

It's Harvest Time!



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Stephen writes

First a sum: If Stephen has written a magazine letter ten times a year for 37 years, how many times has he sat down and asked himself: "What will I write this month? Answer 370? That is a lot of letters! Has he repeated himself? (That was a clue!) But I have never opened up an old magazine and copied an idea. I'd rather come up with a similar idea a second or third time and then approach it slightly differently.



I was reminded of this at Greenisland Parish Church's 70th Anniversary Service on 1st September. There on a display table were several compilations of magazines from my ten years there. It was a bit of a shock to see them bound; they were designed to serve a purpose for a month or two. Not to be on display 26 years later!

And yet, when I heard a few hours later that the church and hall were burning, I was fearful for their loss to the flames. Those were not just monthly advertising sheets, but records of baptisms and weddings, confirmations and funerals, sales of work and outreach events, and, in a word, people.

As I look afresh at the beautiful church building of St Andrew, and the stunning church building of St Ignatius, I realise how much these stones and blocks and pews and windows mean to all of us. More importantly, they represent places where people have come to seek God's blessing and forgiveness, and to offer him praise and prayer. The churches are only churches because the local Church meets there. God in his mercy has used those locations to bring hope and joy to people as they meet for worship and fellowship. They are worth protecting and preserving so future generations can do the same.

News reports immediately after the fire at Greenisland began to include the dreaded word **arson**, with all its accompanying sense of purposeful destruction and hatred. "Reasons" for this emerged on social media and in news outlets, with wild speculation associating the church's activities as provoking such an attack. I refused to promote such conspiracy, hoping that there was no truth in any of it. I was saddened to hear that the fire appeared to have been started deliberately in a bin near the hall, but strangely heartened to discover that those currently under suspicion of causing it were likely fooling around, or at least not imagining that their burning bin could possibly create the inferno that followed.

We heard the local minister say, after the suspects were identified, that the church was praying for the children. Their reaction was exemplary. I hope I could be so understanding, but I am not really surprised that they behaved in that way.

I discovered after the fire that some of the magazine journals had survived, despite water damage, and so the story of the people of Greenisland parish potentially lives on. We all wish them God's blessing as they face the uphill struggle that faces them, and seek his wisdom for how best to go forward. Pray for Issy Hawthorne-Steele and the parish family.

Carryduff Harvest Appeal

As you can read later in the magazine, Tim Burns of the Suitcase Project has expressed his thanks for the vestry's decision to support an "outside" cause this year with our Harvest Appeal.

Year by year, at least since I have been in Carryduff, we have donated food and flowers to decorate our church, and money to further some refurbishment or improvement of our church facilities. Your generosity to these appeals has enabled us, among other things, to upgrade toilets, redesign the kitchen, improve the



sound system in church and support the planned re-tiling of the church roof. That final challenge is likely to bear fruit early next year, provided the hoops we need to go through to do so are successfully overcome.

A wonderful change is taking place with this year's Harvest Appeal. The Suitcase Project, so named because people landing legally in our community often have little more than a suitcase, seeks to support the integration of newly arrived people in our society. The violent events of recent months show how vitally important it is that the Christian community is seen as a helping friend to these people, who have undergone so much trial in their homelands prior to reaching safety here.

We hope to have a short live update on the current work of the Suitcase Project during our Harvest Service, and this will be instead of a guest preacher. Why should you give to this appeal?

- "Do to others what you would have them do to you" (Matthew 7:12) so let's make people welcome.
- "I was a stranger, and you took me in" said Jesus, (Matthew 25:35) voicing a noble act of charity.
- "You are to love those who are foreigners, for you yourselves were foreigners in Egypt" instructed God to Moses in Deuteronomy 10:19

Please be generous to this one-off appeal, and help us as a church display that we can think of others first. Tim Burns, who coordinates the Suitcase Project, writes of our decision to support it with our Harvest Envelopes:

Thank you for your prayerful support and generous decision to give your Harvest
Thanksgiving Offering to The Suitcase Project. Our volunteers and I feel blessed and privileged to be supported in this way. It is our intention to use your gift in a variety of ways.

We will be starting Teaching English as a Foreign Language classes during the week. These will be free to those who want to develop their speaking and listening skills, and to learn to read and write English. We will be teaching people at different levels, and your gift will help purchase resources such as teaching materials, including online subscriptions, and teacher and student handbooks, and miscellaneous things like stationery.

We are also working on making the hall we use a more welcoming space. The money you have gifted will go towards paying for external and internal signage.

Confirmation Service

Killaney and Carryduff Parishes

On **Sunday 13th October at 7:00 pm** we hope to hold a Confirmation Service in St Ignatius' Church, led by Bishop David McClay. Three young people from Carryduff, and two from Killaney, are currently preparing for this.

This is a significant moment for the parishes, especially for those offering themselves for confirmation, as the congregations come together for worship, and witness (or reaffirm their own) baptismal vows being taken. Some parishioners may wish to use this event as a way of affirming their membership of either of our Church of Ireland parishes, especially if they have never done the like before. There is an invitation rather than pressure for you to do this. Those same parishioners may wish, also, to ask for a blessing from the bishop as part of the service.

The service is both formal in structure and relaxed in mood, as we seek God to equip us all by his Spirit to serve him in the church and the world.

Prior to the service, Bishop David will want to greet those taking part, so they are asked to make themselves free to be in the church hall from around 6:15 pm. Details of the precise timing will be told to candidates. Tea will be served after the servce.

The form of Baptismal vows, likely to be used, are these:

Do you reject the devil and all proud rebellion against God?

I reject them.

Do you renounce the deceit and corruption of evil?

I renounce them.

Do you repent of the sins that separate us from God and neighbour?

I repent of them.

Do you turn to Christ as Saviour?

I turn to Christ.

Do you submit to Christ as Lord?

I submit to Christ.

Do you come to Christ, the Way, the Truth and the Life?

I come to Christ.

In addition, the bishop may ask (all of) us to affirm our intentions as "those who are baptized (and who) are called to worship and serve God."

Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers?

With the help of God, I will.

Will you persevere in resisting evil,

and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

With the help of God, I will.

Will you proclaim by word and example

the good news of God in Christ?

With the help of God, I will.

Will you seek and serve Christ in all people,

loving your neighbour as yourself?

With the help of God, I will.



You'll achieve an awful lot.


Dame Margaret Harrison, the much valued friend and encourager of St Andrew's Church family, passed away in September after a short illness, in the company of her children and husband Richard at their home near Ballynahinch.

The large numbers attending the service, which was relayed to the church hall, and to friends and family connections overseas, were indicative of the high esteem in which she was held by all who knew her.

A fitting tribute was given by Mrs Helen Setterfield MBE, a reading of her favourite Psalm by Harry Brimacombe, and two pieces sung by Soloist Michelle Baird, accompanied by pianist Steve Barnett. Her chosen hymns were led by our organist Mr Brian Mulholland.

Four granddaughters, Frances, Sarah, Eve and Mai, prepared prayers which were said by them at the grave following the formal service.

In response to her service to the community, Margaret was honoured by being asked to become a member (then later dame



Helen's eulogy reflected on her love for her family circle, her devotion to St Andrew's, her delight in golf, her desire to travel, and her fine character. In his sermon, Stephen alluded to the humble faith which underlay much of the beauty of her spirit, quoting from Psalm 131: "O Lord, my heart is not haughty; my eyes are not raised too high; I do not occupy myself with things too great and too marvellous for me". He related how he, and others present at her death were very conscious of God's presence.

The prayers composed, and then used at the grave privately, were as follows:

We pray for comfort and peace to surround us all as we all mourn the loss of Margaret- a wife, mother, sister, auntie, grandmother, great grandmother and friend.

We thank you for the precious memories we shared with her, and for the love and joy she brought into our lives.

Thank you for telling us your favourite hymn. We have played some of them during past weeks so keep listening!

In the last Crossroads magazine, we mentioned that a favourite hymn writer, **The Right Rev Timothy Dudley-Smith**, had gone to be with his Saviour in August, aged 97. He was a former bishop in the Church of England and over a period of 60 years wrote more than 450 hymns, many of which are included in our hymnbooks. You will be familiar with the ones we sing in our worship. His words fit well with the tunes and help us in our praise times together in Church or as we hum along during the week.

It's interesting to note that he once said "I am totally unmusical. I can't sing in tune and often change key without knowing it" and "Hymn writing has been a most enriching and entirely unexpected gift." We are so grateful for his God-given gift. This Hymn was written in 1967 and is regularly sung at special services and anniversaries, including Queen Elizabeth II's Golden Jubilee.

Lord, for the years Your love has kept and guided, urged and inspired us, cheered us on our way, sought us and saved us, pardoned and provided: Lord of the years, we bring our thanks today.

Lord, for that word, the word of life which fires us, speaks to our hearts and sets our souls ablaze, teaches and trains, rebukes us and inspires us:

Lord of the word, receive your people's praise

Verse 3 is a prayer for our Land, Verse 4 is a prayer for our World

And finally:

Lord, for ourselves; in living power remake usself on the cross and Christ upon the throne, past put behind us, for the future take us: Lord of our lives, to live for Christ alone.

Thank you God, for the gift of hymns!

Love in a Shoe Box

Love in a shoe box is so special! It seems a simple idea, and yet it is also a great way to bring a smile and a sense of real joy to so many deprived or disadvantaged children across the globe.

Our usual practice in recent years has been to make flat pack shoe boxes available in both our churches by the first Sunday in October. Then what happens?

The church world wide is more than pleased to thank us for choosing to be a part of Operation Christmas Child. When we elect to do this we are taking part in a great global project. We will, in effect, be giving Christmas gifts to a great many distressed or disadvantaged children who are very unlikely to receive anything else at Christmas. Indeed, for many, it will be the first time they have ever received any sort of present.

The shoe box project delivers Christmas gifts to orphanages, refugee camps and a great many places where grinding poverty is a feature of everyday life. It is our joy and privilege – even our duty – to reach out to them and help to demonstrate Christian love and care.

In passing I should mention that Operation Christian Child has sometimes been described as the biggest Sunday School in the world. The reason for this is both heartening and very straight forward. In essence, wherever it is feasible, children in all sorts of locations around the world "will not only receive a shoe box filled with gifts of joy, but also learn about the Good News that the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ."

It is probable that the shoe boxes from Killaney and Carryduff will arrive in an orphanage or a refugee centre somewhere in eastern Europe or the near east. Just imagine the smiling faces of these underprivileged children as they open their boxes and, at the same time, hear the real Christmas story. This is, indeed, our privilege.

The Operation Christmas Child programme is currently active in more than 100

countries – and you may find it interesting to know that, last year, 237,000 children were reached with the Gospel message through shoe box gifts sent from the United Kingdom alone. Each one of us is sharing the Gospel with a child in need.

Barnabas Aid Sunday

We were pleased to welcome Neville McCormack from Barnabas Aid on Sunday 8th September. Taking as his text '.....believers in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ'- James 2:1, he reminded us that the Christians who are being persecuted for their faith are our brothers and sisters. Their suffering is beyond our wildest imagination and ignored for most of the time by the world's media. Using some examples, he gave us a glimpse into what is happening on a daily basis and urged us to support the Suffering Church through informed prayer. Prayer is the bedrock of Barnabas Aid. The bi-monthly magazine and prayer diary are essential in helping to keep supporters up to date with facts and to pray effectively for the Lord's people. Neville spoke about the grim situation in parts of Africa, where the need of help and aid is great. He said that in Nigeria's Plateau State, Christians are constantly under attack from Fulani Islamist extremists. In the last six months, thousands have been displaced, hundreds have been killed, homes have been torched, and fleeing civilians have been mercilessly gunned down.

Barnabas Aid is 'on the ground' bringing support where it is most needed.

A heart warming story contained in the August Prayer diary tells of sixty Christian widows in Kaduna State, Nigeria. Each received a corn-grinding machine or a sewing machine, funded by Barnabas Aid. Their husbands had been killed and their homes destroyed in anti-Christian violence. Now they can earn a living and pay for basic needs and their children's schooling.

One widow shared, "There are people who come and can't even afford to pay for grinding their corn and I assist them without collecting any money. Through your blessing we are able to bless others."

Neville also mentioned the food gives programme for Ireland which was set up within our parish boundary, at Barnabas Aid's new warehouse. It was officially opened in June of this year at 123c Front Road Drumbo, BT27 5JY, close to Carr Baptist Church. This is an International Christian food bank. Any one wishing to know more about it or when to visit our warehouse, should speak to Raymond, as he has been involved in supporting it.

RESOURCEFULNESS

I was once at a baptism, a happy occasion heightened by the minister's sense of humour.

"Ah, I see we have remembered to put some water in the basin this morning," he remarked at the start of the service. He then told us a tale of a vicar who was conducting a baptism only to find that someone had completely forgotten to fill the font with water. With great presence of mind he asked the congregation to stand, "for the ceremony of bringing in the water," thus giving the verger an opportunity to put things right. It's nice to know that clerics can be open about making mistakes and can teach us how to be resourceful.

The charge is an amazingly low £30.00



Mrs Patricia (Trish) Flanagan passed away in August. This remained her interest until church attendance became difficult following a fall.

The good attendance at her funeral service reflected the high esteem in which she and her family are held in the community. At the funeral service in her church, Warren delivered a well-written eulogy for his mum and presented a detailed tribute to her character, devotion to her children and grandchildren, and her strong spirit.
