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Christmas: God With Us in the Ordinary

As we approach Christmas once again, our homes, churches, and communities begin to take on a familiar warmth. Lights appear in windows, cards arrive through the letterbox, and the melodies of old carols drift into our days. Yet in all the activity of the season, it is easy to forget that the heart of Christmas is astonishingly simple: God came to dwell among us.

In the Gospel of Luke, the birth of Jesus is described with striking humility. There is no grandeur or spectacle—no palace, no celebration, no recognition from society's leaders. Instead, the Son of God begins His earthly life in a stable, laid in a manger, greeted by tired shepherds who happened to be working the night shift. It is a moment that reminds us that God meets us not in perfection, but in the everyday reality of our lives.

This message is especially important in a world that often feels hurried and uncertain. Many carry burdens unseen—worry for family, the weight of loss, or the pressures of the year gone by. And yet the proclamation of Christmas speaks directly into those places: "Do not be afraid." God has come near. Not to overwhelm, but to restore; not to judge from a distance, but to walk beside us.

As the Church of Ireland family, Christmas invites us to reflect on the ways Christ continues to shine His light into our world. We see it in the kindness of neighbours, the generosity of parish outreach, the welcome we extend to visitors, and in the quiet prayers offered for those in need. Every act of love, however small, echoes the message sung by the angels: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace."

May this season renew our hope and deepen our faith. As we gather around the manger—or the Christmas table, or the parish church decorated in greenery and candlelight—may we be reminded that God still chooses to enter the ordinary moments of our lives with extraordinary grace.

Wishing you and your loved ones a blessed, peaceful, and joyful Christmas.

CMSI

On 16th November we had a visit from Linda Abwa, who is on the staff of CMSI. She based her sermon on John 4:4-30, in which Jesus has an encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well. Linda focused on the transformation which Jesus brought to the woman's life, and linked this with the transformation we see today in the lives of the people of Olo. Our two parishes have enabled the diocese of Olo to purchase a mill for grinding flour. This is the job of the women who had to make the dangerous journey to grind flour in another part of the diocese. Now they can do so locally and also make a little bit of money by selling some of the flour. Bishop Tandema, who spent a few days in our parishes about 8 years ago, is immensely grateful to Stephen and the people who helped raise the money to buy the mill.

CMSI has launched another project to dig bore holes to give the people of Olo access to safe drinking water. One pump is in operation, saving families the arduous long walk to get clean water. Bishop Tandema, with the help of engineers, has located a new site in the village of Rasolo, where a second bore hole is being dug. CMSI is funding these bore holes with financial help from our two parishes.

Thank you to all who support CMSI's projects in Olo diocese.



Gingerbread & Generosity Advent 2025



SAMS

This Advent and Christmas season SAMS Ireland has launched a new initiative in partnership with the Bishops' Appeal and the Board for Ministry with Children and Families. It is called 'Houses of Hope' and highlights the need for everyone to have a place to call home. It is providing care for homeless families and individuals, and providing safe places for vulnerable young girls to live.

Geoff Hamilton, the Director of SAMS Ireland, writes,

'As we journey through Advent, we enter a season of waiting and anticipation. This Advent, we are partnering with church communities in Chile and Brazil. In Santiago, Chile, the local church is quietly making a difference through the Community Kitchen, as it opens its doors to 120 homeless individuals and families every week, offering not just support but a sense of belonging. The church provides essential nourishment and care - hot meals, toiletries, and basic clothing.

In Olinda, outside Recife in Brazil, a safe house is offering hope to vulnerable young girls at risk. The safe house stands as a sanctuary for girls facing exploitation and trafficking, offering more than protection. Here the girls can reconnect with education, find encouragement, and rediscover a sense of purpose and hope for the future, all within a nurturing Christian community.'

A small amount of money can make a big difference and bring comfort and dignity to someone in need. For example, in Chile, £16 provides a quality blanket to keep someone warm through the cold nights, £5 provides a simple, nourishing lunch of chicken, rice, and a dessert, £5 enables a child to receive a small gift, a reminder they're not forgotten. In Brazil, £7 covers the cost of a girl's food for the day, £7 buys a basic item of clothing.

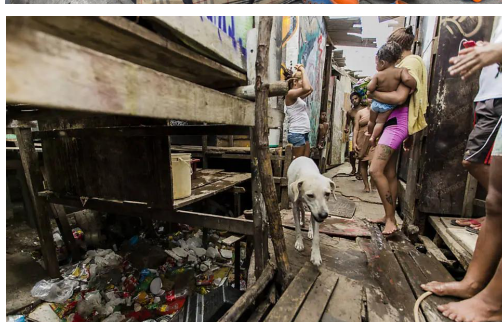

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THE POWER OF PRAYER

- The Ulster Revival 1859

In our September 2025 edition of Crossroads, Jenny Montgomery introduced us to 'The Power of Prayer: a wonderful story of The Hebrides Revival in the late 1940's. That caused me to think (which can be dangerous????).

A few of you will know my passion for family history (a lifetime obsession for many), also a favourite pastime visiting graveyards, a great source of information for the family historian. My research took me to the area of Glenanne, a small village near Mountnorris, South Armagh, and to the local Presbyterian Church of Tullyallen, part of the Newry Presbytery. There I found that my great great grandparents Samuel and Agnes, on my paternal side, were residing here in the 1830's. I found a large headstone erected by a family member, showing names and dates of burials, also records of baptisms and marriages.

Fast forward to 2010 when I met Rev. Nigel J.E.Reid, the minister of Tullyallen, when I was visiting the nearby graveyard to the Church. When I told him the name I was researching, he gave me an Order of Service dated June 2009 that he had produced. Its heading was 'Celebrating the 1859 Revival Tullyallen & Mountnorris Presbyterian Churches' This was a service celebrating those who became new Communicants in 1859, as a result of the 'Ulster Revival'.

Twenty-eight names had been recorded by the then Minister, Rev. J.D.Martin. These were reproduced on the Order of Service, showing how each came under conviction

of sin. To my surprise and joy, I found four of the names of my family. Samuel and Agnes' eldest son John and his wife Margaret, who had been married in 1858, shown as 'Stricken', Henry, a brother of John, shown as 'Impressed' and Agnes, a sister, shown as 'Stricken'.

Of the 28 Communicants, 5 were Stricken, 12 Impressed, 2 Affected, 3 Shaken, nothing was recorded for the remaining six.

Physical manifestations occurred during the Revival. These are terms we are not familiar with today to describe how someone comes to know the Lord, but were common enough during the Revival. Reports of 'spiritual distress, in agony of body, crying out for mercy' abounded when they obviously came under conviction of sin. This was surely the powerful work of the Holy Spirit as on the day of Pentecost when lives were changed.

These physical manifestations were common in many churches and open air meetings throughout Ulster.

Rev. Wm McEwan, minister of Mountnorris from 1847 to 1877, records that during the revival there were 15 prayer meetings connected with the congregation.

The following is a very brief outline as to how revival came to Ulster.

'Near to Connor is a small village called Kells. How like our Lord to have chosen such an unlikely place to begin a revival in the most unlikely of ways, and with a group of people who felt least equipped to do such things. God could see the hearts of a small group of mainly men whom he could use to revive the land and restore the Church. The Revival was to start with four young men in 1857 when they made a covenant to meet on a weekly basis to pray and study the Bible. They started what they called a Believers' Fellowship meeting in a small schoolhouse at Kells, in Antrim. During the years that followed, many lives were brought into the Kingdom in response to their prayers, and those of others. It is believed that over 100,000 new converts were added to the Church in one year, but the true number is known only to the Lord.

It is generally accepted that it was as a result of much prayer in the Connor area of Co. Antrim that the Revival started and spread to various parts of Ulster. In March 1859 Co. Armagh began to experience a touch of it, and so to Tullyallen and Mountnorris Presbyterian Church!

Through my research I have found newspaper and death notices, including a family Bible that came into my father's possession, showing Christians in past generations. At present, my nephew is a serving Methodist Minister. I truly believe it was the prayers of past and present family members that brought my ancestors and others into the Kingdom of God.

Jenny concluded her article, 'It seems the catalyst was prayer, prayer and only prayer. That was it. God did the rest'

So don't give up on your nearest and dearest; keep praying that they will respond to God's invitation and be brought into his Kingdom, be it sooner or later. We may not see them respond to God's invitation in our lifetime. God hears persistent prayers, although I confess, I don't always understand his timing, but I am still praying for those family members who have not yet accepted God's invitation of salvation.

Surely we need another Revival in Ulster? Start praying!

Please do keep praying for our four nominators and the person God has chosen to be our next rector. The piece in November's magazine on the process of appointing a new rector is an aid to helping us pray for them.

‘O to be wise’

There is something very significant - at least to me – in the story of the wise men coming to greet the “new born king.” Only Matthew tells us their story (Matt. 2 v 1-12).

The key issue is the striking humility of these men. The text tells us that when they saw the infant Jesus “.....they knelt down and paid him homage.....” They may well have been people of real distinction (even kings?) in their own home lands, but that did not get in the way of their clearly humble attitude. There is a very evident indication in this of a link between wisdom and humility – and perhaps there is a further crucial issue here in our recognition that these men were the first gentiles to see – or even become aware of – the stature and significance of the infant Jesus.

It is not suggested in Matthew’s text that these men were in any sense clever. That is an entirely different matter. Being clever is not the same thing as being wise; and we might usefully note the observation “.....for wisdom is more precious than rubies, and nothing you desire can compare with her (Proverbs 8 v 11).”

The apostle James makes further revealing observations about the strong link between wisdom and humility. He writes: “....who is wise and understanding among you? Let him show it by his good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom (James 3. V 13).” He then goes on to state: “.....the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace loving, considerate,.....full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere (v. 17).”

Besides all this, James also advises that “if any of you lacks wisdom, he should ask God, who gives generously to all.....and it will be given to him (James 1. V 5).”

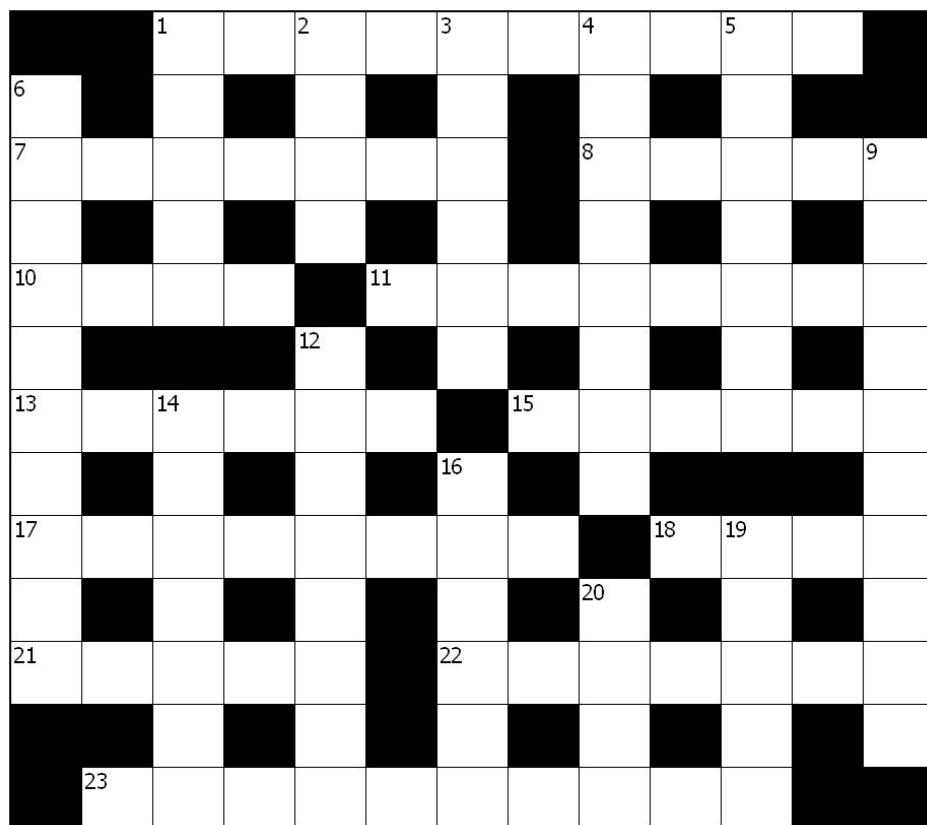
In summary, being clever is all very well, and perhaps it will serve you well in respect of success in the material world, BUT it is not the same thing as being wise. In all this it is strikingly significant that being both humble and wise go so well together.

DEANERY REVIVAL PRAYER MEETING

On Wednesday 19th November 2025 the Area Deanery of Dufferin held the first of the Deanery Revival Prayer Meetings at Holy Trinity, Drumbo, also known as 'HTB', Holy Trinity Ballylesson. This meeting was initiated by Hilary McClay, the wife of Bishop David.

The Rector of Drumbo, Mervyn Jamison, was our host for the evening, and the proceedings were led by the Area Dean, Canon Stanley Gamble. He opened the meeting by quoting the Puritan, John Bunyan, on "What is prayer?" "Prayer is a sincere, sensible, affectionate pouring out of the heart or soul to God, through Christ, with the strength and assistance of the Holy Spirit, for such things as God has promised, or according to his Word, for the good of the church, with submission in faith to the will of God."

A representative from various parishes then shared specific prayer requests, outlining the needs of their church. The representatives included Revd Elaine Pentland (Kilwarlin), Keith Shaw (Killaney and Carryduff), and Nigel Quinn (Drumbeg).

Approximately 30/35 people were present as well as those who joined 'on line'. We were encouraged to form small groups to focus on prayer requests. Mervyn was our time keeper and after 2/3 minutes he introduced the next representative. The Area Dean led us in the **LATE EVENING OFFICE** from the Prayer Book, during which prayers were said for local needs and the needs of the world. He encouraged us to use this short liturgical service to pray daily for ourselves and our family. We came away much better informed as to the difficulties and needs of other churches, and of the importance of every member of the church family, regardless of their age.

It is planned that Deanery Revival Prayer Meetings will take place throughout the diocese in the coming weeks and months, hosted by different churches.

Pause For Thought

Mervyn told us that when the 1859 Revival came to Ballylesson, it resulted in the need for two new transepts to accommodate the growing congregation. These were added in 1863/64.



We should all be praying now for 'Revival', starting with our own selves; then continuing with prayer for our churches, our community and our province. All of us need it!! Prayer has always preceded the Revivals we read about.
