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Dear Friends

May I take this opportunity in print to wish you and yours the blessings of the season, and to express my wish that you encounter the gift of Christ's Nativity in a special way this year?

In Gifts? Give yourself a gift of time to read your (new) bible. Yes, I'm serious. I try, yet occasionally fail, to read

my bible every day and I am genuinely surprised how time after time a word, sentence or paragraph makes me pause to think. "I never noticed that!" "I'd forgotten that!" "I think I really needed to read that today!" Those were my thoughts about my readings on some of the days of the week when I wrote this.

Perhaps you will encounter God's gift as you read his word.

In Singing? Music achieves nothing, really, as far as productivity goes, as far as essential services go, or as far as the basic needs of life are concerned. Yet for many people, and perhaps you this year, the seemingly useless process of singing in private or in public, releases a desire that God has placed within us to express emotions, including joy. "I really must join a choir" is often quickly followed by "Would anyone have me?"

Perhaps you will join with the angels as you sing to worship our Lord

In Praying? I wish I could simply say "I enjoy great freedom in prayer . ." (I wish you did too.) But it is always qualified by ". . .sometimes." The positive in that is that God occasionally loosens our tongues in prayer, when we are in the habit of trying to pray. There is a wonderful prayer of blessing that is sometimes used at seasonal services, and I will finish with it in my letter. I am not often able to kneel with a congregation and hear the pastoral leader pray it over us all. But I try to both say it - and receive it - at the same time.

Perhaps you will experience God answering this prayer as you make time for him this Christmas and New Year.

May the joy of the angels, the eagerness of the shepherds, the perseverance of the wise men, the obedience of Joseph and Mary, and the peace of the Christ child be yours this Christmas; and the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit,

be among you and remain with you always. Amen.



Learning from Colossians

The Parishes' Bible Study resumes on Tuesday 16th January with 'tea' at 7:50 pm. We are continuing to read and reflect on the Letter of Paul to the Church at Colossae. Everyone is welcome.

Currently, we can all fit into the rectory sitting room, but we would love to move to somewhere more spacious if needed!

To enable more people to benefit from this event in the parishes, we will be reading selected passages, from Colossians, at the Midweek Communions in January. One of these services takes place in Killaney: on Wednesday 31st January at 10:00 am



At this time of year – this Advent season – we tend to look forward eagerly, even expectantly, to the coming of Christmas.

That first Christmas time, with the Christ child lying in a manger, was quite amazing, in that it was gentle, humble and largely unannounced. Yet it has become probably the most celebrated birthday in history.

However, alongside our joyful annual celebration there has emerged an everincreasing amount of secular extravagance. Arguably this has only a notional connection with the coming into this world of the child born to be our redeemer.

We are told in Matthew's account of the gospel story that wise men came from the east – possibly quite some distance – to visit and to worship this newborn child (Matthew 2 v.1-2). Popular convention imagines that they might have been kings, but the regal posturing of kings did not appear to be in their nature. In essence, they come across as quietly respectful men. They evidently had some element of foresight about who and what they had come to celebrate. I am inclined to think of them as both humble and wise – and perhaps these two priceless qualities often go together.

A new age had come; and now, in our current noticeably secular world, there is an ever-increasing need to present the life of faith in a way that appeals to a rising generation. Arguably this is a challenge which might require us to be both humble and wise.

A new age? Does this Advent season not also prompt thoughts of a second Advent – a second coming? It was a question that the disciples put to Jesus near the end of His earthly ministry. This was their response to some striking comments Jesus made about the "signs of the end of the age" (see Matthew 24 v.4-8; Mark 13 v.3-8). In these texts, Jesus stresses that "many will come in my name, claiming 'I am he' and will deceive many."

He further stated: ".....Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be earthquakes in various places, and famines. These are the beginning of birth-pains (Mark 13 v.8)."

We might argue that these words imagine quite a lot about what has been happening across the world during the present year. Yet, we are advised not to jump to conclusions. The "New Age" will come at a time that we cannot know. In the meantime, we, in the active Christian community, have both the joy of the approaching Christmas season and the commission to ensure that "the gospel must first be preached to all nations (Mark 13 v.10)."

Arguably we need to be both active and prepared and, like those first gentile visitors to the manger, we should try to be humble and wise.

Vestry Revision and Easter Vestry 2024

There is no harm in thinking ahead, so we give you notice of an important process beginning at the end of January in both our parishes. It is called the Revision of the General Vestry Lists.

While you can be a member, in a loose sense, of our parishes just by coming along, there is a legal status which gives a person permission to take part in the government of the local church. Those who contribute to their parish and have reached the age of 18 years, and do not belong to any other parish, may sign up to be a member of the General Vestry. The list of members is revised each February, and names added (who have signed up) and removed (who are no longer residents or are no longer accustomed attenders as non-residents).

Existing 'accustomed' members need to ensure that they have attended in the last three months, and have contributed in a way which can be recorded, while 'resident' members must have contributed to funds. Every so often we go into this in even greater detail than normal and 2024 is such a year.



We were saddened to hear of the death of the Ven Billy Neill, who served as archdeacon of the Diocese of Dromore when rector of Dromore Cathedral. Billy and his wife Anne had a wonderful spirituality which God used in them to encourage faith and witness in the people they served. They enjoyed a long retirement in Cairnshill. His funeral took place in St John's Orangefield on Wednesday 22 November. We extend our sympathies to Mrs Anne Neill and all who mourn his passing.

Remembering

The funeral of **Mr Gordon Shaw** took place at McBriar's Funeral Home on Thursday 9 November. Gordon was a former parishioner of St Ignatius' Church. He and his wife, Geraldine, were proprietors of Pat's newsagent at Beechill for some 20 years, following his career as chief engineer with BP in Northern Ireland.

At the Thanksgiving Service a tribute to his long life was paid by his son, Gibson, and included humorous references to various episodes of his life. When young, he was a "paperweight" boxer, and after moving to London to seek his fortune, he became a merchant seaman. While there he developed his skills as he studied marine engineering with the navy. Gordon's generous heart and great range of skills made him a great source of help and conversation. In recent years he was ill, and tribute was paid by the family to all those who cared for him, and the support of all those present in Saintfield. He was buried at Killaney after the service. We sympathise with Geraldine, Gibson and Justin, their loved ones, children and grandchildren on their sad loss.

A large family attendance met in St. Andrew's, Killaney for the funeral of **Mrs Martha Murphy**, known as **Muriel**, on Saturday 11 November. Muriel (nee Eva) was 88 years of age upon her death. She was the eldest of six children from Belfast, and is survived by them and her three children, Mandy, Michelle and Gregory, seven grandchildren, and seven great grandchildren.

She and her late husband, Billy, owned several shops and Carryduff residents will remember Murphy's Shop on the Hillsborough Road, which, along with shops at times in Moneyreagh and Crossnacreevy, they owned and managed with Greg and Mandy. She loved being out and about and was never a shrinking violet in company, enjoying going out several nights of the week to enjoy competitions. She was, however, not very adventurous with her palette, and the best of European cuisine had nothing to compare with the eggs, chips and peas she truly loved! One of her proudest moments was her attendance at Hillsborough Castle as the only member of the ancillary staff at the police station where she worked to see the RUC presented with the George Cross.
