to survive in a largely dark pagan society within a world dominated by Roman conquest. Yet Paul urges the emerging Christian community in Corinth to be filled with the Holy Spirit, and to shine as lights – to be strong in their weakness.

In the circumstances of the first Century Mediterranean region this is a bold and courageous challenge. Why, we might well ask, should anybody believe in something – Christian faith – that cannot be seen or touched or proved? In propagating it Paul, himself, had experienced considerable difficulties including imprisonment and physical pain.

All this had tested him severely. Yet he had maintained his faith. Thus he writes: "To keep me from being conceited... there was given to me a thorn in my flesh, a messenger of Satan, to torment me (2 Cor 12 v.7)." What is this "thorn in the flesh" to which he refers? He may well have been alluding to some physical weakness or, perhaps, to his brutal experiences of imprisonment. However, he came to accept that it was God's means to keep him humble. He tells the Corinthians that he had pleaded three times with the Lord "to take it away from me....." Yet there was no response! The really crucial issue is that the message from the Lord was: "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness (2 Cor 12 v.9)."

This is an astounding revelation. Paul accepted it – the power of faith and the success of his missionary effort was not, in the long run, anything to do with the influence of Paul himself. With conspicuous humility he writes: "That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong (2 Cor 12 v. 10)."

Paul's personal grit and resourcefulness has demonstrated, not only to the emerging church community in Corinth, but to Christian communities ever since, the concept and the wonder of strength in weakness. It is a great lesson for each and every one of us – and it was brought firmly to the front of my mind by the experience of being admitted to hospital in severe pain a few weeks ago. Hopefully all is now well again, but it is as nothing in comparison to Paul's brutal experience as set out in his message to the Corinthians.

On a more seasonal note, we might acknowledge that the essence of strength in weakness is captured by the influence of a child born to a humble mother in a stable in Bethlehem.

Advent: I JUST CAN'T WAIT

Waiting is not popular in our culture, when so much can be obtained simply at the press of a button! Advent, when we wait for the coming of Christmas, is also an opportunity to learn what it means to be waiting for the promised return of Jesus. He says: 'It's like a man going away: he leaves his house and puts his servants in charge, each with their assigned task, and tells the one at the door to keep watch. Therefore, keep watch because you do not know when the owner of the house will come back' (Mark 13:34-35).

We live between Jesus' first and second comings and this parable reminds us of the need to watch and wait, as disciples living faithfully for Him. It reminds us of two kinds of waiting: passive and active. Imagine you're at the railway station, awaiting the arrival of a train. On the platform a man is asleep, as he thinks there is plenty of time before the train arrives. He is passively waiting. There is also a small boy on the platform who is excited about the train coming. He can't sit still and constantly looks down the track to see if the train is coming. He is actively waiting, for he expects the train to arrive at any moment.

Advent gives us a choice: how will we wait for Jesus' coming? Passive waiting doesn't require much attention on our part. We can live our Christian life pre-occupied with our own concerns, rather than looking to God. However, active waiting involves an eager expectation, as we await Jesus' return or simply look to him coming to us today. All we want is to be found faithful as His disciples. There is nothing more important than being ready to meet our Master!

Following our Memorial Services in the last month you may find these words helpful. They are written by someone who recently lost their wife. . . .

When someone you loved is dead

That it helps to talk about your loss and the person you have lost. Sharing helps you to put things together in your mind, and is healing in itself.

Don't be afraid of pain, and don't anaesthetise it or avoid it – acknowledge it, face it, and you will heal more quickly.

That crying is normal, even for men, and it is a healing part of the grief process. Don't be afraid of this, even in public.

It may surprise you, to discover which people draw near to you in your grief, and who steps away. Appreciate those who come closer, without judging those who hold back.

Not everything people say to you about grief and your response will be helpful. Decide for yourself what is important for you, and let the rest go.

That grief may expose some of your inner fault-lines, but don't be afraid of this – learning more about yourself is a gift that comes with grieving.

No-one grieves perfectly. Following the death of your loved one, you will make mistakes, bad choices, and errors of judgement. This is normal, so forgive yourself.

That hope will rise again within you. The human spirit, in combination with God's grace, has its own remarkable resilience.

Don't be afraid to live again. God has a good purpose for you, and a plan for your life.

That your faith is an asset, not a liability. When you are tempted to be angry with God, remember that He is an ever-present help in time of need. Lean on Him.

That you have a part to play in your grief journey, so don't be passive and allow it to overwhelm you – begin to do what you can to rebuild your life.

Be kind

Try to be kind to each other this Christmas: many of us could do with some gentle encouragement. Depression and anxiety have risen by more than a quarter since the pandemic, according to the first global estimate of Covid's impact on mental health last year. The reduced interaction of people, the increase in isolation, coupled by high infection rates, were the cause of more than 125 million extra cases of depression and anxiety disorders in 2020.

The findings, published in the Lancet, reported that globally, depressive disorders have increased by 28 per cent, and anxiety by 26 per cent.

Be kind to your neighbour

This Christmas, why not make an extra effort to be kind to your neighbours? It seems that neighbourly distrust has grown more than fivefold since the summer of 2020, with one in five of us now saying that relations in our community have soured.

On the plus side, there are still 25 per cent of us who report greater trust in our neighbourhoods. But on the debit side, now 22 per cent of us, up from just 4 per cent, have reported a deterioration. The research was carried out at University College London (UCL), who found that one in five of us now feel less cohesive with our neighbours, feeling that we have fewer shared values with them. As one researcher put it, "Much has changed over the last 18 months, with limits to our freedom, how we interact with each other, and changes to how we shop and travel. Perhaps these restrictions have caused some to feel less satisfied with life in their community."



Three simple tips for staying argument free in your family this Christmas

For many of us, the lure of a 'perfect' Christmas lurks in our subconscious. Advertisers play into this desire for serving the best food, the home looking super cosy and festive and everyone wonderfully 'suited and booted'.

The reality of Christmas is, of course, always different. It often involves anxiety, tensions and arguments in between the stockings and the crackers.

The pressures may be even greater after last year's Christmas in lockdown and the threat of shortages this year. So here are three simple tips to help you avoid some of the stress and have a happier time as a family this Christmas.

Firstly, share - and maybe reset - some of your expectations with family members. It's so easy to go on autopilot, and play the usual roles at Christmas, whatever they look like in your family. This often leaves one person - often Mum - carrying the burden of it all.

Instead, sit down for a few minutes with your other half and talk about your expectations. What would both of you like your celebration to be, and what don't you both want to happen? Having this kind of simple conversation gets a lot into the open and will enable you to plan together and share ideas too.

Secondly, be proactive. If you're the one who generally organises and does the shopping, wrapping, cooking etc, be proactive and ask for help and support. You may have to accept that others do things differently, and maybe not up to your standards, but a team effort gets everyone involved as well as spreading the load (even sulky teens will usually do their bit when asked).

If you're the partner of the chief organiser, then be proactive in offering support. Tip: instead of saying: "Do you need any help?" (Where the answer is often "I'm ok...") Ask: "What can I do to help today?"

Thirdly, deal with the little things before they become big things. Our natural ways of handling conflict often work against us, and instead make conflict worse. Conflict avoiders will try to avoid awkward conversations and get prickly and defensive. The rhinos will charge in and shout. Whether you're more like a hedgehog or rhino in an argument, try instead to nip problems in the bud by recognising your own rising feelings and finding positive solutions together: "I'm feeling upset about ...what can we do differently?"


