
Killaney & Carryduff March 2024



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Dear Friends

I want to share with you my **concerns** and **hopes** for our parishes through the medium of this letter.

Many of you who have the opportunity to read this never come to worship, some through illness, of course, but many, through indifference to the mercies of God. I think that must rank as a **concern**! If we become people who no



longer want to thank God or cry out to God for help, then we have perhaps lost sight of him. To meet with others is a public declaration of our need of his help.

Lots of you **love** to come to church, and we are surrounded on Sundays by people who make this their top priority for the week, and others who make it one of their aims. I think that gives me **hope**! To live a balanced God-fearing life, is to plan our days and weeks to include what is important to God, and to us and our families, so that we can give ourselves wholeheartedly to our work and witness. To meet in the company of worshippers is a declaration that we require one another's support on the journey.

Everyone experiences these things at some stage in life, but we mustn't let that be enough to stop us using our God-given abilities in the church and community!

There are dozens of people across our churches who continue to look for ways to help, and who are unceasing in their prayers and support for our life in St Andrew's and St Ignatius' Churches. You give me **hope**! Your desire to see people comfortable and settled during their time at worship or in the halls is matched with your desire to honour God in the loving and compassionate way you do these things. This is a source of great joy for all who receive that ministry from you, and we are all indebted to you and our heavenly Father, for equipping you to serve.

We have come to the time of year when our vestries meet to nominate and elect office-bearers for the year ahead. I hope that you will appreciate how important your faithful service means to all of us, even if we sometimes forget to say thank you clearly enough! I look forward to seeing God equip you in your roles, and that we make him the priority in the way we serve one another and worship together.

SAMS Ireland

It was a cold damp February when two of us set off for Annaghmore Church Hall where Friday Night Live was held. A good number of supporters from both sides of the border filled the room and it was a delight to have two friends from Santiago in Chile, Marcos Zavala who is a volunteer working in



Derryvolgie Parish near Lisburn, and Rev Max Diaz who works mainly with students. It was he who gave the address in superb English.

The theme of the evening and for the year is:

'Rooted: Standing Firm, Spreading Hope'.

Everyone has a part to play, and everyone has to play their part.

The evening was taken up with snapshots of the seven countries where SAMS has an interest. Using short videos and reports, we heard how the local churches are growing and the problems they face.

One report highlighted Alex Deane's work in the vast dry area of the **Chaco in northern Argentina**. For 43 years Alex has worked with geologists and water engineers to provide much-needed water. To date, 85 wells have been dug, water is piped across the land, resulting in a doubling of harvests and the creation of employment. The improved quality of the food produced has resulted in better health and provided an income for families.

Down and Dromore diocese has established a link with the **Diocese of Santiago** in which new churches are being planted. We are learning from them and their commitment to the Scriptures and dependence on the Holy Spirit. It is hoped that an interchange between the churches of the two dioceses will bring mutual encouragement and growth.

The vicar of Saintfield Parish spoke about its vestry's decision to have a link with **El Redentor Church in La Paz in Bolivia**, where Pastor David is the leader. A long-term relationship is envisaged through 'face-to-face meetings and collaborative projects'.

Rev Max rounded off the evening with a few thoughts, based on Colossians 2:6,7. A sound bite summed up what he said - Walk well!

Suitcase Project

Imagine you were one of our ancestors in Ireland who was forced to flee this island by poverty, famine, or any of the violent phases which have taken place in our history. You become one of the millions of Irish emigrés to populate North

America, to work in the Liverpool dockyards, and help to build Victorian London.

In recent decades the tables have turned. The Celtic Tiger made Dublin the place to which new migrants made their way, and the renowned generosity of Ulster ensured new workers thronged to serve in our developing service industries as well. The incoming migrants often are seeking asylum, which adds further complications to their ability to settle in our community.

How would you feel if you were a Syrian, an Afghani, or a Ukrainian exile arriving with barely more than the clothes on your back and a few personal possessions to show for your life-time of education, labours and home?

The biblical narrative indicates that, from the earliest days, God calls his people to welcome newcomers into their society, and to integrate into new societies when they, themselves, were in exile. God wants the family of faith with Christ, the seed of Abraham, the father of faith, to bless the world.

The Suitcase Project has been set up by the Diocese of Down and Dromore to create a network of support and care for newcomers, and, maybe, the family they bring with them in their unplanned exile.

What is the extent of *The SUITCASE* Project?

The project aims to

- **Connect** with newcomers as individuals, offering them respect snd security as they enjoy a safe space offered to them.
- Assist people as they face cultural barriers and language difficulties, thus enabling them to access services on offer.
- **Share** the faith in Jesus Christ, which motivates the compassion which underlies the project, integrating people, where they are willing, to the message of the bible and community in the local church.
- **Equip** both members of churches to serve asylum seekers and refugees and to raise up volunteers to help with projects taking place.

Tim Burns (tim@thesuitcaseproject.org.uk) is developing and expanding this project as funds, supporters and prayer support build up. He is keen to hear from any who are willing to help in the project so that we become a diocese and a community of local churches who have the well-being of newcomers at their heart.

Emmanuel Hall in Roslyn Street in Belfast BT6 8JJ is the hub for the work and, already, English as a Foreign Language is being taught, conversational English gatherings are taking place, and liaison with the various government support agencies is being developed so they are in the best position to help.

The finance is being handled by the diocese and donations can be directed to the Diocesan Church-planting Fund, using the code **DOASR01** to ensure you are supporting this particular outreach of the diocese. The account details are

The Moravian Church and the Church of Ireland

I recently heard, in a conversation with a friend, of a new welcome development being introduced to the two churches in the headline.

For some years conversations have been going on between the Moravian Church and The Church Of Ireland to create a connection, which would reflect mutual respect, mutual shared ministries, and a willingness to work together for the sake of the gospel.

The Armagh agreement, as it is entitled, is being ratified at events held on Monday 18th March in Ballymena and Gracehill.

While this seems a little bit remote, since the nearest Moravian Church is some miles away from us in Killaney or Carryduff, it is a sign that the church which we love is open to conversations with, and connections to, yet another church. This is a good thing and it reflects the somewhat similar link we share with the Methodist Church.

The event in St Patrick's Ballymena, at 1:30 pm on 18th March, will involve ratifying by a service of worship, the principles agreed in the Armagh statement, that a properly ordained Moravian or Anglican minister, can fully conduct worship in churches of the alternative denomination. While the two churches will continue to function together, there is a tighter bond in pursuit of the glory of God being introduced.

Members of the Mothers' Union and friends have visited Gracehill in the past, a Moravian Settlement in Co Antrim. There are also churches in University Road Belfast, Cliftonville, Ballinderry and Kilwarlin.


Easter Lilies

17th March: St Patrick, beloved apostle to Ireland

St Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. If you've ever been in New York on St Patrick's Day, you'd think he was the patron saint of New York as well... the flamboyant parade is full of American/Irish razzmatazz.

It's all a far cry from the hard life of this 5th century humble Christian who became in time both bishop and apostle of Ireland. Patrick was born the son of a town councillor in the west of England, between the Severn and the Clyde. But as a young man he was captured by Irish pirates, kidnapped to Ireland, and reduced to slavery. He was made to tend his master's herds.

Desolate and despairing, Patrick turned to prayer. He found God was there for him, even in such desperate circumstances. He spent much time in prayer, and his faith grew and deepened, in contrast to his earlier years, when he "knew not the true God". Then, after six gruelling, lonely years he was told in a dream he would soon go to his own country. He either escaped or was freed, made his way to a port 200 miles away and eventually persuaded some sailors to take him with them away from Ireland.

After various adventures in other lands, including near-starvation, Patrick landed on English soil at last, and returned to his family. But he was much changed. He had enjoyed his life of plenty before; now he wanted to devote the rest of his life to Christ. Patrick received some form of training for the priesthood, but not the higher education he really wanted. But by 435, well-educated or not, Patrick was badly needed. Palladius' mission to the Irish had failed, and so the Pope sent Patrick back to the land of his slavery. He set up his see at Armagh and worked principally in the north. He urged the Irish to greater spirituality, set up a school, and made several missionary journeys.

Patrick's writings are the first literature certainly identified from the British Church. They reveal sincere simplicity and a deep pastoral care. He wanted to abolish paganism, idolatry, and was ready for imprisonment or death in the following of Christ.

Light the Beacons

St. Patrick's Day 17th March 2024 Services

At 7:30 pm in Carryduff and 8:30 pm in Killaney a short prayer service and beacon lighting event will be held inside and outside our churches.

The beacons will be lit by lanterns obtained from a special service on Saturday 16th March at Down Cathedral. Representatives from our parishes are invited to make their way forward during the service to receive oil to fuel the torches they will be given.

Fire pits (as yet to be sourced) will be lit to serve as beacons (weather permitting) outside the churches to symbolise the light of the Gospel being lit in parishes all around the diocese.

Bishop David writes:

Our annual St Patrick's Day celebrations are held in Saul and Down Cathedral on **Saturday 16th March**. The theme for 2024 is, *Light the Beacons*, and our speaker is The Rt Revd Jill Duff, Bishop of Lancaster. The preacher at Saul will be Revd Canon Bill Press and Revd David Legge will lead the Prayer Pilgrimage.

The day will follow the usual pattern culminating in the wreath laying at St Patrick's grave and a complimentary 'Picnic in the Pews'.

Our focus over this St Patrick's Day weekend is on praying for a rekindling of the fire of faith that Patrick lit in Ireland almost 1600 years ago. As part of this, I will light a symbolic fire at the end of the Festival Service and representatives from each church in the diocese will take a torch and a container of concentrated paraffin oil back to their church. Each church will in turn, light a beacon at a special prayer service on Sunday evening 17th March.

A fire should burn outside every one of our church buildings on that night. With beacons lit, we'll be asking God to light the fire of the gospel in Ireland and in that local church context once again.

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Greater than Fantastic

We are now in the season of Lent – that forty day period between Ash Wednesday and Easter Day – when we should, perhaps, think more deeply about the nature of our response to Christian faith.

A redemption has been won for each of us at immense personal cost. What words of genuine sincerity and gratitude might we use to acknowledge the blameless life, sacrificial death and resurrection of Jesus Christ? It was all on our behalf, and we would do well to recognise that Jesus (and everything that He did) was real. He was the absolute and only begotten Son of God; God in human form. Nevertheless, He was opposed by many self-important influential people, cruelly crucified - and yet rose from the dead within three days.

There is no fantasy about it. All of this really happened. These are amazing, verifiable, historical facts – an objective, visible sequence of events.

Then, after He had appeared in His resurrected body, He gave The Great Commission to His disciples to declare the message of personal salvation to all of us ever since. This, too, is historically verifiable.


It may seem controversial on my part to resist referring to all this as fantastic. This is simply the wrong word, and a word that has become greatly misused in everyday speech. Thus, for example, a few days ago I happened to watch one of the many cookery programmes currently on television. I wasn't really paying much attention to it but still couldn't avoid hearing the frequent use of a particular word. That word was "fantastic" and, in the course of a forty five minute programme, the presenter repeated it eleven times. The same thing happens in sports commentaries and in celebrity chat shows.

Of course it is nonsense. The word properly relates to fantasy i.e. something that is not based on a realistic character or setting. In short, through constant misuse, the word has become whimsical, ridiculously cheap – even meaningless. So, how could I describe the miracles of Jesus, which were truly amazing - or His Easter resurrection or His saving grace – as fantastic when, in modern popular speech, the same word is used to describe a deep pan pizza and a bottle of coke?

The distinguished contemporary Christian writer, John Stott, has a very clear view of the reality of Easter. He writes: "The resurrection, precisely because it was a decisive, public, visible act of God, within the material order, brings us firm assurance in an otherwise insecure world."

I wouldn't argue with Stott. To my mind, all of this goes well beyond anything that could be described as merely fantastic. I would be more than content to think of it as incredible, amazing, glorious and beyond comparison with anything else in human experience.

Annual Report for 2023

This is a draft of part of the Trustee's Report to be presented in March, 2024

Ministry

Throughout the year the parishes seek to provide a pastoral presence through the ministry of the rector, readers and volunteers. We pay tribute to Mrs Marlene Moore and Mr Keith Shaw, our diocesan readers and Mrs Jenny Montgomery and Mr Raymond Scott our Parish Readers. We thank all who read lessons, manage screens, welcome worshippers, serve refreshments and tidy the buildings after worship.

The Parish Magazine - CROSSROADS - is made freely available to all. It is published and printed from the church office and we are indebted to Mrs Jenny Eralp for its production. A version is added to the church website in easily readable pdf format. We thank all who contribute, edit, distribute and read the magazine.

Our services have been accompanied throughout the year by both Mr Brian and Mrs Helen Mulholland as they combine talents to worship God with us each Sunday. It has been great to have them on the team and to see a new organ donated buy several generous people, and then installed in St Andrew's. The Combined Carol Service at St Andrew's drew a large congregation from both parishes and the surrounding district.

During the year in Carryduff our new co-treasurers and the finance team have been developing the use of a new parish database. We look forward to its complete implementation in due course.

The parishes continued to donate food and essentials to support people in need: Carryduff donates to The Larder in Mersey Street while Killaney supported Ballynahinch Foodbank. Both parishes joined to fill over 100 shoe boxes with Christmas gifts for children overseas, as organised by Samaritan's Purse. We thank Mr Denis Carson who initiated and managed this process for many years.

Churches

Our two parishes follow different patterns of donations to local and external causes, seeking to support the international Christian community in its mission wherever it serves. To this end we support local charities and have donated funds to Olo Diocese to help them provide a mill to help local people grind meal safely adjacent to their homes, so avoiding a potentially perilous journey for the women of the community to prepare food for their families.

A diocesan programme enabled members of a SOMA team to spend a few days in our parishes in June, and we are indebted to them for their ministry so freely given to us. God uses ordinary people in wonderful ways, as they open their lives to his unique call upon them.

A visit from the leaders of the church in Olo, Bishop and Mrs Obed Andrew Tandema, was a highlight for us in 2023.

The Fundraising Team in Carryduff organised a number of events, including special refreshments after worship to mark the King's Coronation, and the Harvest, to enable funds to be raised for the Fabric Fund. A much anticipated visit by Belfast Community Gospel Choir was ably promoted and organised. We ask Mr Keith Shaw, who spearheads the fund rising group, to pass on the Trustee's thanks to members of his team inside and outside the vestry.

Church Halls and Property

Killaney has appointed a Hall Team to encourage more widespread use of the facility and we have been pleased to see a small number of groups in the community using this from time to time. We encourage more to apply.

Carryduff's halls are used 14 times per average week, and external groups from e.g. the diocese, use them from time to time. A choir trains in the church regularly.

The Bell Tower at Killaney has required some interior maintenance and the final repairs to windows have been completed. The weekly volunteer cleaning has enabled the building to be ever ready for use to assist in e.g. time of joy or sorrow. The graveyard path project reached a critical point at the end of the year and we anticipate extensive work taking place in the first part of 2024. This is for the safety, convenience and appearance of the graveyard for all users. The lighting in the church was making great demands on our electricity supply and all the lights in use have been replaced with more modern fittings and lower wattage bulbs. We are indebted to our wardens, glebe wardens and Hon secretary for managing these important projects.

In Carryduff the Fabric Fund is supported monthly by individual envelope donations allowing a significant start to be made on anticipated roof repairs. This will be a major item throughout 2024 and further ahead. A grant, to help survey the roofs, was organised by Mrs Jenny Montgomery for whose diligence we express our appreciation. We also value the efforts of our glebe wardens, Mr David Nevin and Mr Mark Rourke, as they manage and assist in routine and emergency maintenance. The diligence of both the vestry Property Committee and the Health and Safety group has ensured that any potential hazards are removed. We pay tribute to our member Mrs Joan Clayton for her H&S co-ordinating role.

Note to report:

With the exceptionally early dates of Easter Vestry Meetings this year, the vestries have not been able to approve and send any Financial Statements for auditing.

There are a number of legal assertions that the document above needs to declare, and these have been omitted from the brief excerpts from the final reports.

At the Easter Vestry meetings in March, this report will be referred to but not read in full. We hope the summary above is helpful.


Looking for the Resurrection

An old couple are driving down the motorway when the wife gets a call from their daughter. '*Mum, there's a car driving the wrong way down the motorway*!' The wife warns her husband that there is a lunatic on the motorway. Her husband, clutching the wheel in terror, replies: '*One lunatic? There are dozens of them, all headed straight for us!*' What we see is determined by our perspective on life.

In the Nicene Creed we say: 'We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.' In the gospel accounts of the Resurrection, there is a lot of looking and seeing. Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome went early to the tomb. They saw the stone rolled aside and inside the tomb a young man dressed in white said to them: 'Don't be alarmed. You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him...He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see Him' (Mark 16: 6,7).


Like the women, we would probably have been left '*trembling and bewildered*' by what we saw that morning. Had the body been taken? Was the young man an angel or deceiver? Was Jesus raised to life again, or was this an elaborate hoax?

Easter gives us a choice. We can approach life looking for disappointment, fear and despair. Or we can look for resurrection and find not just an empty tomb, but encounter the living Christ. He continues to meet us in our daily lives, bringing new hope, forgiveness of sin, healing and wholeness and the assurance of His presence through the darkest of times. God invites us to see our lives differently and look for Christ's resurrection life at work in our lives and the people around us.
