



The Power of Prayer

How often do we bemoan the fact that our Church congregation is shrinking and that we have very few young families joining us regularly on a Sunday morning?

I often hear people say, "there's nothing we can do. It's a sign of the times".

But, there is something we can do. If we all pray, regularly and earnestly, change can happen, just like it did in a small Scottish community in the late 1940's.



Then Peggy had a vision of the church crowded with young people. They persuaded their minister to call 'a session'. Seven men covenanted 'not to give rest nor peace to the Almighty until He made their Jerusalem a praise in the earth'. Those men also began to meet for prayer on Tuesday and Friday.

Then one night in November a young man began to pray, 'God, are my hands clean? Is my heart pure?' He fell into a trance and lay on the floor of the barn. Within a matter of minutes three other elders also fell into a trance. The minister and other intercessors were gripped by the conviction that a God-sent revival must always be related to holiness and godliness.

An awareness of God gripped the whole community and a missioner, Duncan Campbell ,was invited to lead a series of meetings. For the first week of evening meetings little happened, though five young people found God. (Would that every church might have five young people find faith!)

Then on 13 December 1949, at the end of the meeting, all had left except Campbell and one other. The deacon said, "Don't be discouraged. God is hovering over us, and he'll break through any moment. I can already hear the rumbling of heaven's chariot wheels". He began to pray before falling to the ground in a trance. Five minutes later the local blacksmith came back to the church and said, "Mr Campbell, something wonderful has happened. We were praying that God would pour water on the thirsty and floods upon the dry ground, and listen, He's done it! He's done it! Will you come to the door, and see the crowd that's here?"

Even though it was 11 at night, between six and seven hundred people had gathered around the church. They had been moved by a power they could not explain. Over the next few nights hundreds gathered in different places, in churches and barns or in fields and homes. There was a prayer meeting every day at noon. All work stopped for two hours and people gathered for prayer.

So it continued for several years and it spread to many of the surrounding islands. When revival came to Lewis in 1949 the churches had no choirs, organs, musical instruments or padded seats. There were no meetings for children, young people or Mums and Tots, no Holiday Bible Clubs, no power points or transport laid on, and very few had cars. But God performed miracles and brought hundreds, if not



thousands, to himself. It seems the catalyst was prayer, prayer and only prayer. That was it. God did the rest.

Do we have the courage and commitment to pray in such a way?

Why not say these prayers as part of your daily routine and see what the Lord can do?

P – Parochial Nominators – Almighty God, bless those called to nominate servants for ministry within our parishes. Illuminate their minds and hearts with the wisdom of Your Spirit that they may discern those whom you have set apart to serve. Amen

R – Revival – Lord, let your spirit renew our Churches, that they might become vibrant places of worship where lives are transformed and Your grace is made known. Amen

A-Affirm our faith – Lord in times of doubt and uncertainty help us to trust in Your promises and walk steadfastly in Your ways. Amen

Y - Young people and families - Lord, open the eyes of young people and families to the joy of worship, the peace of fellowship and the strength of your word. Remove any doubts, fears or distractions that stop them coming near to You and make our Churches welcoming places for them to grow in faith. Amen.

Memoirs by Anne Mannis



My parents and my sisters moved from Newtownbreda to Carricknaveagh in 1948.

My sister Rosemary is the eldest, I am piggy in the middle, and Jacqueleine (Jacky) the youngest.

We went to Carricknaveagh Primary School, a wooden building, which we called the hen house, before a new school was built.

We joined Killaney. The service was at 3:00 pm and Sunday School was in the vestry, where the fire was lit to keep us warm – I can still remember the smell of the coke that was used.

Mr Jimmy McKibben taught us. He and his sister Miss McKibben, and her friend Miss Hawkins were great workers for the church. The holders for the oil lamps were painted black as the brass was hard to clean.

Mrs Booth was the organist and we had a small choir. A couple of times, she was unavailable, and Rosemary played – pushing hard on the pedals!

Rev. Gorman was the rector, as we were joined with Saintfield Parish. Around the window, above the Holy table, was written, 'To the Glory of God, and all His Holiness'. The wall below was painted with green ivy leaves.

Robbie Hempton, a local farmer, was also a great worker for the Church. He was the Sexton, and rang the bell for each service. He gave money to the church for the building of the hall, which was opened by Mrs Davidson and I presented her with a bouquet of flowers.

The driveway up to the church had rhododendrons on either side.

The church hall was also used for dances.

The Sunday School had Christmas parties, and the one game I remember was, Pin the Tail on the Donkey!

Dear Select Vestries and Parishioners,

As your Area Dean, I wanted to take a moment to outline the steps we will be taking as we navigate through the vacancy and move towards welcoming a new incumbent.

The Church of Ireland has a process in place to ensure a smooth transition, and I will be working closely with the Select Vestries, the Diocesan Secretary, and the Permanent Commission to facilitate this process.

When the Diocesan Secretary contacts me, I will request that the Select Vestry complete a pro-forma to provide essential details about your parish. This information will be used by the Permanent Commission as they consider the parish's needs and potential candidates.

As Area Dean, my role involves chairing meetings of the Select Vestries, guiding the parish through the transition, and ensuring that necessary tasks are completed.

This includes:

- Ensuring the rectory is maintained and prepared for the arrival of the new incumbent
- Coordinating communication between the diocese and the parish
- Advising on the invitation list for the service of institution or introduction
- Collaborating with the new incumbent on the order of service and ensuring it is approved by the bishop's office
- Attending the service of institution or introduction

I will keep you informed of any developments and I will work closely with you to ensure that the parish is well-prepared for the arrival of the new incumbent. If you have any concerns, please do not hesitate to reach out to me.

Dreams and Visions

We know very little about the life and times of the minor Old Testament prophet Joel. The opening verse of the book of Joel tells us that he was the son of someone called Pethuel. There is nothing more about him.

We do not know precisely his timeframe, although it would be reasonable to imagine that he was active sometime around the 5th to the 4th centuries BC. However, he did have some significant things to say that could resonate with the prevailing spirit of our own time.

He spoke, for example, about an unprecedented spiritual hunger – and I think it would be fair to speculate that the dominant mindset of our time is also a bit short on spiritual depth. Indeed, as the modern Irish scholar, John O'Donohue, observed: "The light of modern consciousness is not gentle or reverent."

Among other things, we need to be just a bit more silent; and a bit more ready to hear "the still small voice " – and more receptive to the divine presence in nature. Could it be – perish the thought – (again quoting John O'Donohue) that "the value of shyness, its mystery and reserve, is alien to the brash immediacy of much modern encounter"?

Perhaps we need to give ourselves rather more quiet time – a time to permit dreams and visions. This idea was absolutely central to the message of Joel. In essence he said that if the people set aside earthly ambitions and turned again to deeper thoughts, then the spirit of God would be upon them. This is abundantly clear from the most famous, much quoted text in the book of Joel. Referring to God's graciousness towards His people he states ".....I will pour out my spirit on all flesh: Your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams and your young men shall see visions......(Joel 2 v.28)."

This strikes me as very relevant to our time. We need to slow down the frantic pace of modern life and contemplate in some depth the things that really matter. "One of the greatest conflicts in life is the conflict between the ego and the soul" (John O' Donohue again).

Take time! Consider the landscape we were born into. It was here long before us, and watched us arrive. Its quietness and stillness offers an opportunity to think of higher things – to dream dreams and see visions – to be spiritually enriched. This is all about giving real time to the value of quiet faith

Now, here's a further point to consider! Maybe, since I am not as young as I used to be, it may be quite a challenge for me to see visions – but I think I should still be able to dream dreams.

We thank you for their wisdom and knowledge. Help us never to exclude them but to embrace them with love. We also want to remember Lord, those who are carers. Give them grace, empathy and compassion when faced with challenges or moments of frustration, and may they be a source of comfort to those for whom they care. In Jesus' name. Amen.

Bishop David encouraged us to continue to support the church in our attendance and by our prayers for one another and for our nominators. He picked up on what recent media reports have said about young people who are feeling disillusioned by society's 'do whatever you want' philosophy, and are beginning to come back to church, because they are searching for something that the world cannot give. That 'something' is Jesus Christ.


