Dear Friends

I hope you had a wise and godly mother. I am glad to say that such was my experience. One particularly wise approach she had in life was her way of dealing with worry.

This year I am using 'Streams in the Desert' as part of my daily time with God, and I came across some wisdom that my mother knew and adopted, possibly from following the same daily programme. (She had and used a copy of this book when I was a child.)



If you are anything like me, God forbid, then you sometimes start worrying about things long ahead of their arrival. Like the father who is worried about paying for the wedding of his two-year-old daughter . . that sort of thing. The question posed on 6 January asks "Why does God not give us grace to deal with these future worries?"

The answer is clear, he will give you grace to deal with the issue when it is time, when it arrives. In the meantime, we trust God for today's challenges.

To quote:

GOD does not open paths for us in advance of our coming. He does not promise help before help is needed. He does not remove obstacles out of our way before we reach them. Yet when we are on the edge of our need, God's hand is stretched out.

Many people forget this, and are forever worrying about difficulties which they foresee in the future. They expect that God is going to make the way plain and open before them, miles and miles ahead; whereas He has promised to do it only step by step as they may need. You must get to the waters and into their floods before you can claim the promise. Many people dread death, and lament that they have not "dying grace." Of course, they will not have dying grace when they are in good health, in the midst of life's duties, with death far in advance. Why should they have it then? Grace for duty is what they need then, living grace; then dying grace when they come to die.—J. R. M.

My mum would sometimes deflect any concern - that she didn't seem to be taking an upcoming issue seriously - by reminding us. "I decided not to worry about that yet."

What issues are you and I wasting energy and focus on, which are still not in the picture? What worry could you hand over to God, to ask for his help when it truly becomes necessary to face it? How could your heart and mind be released from unprofitable worries if only we dared to trust God?

May God give you and me wisdom to know which worries to handle today with God's help, and which ones to leave for God's providence in the future.

Don't forget to remember God is good, all the time.

Lenten Valentines

This month both Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fall on the same day! The link between the two can be summed up in terms of the nature of real love! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, focuses on learning to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives. This is what Jesus found when He was led into the desert by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan. (Luke 4:1-13).

Jesus was tempted to turn stones into bread. Yet loving God and His word comes before satisfying physical desires.

Satan tempted Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is an expression of loving God and serving Him.

Finally, He was tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Real love for God does not put Him to the test, but wants to obey Him.

Lent also teaches us how to live out the love of God in practical ways, as we follow Jesus in the way of the Cross. We see this clearly demonstrated in the life and death of Saint Valentine.

Valentine was a Christian who demonstrated the importance of sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and that he was martyred on 14th February. Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives, and so had attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married couples in secret, which is why today we celebrate our love for one another on his day.

In trying to understand the meaning of her revelations from God, Julian of Norwich found:

'What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing? Know it well, love was His meaning.'

Food shortages are 'likely' this year

You might find some supermarket shelves empty in the coming months. A combination of global conflicts, climate change and transportation issues are making it harder for food producers to get their products out of the field and onto your plate. And as at the end of last month (January), it got even more complicated, with the introduction of new checks on the goods coming from the EU into the UK. Professor Chris Elliott of Queen's University Belfast is a food security expert. He explains: "It'll be about affordability but also availability, and the likelihood of empty shelves, particularly fresh produce shelves, in 2024 is alarmingly high."

Professor Elliott said: "We are virtually totally dependent on other countries for most of our fresh produce, our fruit and our vegetables. We were reasonably self-sufficient in dairy, we were reasonably self-sufficient in poultry and eggs. But that's also on the decline now, as a result of the collapse of some sectors of the food industry in the UK."

According to the gov.uk website, just under half of the actual food on our plates is produced within the UK.

Tim Burns, the recently appointed youth worker in the diocese, is leading a project, called the Suitcase Project, to assist new arrivals in settling into Northern Ireland. The diocese of Down and Dromore is supporting him in this project.

Tim will be speaking at our churches in February to inform us about the project, and we look forward to his visit to us. If you have questions to address (which he does not answer in his talk), there will be opportunities afterwards to ask Tim in person. Both our parishes are continually on the lookout for worthwhile projects, both locally and internationally, which we may support, and the suitcase project seems to fill both criteria. We may be helping people in Northern Ireland, but they are not from Northern Ireland.



Wednesday evenings at 7:30 pm in Carryduff

One of our greatest weaknesses as parishes, I believe, is the gathering together of people who will pray from their hearts.

Many of us pray at the end of each day, but few of us dare to open our hearts or our mouths to pray with others. Most of us pray along with the service leaders



Our Lent Services this year take as their theme "The Essence of Prayer". We will draw themes from the Lord's prayer to help us understand how Jesus wants us to pray. We will also hear some specific challenges to help each of us, preacher and participant alike, to grow in sharing times of prayer. The service will look and feel as normal, but after the closing hymn and blessing, a short time of shared prayer will take place for the "one or two" who wish to stay.

The Parishes' Bible Study will take a break from their study of Colossians during Lent to allow members to attend on Wednesday evening without cramming their diaries! The last meeting will be on Shrove Tuesday (13 February) when pancakes will be on offer in the rectory at 7.50 pm!

Our midweek communions will continue with the appointed readings for the day. A midweek lunch is planned for the end of the month on 28th February, beginning with worship at 11:30 am.





A Call to Serve

For several years now I have usually set time aside to watch the Archbishop of Canterbury's five-minute televised sound bite on the morning of New Year's Day. He is very watchable and always has something useful and of the moment to say – and, in a few words, manages to convey a constructive blend of Christian outlook and contemporary relevance.

His main theme on this occasion was our Christian call to service. In this vein, he recalled the Coronation of King Charles III - on 6 May – noting in particular the emphatic theme in the Coronation Service of "living out the element of serving." Certainly, no one could doubt the essence of humble service to the public – both at home and abroad – which characterised the long reign of the late Queen Elizabeth.


This year the Archbishop's broadcast came from RAF Brize Norton. This gave him the opportunity to emphasise the value of service not only to those around us, but to people in distress or difficult circumstances overseas. They are all our neighbours and, significantly, during the past year several RAF groups have been actively deployed abroad to assist people affected by "the horrors and traumas of war", and to deliver much-needed aid to communities torn apart by natural disasters. In some cases, it has cost them their lives.

All this, inevitably, has a consequential impact on the relatives of service personnel and of dedicated volunteers (e.g. from Christian Aid or the Red Cross) risking their lives abroad – in war zones and in areas where natural disasters have caused loneliness, homelessness and significant loss of life. Besides, in many cases, people have had to start life again as refugees. They both need and deserve our help. The Archbishop's pertinent observations stem from our Christian calling "not to be served, but to serve." Clearly, and inevitably, our genuine commitment to the Christian Faith is better expressed in deeds than in words.

This is an inescapable part of our calling, and Jesus is the prime example. He stood alongside those who were lonely or distressed or despised by comfortable society. He did not come to be served, but to serve humbly – and He directed all of us to do the same. In brief, everyone is our neighbour and we are called to be kind to one another.

In this context, it is worth noting Jesus' observation that "if anyone loves me, he will obey my teaching (John 14 v.23)." We need to be seen to do this – to be serving others – not only in our own neighbourhoods but everywhere.

The weather was cold, crisp and clear as the community around Killaney church gathered to light the **Christmas Tree** in front of the church on Sunday 3rd December. A team from the parish had gathered earlier in the week to array the church with its annual display. There was a crib, foliage, candles and flowers, along with the indoor tree, and the doors were open for our guests to enjoy the lovely scene. After singing carols - led in seasonal flair by members of the NI Brass Ensemble - Alison and Johnny Gray pressed the button to light the community decorations and foliage, and a delightful tree to the delight of all present. Refreshments followed the short service and the children's gifts and adult treats were a welcome conclusion to the evening. Thank you to Gareth for the gazebo, the NI Brass Ensemble for the

Scouts Carol Service. The first carol service of the church year was provided by the members of the Scouts Organisation that meets in Carryduff Parish Hall. It was great to have the advanced planning done by the troop to enable two dramatic presentations to be performed, first by the Scout Troop, then by the Venture Scouts. Readings were given by two cubs, a venture scout and Brian Crothers, who leads the group. Carols were led by our organist and his wife.We appreciate the efforts made by the Parents' Association to round off the evening with refreshments in the hall.

Nativity: lovely surprise. With 110 people of all ages present, the J Club organised and presented A "Pop-up Nativity" in St Ignatius' Church on 17th Dec. Led by Vera Lowry and Jenny Montgomery, the cast (which was made up of several Marys, a handful of Josephs, various shepherds, sheep, wise men and one Baby - a cute little doll in this case) followed the guidance of the narrators to replay the scenes of the Nativity Story. The congregation contributed by their singing, sound effects and prayerful support of the message. Stephen reminded everyone that as Jesus was received by the people of his day, who trusted him, we too must receive him as Lord of our lives and trust him with our futures too. Blessed are those who die in the Lord. They rest from their labours.

Mrs Betty Hamilton MBE was born Betty Mitchell, and grew up, with her younger brother Tom, in Euston St, Belfast.

After doing well at school, with a great head for figures, she began work in a jewellery business in Belfast. Later, Betty went into business for herself, buying and selling good quality jewellery to shops and wholesalers. She was also employed in sales in Galen, Portadown, where she worked until her retirement.

She shared much of her life with her dearly loved husband Andy Hamilton, and they were married in McQuiston Memorial Church.

After several homes in Belfast, they moved to Ballygowan where she lived for 45 years. They attended St Ignatius' Church regularly some years ago.

As well as being a devoted aunt to their nephews and nieces, Betty took great interest in the Senior Citizens of her village. She and Andy took members of the Senior Citizens Club away on holidays, organised dances, and helped raise the funds to build the village hall. For this and her community work, she was presented with an MBE by the King, when he was Prince of Wales.

In June, Betty became a resident of Ringdufferin Care Home, and it was there she passed away from a heart attack. The family circle is indebted to the care home staff for all they did for Betty to make her comfortable. We extend our sympathies to her friends, to brother Tom, and to Betty and Andy's family circle.

Mrs June Beer was a familiar member of the congregation at St Ignatius' and an important member of the community in Moneyreagh. Her lovely character, generous support and quiet demeanour enabled her to build some lasting friendships in the parish and community.

June Roberts was born and reared in Ballyskeagh, and, following her marriage to her late husband Harry, moved to Castledona where their daughter Helen was born. From 1994 they resided in Moneyreagh. It was then she made her connection with Carryduff Parish, and it was here the family gathered to mourn Harry's death in 2017. After several years of diminished health, made more complicated by the need to protect herself from COVID, June had been unable to attend as regularly as she would have liked of late.

June was President of Moneyreagh WI on several occasions, and almost always a member of the committee, serving as Treasurer for a period as well. 
