Something

I have been enjoying the church family lately, even more than usual, as a small number of people have started to attend for the first time, or have resumed attendance after a long break.

Are you one of them? Let me tell you why your attendance makes me smile.



When you attend a church service with us for the first time, you have been (quietly) declaring that you feel a need for **something**, possibly for the love of God, and maybe the delight of sharing in simple worship with others. There is **something** about the light through the old or new windows, and the brightness of the people who worship with you, that is doing you good. It is great to be accepted by others without having to put on a show.

When you come back a second time, after your first visit, it means that **something** about the people around you has made you feel welcome, with a smile, a word of welcome or an invitation to join them for refreshments. Whether in Killaney Hall before or after worship, or in the church hall at Carryduff, people in the parish have made you warmly welcome. And that's **something**!

When you keep coming back and then bring a partner or family member with you, you are sharing **something** of the attraction of God's Son and the grace of his offer of forgiveness. You may not be "there" yet, and still have a long way to go in your spiritual journey towards personal faith, but gathering with other people on that journey, week by week, gives you the encouragement to go on.

Having you there gives me hope that our gatherings in Carryduff and Killaney are worth promoting around the homes of those who have not started to attend yet. As I picture it, if you want to start coming, then whatever that **something** is, it might help others start too.

Of the 230 homes that receive this magazine by email or through a letterboxyours is just one of them - less than half are represented in church any week. Let's change that together.

Maybe you want to give thanks to "something" for a blessing you have enjoyed, maybe you are struggling and are looking for "something" that will help you, or maybe you have discovered that the something you are missing is God in your life.

Come for friendship, familiarity, food, fun, festivals, funerals or whatever: but ask God to open your heart to faith in his Son as well. Jesus is at the heart of our church, and knowing him is the goal of our common life together. As we shared at a recent funeral service: "I want to know Christ" Philippians 3:10, and many of those in the church around you, want you to know him too.

Justin works full-time for Street Soccer which organises free, weekly football sessions for the homeless or unemployed, and also those who suffer from addiction and mental health issues.

Justin wanted to start a Christian Charity that would minister to the homeless in Belfast and "**Street Ministries Belfast**" was born. The group is still in its infancy but has just secured premises in Botanic Avenue, where Justin plans to run a drop in centre which will provide hot food and spare clothing, along with a weekly Bible Study and a Church meeting.

To fund this work, Justin has organised a bag pack at Tescos and is also gathering second-hand furniture to resell. If you have any spare furniture

Ballynahinch Foodbank Report

We recently received a letter of thanks from Rosemary Logan at the foodbank to the parishioners of Killaney, including this report:

B allynahinch Foodbank continues to meet the call on its services, thanks to the generosity of many individuals, churches, schools, sports clubs and associations in the Ballynahinch area. This support provided food that enabled us to help those in need.



During 2022 -

- 3,741 people sought the help of the Foodbank, an increase of 25% on 2021
- 1,116 food parcels were distributed, an increase of 27% on 2021
- The food parcels provided 33,669 meals, an increase of 25% on 2021

The estimated retail value of food parcels, toiletries, household items and baby products in 2022 was £70,000. The increases experienced are due to the higher cost of living caused by increasing world food and energy prices, and the greater number of families seeking help in these difficult times.

The Foodbank is most grateful to all the people and all the organisations who have supported the Foodbank with contributions and donations in 2022. Many families have been blessed by their generosity.

Easter Vestry Notices

Each parish's annual meeting takes place to elect people willing to serve

The revision of General Vestry membership is drawing to a close. Church attenders are encouraged to ensure they are signed up to enable them to serve their parish in three ways:

- 1. To serve as Trustees as members of the Select Vestry
- 2. To take an active part in the election of those Trustees
- 3. To identify themselves with their parish formally This year is a triennial year which means we will also be looking for four people to serve on the Diocesan Synod, and four as Parochial Nominators. (3 from Carryduff and 1 from Killaney)

In Carryduff our Honorary Treasurer has indicated his intention to retire after the meeting, so one of the first items of business at that vestry will be to identify a suitable person with the competence to carry on the work. In Acts we read how a number of people were chosen to serve the church in similar practical ways and they were chosen by the church based on the following criteria:

> Acts 6:3 (NIV (UK 2011)): Brothers and sisters, choose seven men from among you who are known to be full of the Spirit and wisdom. We will turn this responsibility over to them.

Please be daring enough to trust God for his help as you offer yourself to serve in this role, or in any of the 'offices' of the church. When you see us gathered for vestry business you will know that we do not make any great claims for ourselves, but we ask God to help us in the work to which we were appointed.

Carryduff Easter Vestry: Sunday 2nd April at St Ignatius' Church at 10:00 am, beginning with an act of worship to which all are invited.

Killaney Easter Vestry: Sunday 26th **March** at St Andrew's Church at 12:00 pm, beginning with worship.

Only those on the vestry list may vote at the meetings but everyone can attend.

Mothering Sunday

M othering Sunday is a day of mixed emotions. For many it's a happy, joyous day, but for others it's one of pain and grief. A day to celebrate love, while acknowledging those who cannot have children or have lost them and those who have no relationship with their mother.

In the dying moments of His life, Jesus honoured Mary His mother by showing her love and care. He entrusted His mother to John's protection: 'When Jesus saw His mother there, and the disciple whom He loved standing nearby, He said to her, 'Woman, here is your son,' and to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.' From that time on, this disciple took her into his home.' (John 19:26,27). While affirming the importance of mothers, Jesus reminds us that the love we show on Mothering Sunday is just a token of our continuous appreciation of them.

Jesus also creates a new way of being family, marking the beginnings of the church. In the past, people would go back to their 'mother' church on this Sunday, to acknowledge its importance in their lives. Jesus invites us into this new family of love and mutual belonging, where we can find a place, irrespective of our own family circumstances.

Church is not always an easy place to be, because we are shaped by our own experience of mothering. We may find it hard to give or receive love without ourselves getting in the way. However, God's help is available to change things, 'because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us.' (Romans 5:5)

Sick Visiting

Request for help from 'patients' and families

Often no word of sickness or hospital admission reaches the ears of the folks at church until long after the sick person has returned home. This is sometimes the result of misplaced kindness on the part of the person (or family) concerned. They say, "I didn't want to bother the minister."

However, "the minister" wants to offer help and prayers for those who are sick, and, if he doesn't know they are ill, how can he do so?

Here is a plan for 2023. If you are admitted to hospital, even for one night, please tell the nursing staff who admit you that you "would like to see the Hospital Chaplain". If you are out of hospital before he or she calls, then let Stephen know directly. In fact, it is always best to let Stephen know directly when you are admitted to hospital. It saves him a lot of time if he knows that several parishioners are in a specific hospital at the same time, and he can visit everyone in the one day.

Toast and Marmalade

There are a great many things in everyday life that we tend to take for granted. I mean unspectacular things like, for example, warm water direct from the tap, or a tube of toothpaste, or a breakfast slice of toast and marmalade. We use these things every day and, generally speaking, think nothing of them.

We are so much more fortunate than we sometimes realise. There are a great many people the world over, including some quite close to home, who simply do not have these things.

Imagine our contacts in South Sudan, or the beleaguered people of Ukraine or the Democratic Republic of Congo, the everyday folk of Afghanistan or, even more tragically, the survivors of the unspeakably dreadful earthquake in Syria and eastern Turkey.

To all of these people poverty – even starvation – is an everyday reality. What would any of them give for a kitchen sink with flowing hot water or a slice of toast and marmalade? These might be almost unimaginable luxuries.

The same goes for the many communities, world-wide, to whom we have sought to send Christmas gifts through Operation Christmas Child. This is a remarkable outreach programme. I gather that last Christmas over 10.5 Million shoe box gifts found their way to disadvantaged children. That number included over 250,000 from the UK. We can't be entirely sure about the precise destination of our shoe boxes. However, we have been advised that shoe box gifts from the UK were received in several countries, including Albania, Belarus, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Moldova and Ukraine – all places where warm tap water, toothpaste and slices of toast and marmalade could not be guaranteed.

This is just one example of the kind of generosity of substance and of spirit which our Christian faith sets before us. We are called upon to reach out to those in need – even to those closer to home in, for example, east Belfast – to be generous in spirit, to give of our substance, and to do so with humility and mercy.

A quotation from the gospel record of Luke comes readily to mind. In proclaiming the birth of the Saviour the text states: ".......I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people (Luke 2 v.10)."

It might also be worth noting the words of the minor prophet, Micah, where he states "...And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God (Micah 6 v.8)."

Such things are all implicit in our response to our Christian profession. Isn't that something to ponder at breakfast time over a slice of toast and marmalade?

Issues with Bible-Reading

Where do I start? Why would I do that?

In recent conversations in your homes I have heard a repeated concern that people find it difficult to read their bibles in a meaningful way, and many (if not most) hardly ever read a bible, except for lesson reading in church.

Now, imagine that people undertaking a marathon were not eating food as they trained, or that a concert musician resumed her occasional practice only on the night before their concert. It would be madness and very poor preparation for the challenge ahead, wouldn't it?

What training schedule or nourishment do we undertake in our lifelong battle to be good disciples of Jesus? None? Occasional church attendance? We are very likely to fade - and fall away - if we do not seek strength from God regularly.

If you have a system of bible reading, please continue to follow it, and maybe consider one or two suggestions to help you keep going and, hopefully, gain more from the practice.

If you do not currently read the bible regularly, then please consider the following pattern to help you start. You may do this every week or every day but start slowly so as you are not tempted to give up. You need to choose a short reading and so find a focus verse as you progress. You may like to choose a verse or two from Matthew as a place to start: Matthew 11:28-30, Matthew 13:3-9, Matthew 13:44-46, Matthew 18:10-14.


- 1. Ask God: "Father, please help me understand what you are saying to me in your word today."
- 2. Read the short passage once, wait a moment and then read it again, pausing wherever there is a verse or a phrase which catches your attention.
- 3. Ask yourself why you noticed that phrase particularly. It may be because it gives you joy, or makes you pause for thought. Sometimes God is quietly challenging you to change something in your attitude or your actions.
- 4. If you did not notice any particular part to focus on, then ask God to help you learn from what you have read, and complete your daily prayers.

 Last thing at night? It is probably not the best time to do your ONLY prayer/reading, though it is good to end the day and start the day with a moment of prayer.



Remembering

The parish and community of Carryduff met in St Ignatius' Church on 3rd February to give thanks to God for **Mrs Jeannie Cotter**. Jeannie was born in 1923, almost 100 years ago, the youngest child of her parents James and Evelyn Thompson, and lived in the Docks Area of Belfast.

She worshipped at Sinclair Seaman's Church, nearby, where she and Amos Cotter were married on 10th September 1953, and almost made it to their fiftieth anniversary, but, regrettably, Amos died a few months before the day. They were blessed with the birth of six children, though sadly a daughter, Christine, died when under two years of age, and their last child, Andrew, died less than three months old.


Jeannie's four children and many more grandchildren were well-represented at her funeral. Jeannie and Amos had begun their married life in Aughandarragh, a townland near Saintfield, and early pictures display a delightfully happy little family in the fields around their tiny home. They were able to secure a house in Killynure Road here in Carryduff around 1960, and it has been the family home ever since.

Jeannie had worked in the London Mantle Warehouse, a ladies' fashion shop in Castle Street, Belfast. She worked long past retirement age, only stepping down when the company changed hands.

She played 10-pin bowling at a time, went for light exercise at the Lough Moss Centre, attended the Friendship Group and the Connect Group, which meet in Carryduff Presbyterian Church, and the Mothers' Union, the parish bible study, indoor bowls, and virtually every church service taking place in St Ignatius' Church.

She was intensely loyal and greatly admired Her Majesty, the Late Queen Elizabeth, and in many ways resembled her heroine, as she ruled from her chair, surrounded by royal memorabilia. Her last attendance as a worshipper here was to celebrate Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. It was a fitting moment and now both have gone to be with the Lord whom they loved and sought to serve amidst the ups and downs of life.

We express our sympathies to all whom she has left behind, and pray that they would know the comfort of Christ's presence and peace in the years ahead.
