Dear Friends

Marriage Matters We live in an age where the nature of marriage has been challenged and distorted from the relationship that human history has always known.

The arrival of **no fault** divorce has turned the institution into no more than a simple contract. Each time a couple makes vows to one another nowadays, they are free to abandon them, without the need for any sense of having done more than having broken a tenancy or housing agreement as they walk away.

The change in the legal requirements for those taking part in a marriage ceremony to be one man and one woman has left many people confused and unsure, myself included, as they find it difficult to accept that a relationship between two people of the same sex is the equivalent of a relationship between two people of the two different sexes. While they now are of equal value in the eyes of the law, they are not identical in purpose, appearance and fulfilment of the teaching of the bible.

The continuing increase in importance of the marriage ceremony as an occasion for public displays of wealth, personal pride and excessive spending continues to undermine the attempts that ordinary people make “just to get married!” The promises are sometimes fully composed by the participants so that every marriage is whatever they choose it to be, rather than as extras on top of, or instead of,

*“to have and to hold from this day forward,
for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer,
in sickness, and in health, to love and to cherish
till death us do part, according to God’s holy law.”*

It is delightful when people have special words they want to say to one another on their wedding day, but if they are made to feel weak and uncreative because they can’t think of something uniquely powerful to say, then such freedom becomes a potential source of shame at the very heart of their vows.

There were words used in three instances in the bible, in the old testament and the new, which have guided the church’s teaching from the earliest days. They indicate that there is a leaving, a cleaving, and a physical union involved. We read in Matt 19:5 (Mark 10:7) Eph 5:31 and Gen 2:24 *That is why a man leaves his father and mother and is united to his wife, and they become one flesh.*

Marriage was initiated in the creation story, before the first man and woman fell into sin. As such, it is the closest relationship of God’s creatures to the fellowship the three-fold Godhead enjoys within himself.

As men and women negotiate the changing face of marriage, either embracing it as some do, or struggling with it as others understandably do, there is no greater declaration of the value of Christian marriage than for husbands to love and respect their wives, and for wives to respect and love their husbands. The sight of a united supportive man and woman growing older together through all of life’s ups and downs is a spectacle worth celebrating.

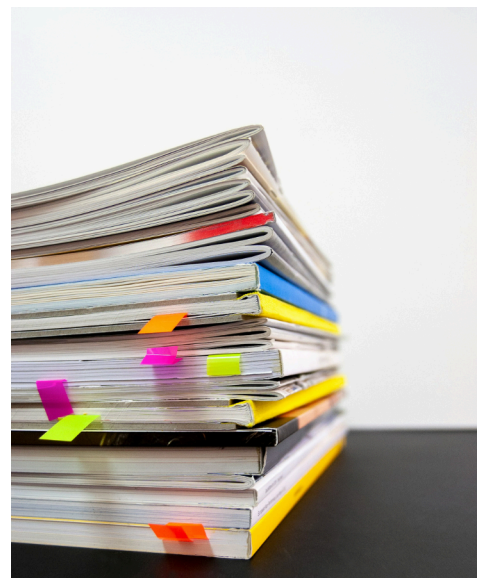

Just by Coincidence



This month's issue of Chemistry World (my second favourite monthly magazine after Crossroads) arrived in the post on Saturday 9 March. Of course I haven't been active as a chemist now for more years than I care to admit. However, I was intrigued by a short article featuring a global on-line collaboration (in effect a crowd sourcing exercise) between researchers in a serious attempt to develop an effective anti-viral strategy. Could this, I thought, be the way towards a pandemic-free future?

By coincidence the magazine arrived on the same day as the local Christian Aid supporter conference. I was not present at the conference, but gathered that some of the time was devoted to world wide efforts to address the impact of the Covid virus on impoverished communities. This, too, was a form of anti-viral strategy.

All of this struck me as an instructive example of the common search for truth shared (more often than is generally realised) by the Christian and the Scientific communities. Perhaps it is not always recognised that both the Christian faith and scientific endeavour are crucially influenced by – indeed depend on – verifiable truth.

On a lighter note I can't help but notice that an extraordinary range of coincidences have occurred in the present year.

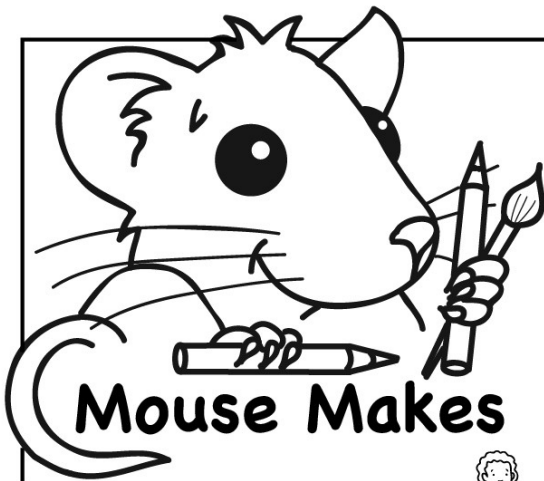
For example, Ash Wednesday coincided with Valentine's Day, and Easter Day this year was also the first day of British Summer Time: and that's not all. As far as I recall Passion Sunday (two weeks before Easter) coincided with St.Patrick's Day and Mothering Sunday (10 March) was also the first day of the Islamic season of Ramadan.

I wonder if there is anything currently unknown to me that might coincide with Ascension Day which, this year, is on Thursday 9 May.

All these unusual coincidences seem quite random – little more than an extraordinary distraction. However, the real and striking coincidence that resonates with me – prompted by the item in Chemistry World – is the shared understanding between genuine Christian faith and the physical sciences that everything should be underwritten by verifiable truth.

I rest my case.

Mrs Winnie Irvine neé Wiltshire, originally from Fivemiletown, Co Tyrone, died peacefully on 16th March at the Ulster Hospital with members of her loving family present with her in her last hours.

As a child she loved reading, a passion she learnt from her beloved dad. She could read a book in a day!

She met William Fred Irvine when she was 16 years old, and she and he were married four years later in 1952 at St John's Church, and celebrated their love with their reception at the Valley Hotel. She died aged 91 years, having shared 58 of those years with her much loved, late husband, Fred.

Fred initially worked at Taylor-Woods in Enniskillen so the young couple made their first home there, and Barbara, Nigel and Roger made the family complete.

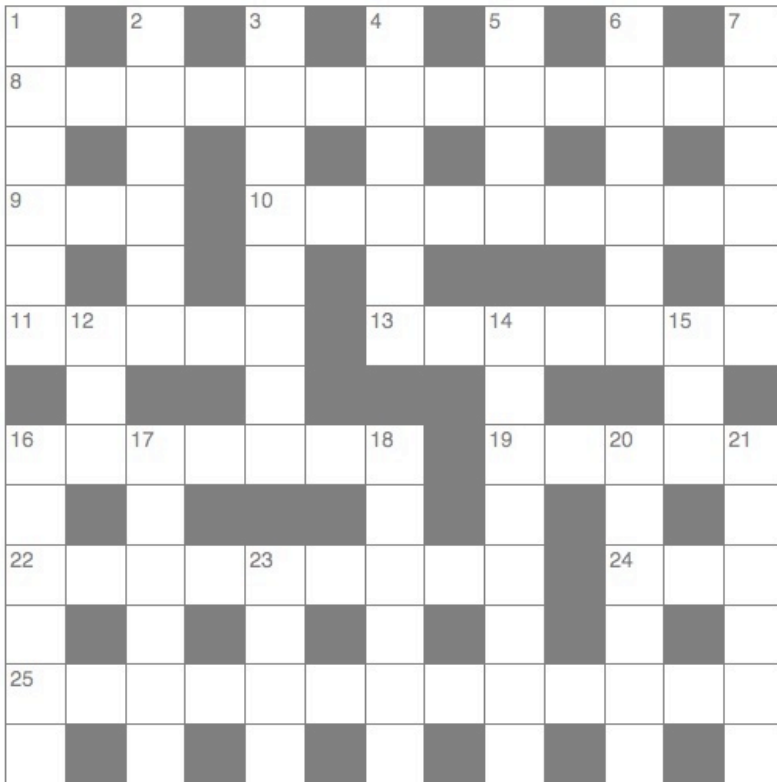
In 1966 they moved with his work to Belvoir in Belfast, then purchased their first home in Casaeldona. Hard work and enterprise had secured them this house, and in the early 1980's they moved to Knockbracken Crescent where she had lived ever since.

What defined Winnie most of all was her experience of the love of God when she came to faith in Jesus Christ as a 26 year old. She 'embraced the Lord' at that time, and she knew he had been leading her and Fred in their life ever after. She was happy to share her strong views, declared her trust in Christ, and told stories of his guiding hand over her life.

She was a faithful worshipper with an inspiring sense of the importance of worship in the life of a believer. She loved singing gospel hymns and embraced worship's true goal: to honour Almighty God.

We thank God for her, and ask for his help for her surviving family circle, for Roger, for Ben, Patrick, Anna, Alexander, Oliver, Oscar, Finn and Molly, for their life partners, and not forgetting her one great grandson, little Daniel.
