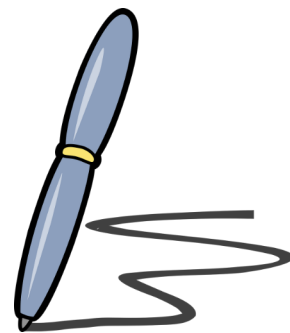

Rector's Easter Vestry Report

It is both a privilege and a slightly daunting task to present my first report, having been your Rector for just over two months. I am very aware that many of you know the life of this church far better than I do at this stage—although I am learning quickly, and being very well supplied with caffeine, which certainly helps.



These first weeks have been a time of listening, learning, and beginning to build relationships. I have been grateful for the warm welcome we have received as a family across Killaney and Carryduff. It has been a real encouragement to encounter such commitment, faithfulness, and generosity in the life of both parishes. I want to take the opportunity to thank our parish nominators Keith, Victoria, Jenny and Bill. Nominating a new Rector is not an easy task and the process can be lengthy and frustrating at times, but I want to thank you for participating in that process with such kindness and respectfulness- I hope you feel you've made the right choice.

One of the goals of the first few weeks has been simply to be present: in worship, in conversation, and in the everyday moments that make up the life of the church. I am beginning to get a sense of the rhythms of parish life—though I suspect it may take a little longer before I confidently know where everything is kept and how everything works (especially the photocopier).

In worship, it has been a joy to gather with you week by week. There is a clear sense of community and hospitality in what we offer and it is my prayer that we never lose sight of those.

Our journey through Holy Week and Easter has been a particular highlight of these early months. From our community prayer walk on Monday evening praying for the people of Carryduff, new houses, local businesses and the safety of roads, to our 'Hymns of Holy Week' service held in Killaney on Tuesday, a quiet yet reflective service which spoke of the heart of Easter. I want to take this opportunity to thank Brian Mulholland who so graciously helped me in preparing the service in such a way that reflected the journey of Jesus in his final week on earth.

Among our services throughout the week, one of the highlights for me was our Community Easter Trail, on Good Friday morning. As the volunteers gathered together I recall saying "If we have 5 people through our door this morning then we can be content that our doors have been opened and people know that we are here." That day we welcomed a total of 79 people who came through our doors to take part in the Easter Trail, telling the real Easter story, and stayed for a chat, coffee and activities for the children. It's my prayer that we will be able to run more community events that express the love of Christ, and that all in our local community would know us to be a safe place where the hurting find hope, the gripping find refuge, the ill find healing, and all find a warm welcome.

I would like to take this opportunity to offer my sincere thanks to those who will be stepping down from their roles this year; namely David Nevin, who has taken the decision to step down after over 20 years of faithful service as People's Glebe Warden in Carryduff and David Gill who is stepping down as People's Church Warden in Killaney. The life of a parish depends so much on the faithful service of individuals who give their time, energy, and care, often over many years. Your contribution has been deeply valued, and I hope you know how much it has meant

to this church community. You leave with our gratitude—and, I hope, at least a little more free time.

I would also like to express my thanks to all who have made these first weeks not only manageable, but genuinely enjoyable. The life of our parish wouldn't be possible without our ministry team in Keith, Marlene, Raymond, Jenny and Gillian. Your patience, guidance, and good humour have been deeply appreciated— I have regularly said that if you had a £1 for every question I asked, you'd be lying on a sun lounger in Barbados- so thank you for your dedication and commitment not only to this Parish but to the calling that God has put upon your lives.

Of course, stepping into a new parish also means recognising that there are questions to explore and opportunities ahead. These early weeks have already highlighted areas where we may, together, reflect on how we continue to grow— both in our life as a worshipping community and in our service to those around us. In April two members of Carryduff parish and I attended a church growth conference organised by the Commission on Ministry. We all left feeling encouraged and hopeful about what God is doing in Carryduff and Killaney.

It is my hope that we will be able to offer an Alpha course in the new academic year for those exploring faith. In addition, as we've already discussed in our sermon this morning prayer, must be a priority as the people of God. Time and time again we say how it would be lovely to have more children and young people in our parish; it won't happen on its own and it won't happen just by being here. We must get our hands dirty, get stuck in and pray. Because prayer changes things! It is my hope that Killaney and Carryduff are known as places of prayer and so I continue to discern how we can best implement prayer into our weekly routine as a worshipping community.

As I continue to settle into this role, I am very conscious that my time with you has only just begun, and I am looking forward to getting to know you more fully in the months ahead. Every church has its own story, character, and calling, and I am keen to listen carefully and learn what has shaped you as a congregation, as well as what you sense God is calling you to be and to do in this place.

I am particularly interested in exploring, together, our vision for the future—what gives us energy, where we see opportunities for growth, and how we might build on the strengths that are already here.

Finally, I am hopeful; hopeful about what God is already doing in this place, and hopeful about what lies ahead. It is a gift to begin this ministry among you, and I look forward to continuing this journey together.

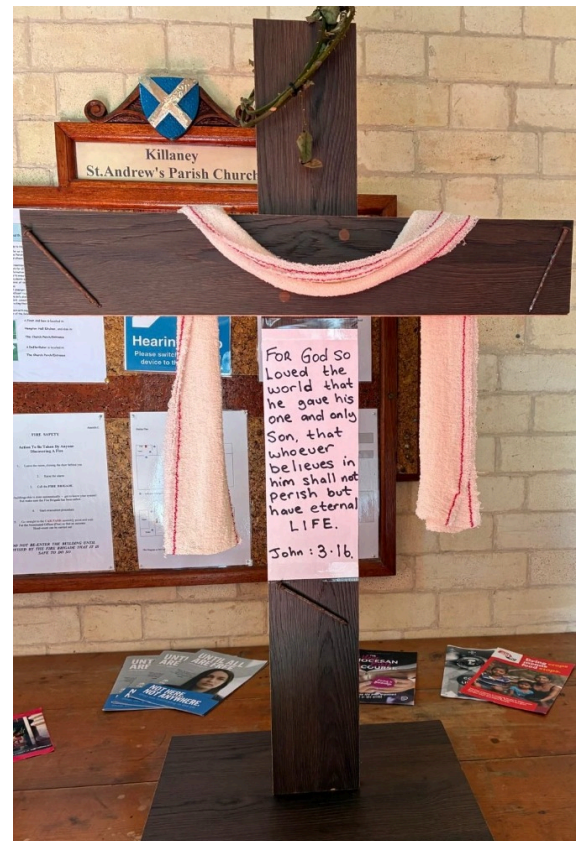

Church Growth Conference

On Saturday 18th April in The Stormont Hotel, Belfast, church leaders from all areas of ministry were invited to a Church Growth Conference held by The Church of Ireland's Commission on Ministry. The day began with coffee (as all good days do) and we were led in worship by Bishop David and worship leader, James Turner. The keynote address was provided by Revd Canon Michael Alastair Graham, formerly Rector of Mullingar in the Diocese of Meath and Kildare. His address was entitled 'Growing God's Church, rooted in his word and responding to his call'. Canon Graham noted that so often we can focus on church attendance as a measure for growth but, if we focus on numbers, we often miss the point and attendance is only a part of a much larger picture. Throughout the afternoon, leaders attended seminars all relating to different aspects of church growth, such as prayer, evangelism, community engagement, stewardship, music, scripture and many more. Before the conference ended, leaders gathered together for a time of worship and commissioning and were treated to hearing internationally renowned singer and songwriter, Dana Scallon, who sang beautifully a song dedicated to St Patrick. So often it is easy to come away from these events feeling overwhelmed about what we should be doing. On Saturday we came away feeling hopeful about what God is already doing in Killaney and Carryduff and hopeful about what he might do in the coming years.

What is Gift Aid?

Gift Aid allows charities to claim an extra 25p for every £1 you give. It does not cost you any extra.

If you have recently started to donate to the Church via standing order/envelope giving and are a taxpayer, you may wish to consider completing a declaration to allow the Church to benefit by claiming Gift Aid on your contributions.

Blank forms are available for completion in The Jeremy Taylor Chapel.

Completed forms can be given to the Honorary Treasurers at any time.

For existing members, if you are unsure if you have already completed a Gift Aid Declaration, please speak to Sandra Thomas who can confirm if form already held.

It may be the case that members have now started to pay income tax and we would encourage you to sign up for Gift Aid.

Members who have previously signed Gift Aid forms while paying income tax **must** inform the honorary treasurer if they no longer pay income tax. A note on the collection plate to this effect will be sufficient: please mark it 'Gift Aid Notice.'

When technology goes wrong

To be True and Just

There are only four words! Yet they present a statement of absolute significance at both the personal and the public level. The text - the crucial words - that I have in mind are - "You shall not steal."

This, of course, is one of the ten commandments, as set out in the book of Exodus - chapter 20 verses 4-17. It is a crucial and unarguable element within the six commandments that the Book of Common Prayer refers to as "my duty towards my neighbour."

To develop this a little further it would be instructive to have a look at the text in a very particular and clearly set out section of the Book of Common Prayer. I refer here, of course, to the Catechism.

The text of the commandments is presented in full in the Catechism, which further clarifies that the first four commandments set out our duty towards God, and the other six cover, in detail, our duty towards our neighbour.

On expanding on and clarifying the eighth commandment - "You shall not steal" - the text contains the crucial words: "To be true and just in all my dealing."

So who is my neighbour, and to whom does this emphatic instruction apply?

Of course it applies to each of us as individuals, but it must - absolutely must - apply to governments, corporate bodies, shareholders in companies, and all those who present goods and services to the public.

Herein lies a very challenging issue. An article in a recent issue of *New Daylight* goes straight to the point. The text states: "The world is broken by selfishness, greed and evil within our hearts."

These are striking words, and they ring a bell with me about whether, for example, government departments, the medical establishment and pharmaceutical companies have been entirely truthful with the public in relation to the claims made about (and widespread distribution of) anti-covid vaccines. Have there not been several subsequent health issues which might have derived from the use of inadequately tested vaccines?

This is an example of a substantial issue across the corporate world of a duty towards my neighbour. I don't think I would be alone in suspecting that there has been - to put it mildly - an element of carelessness with the truth in this case.

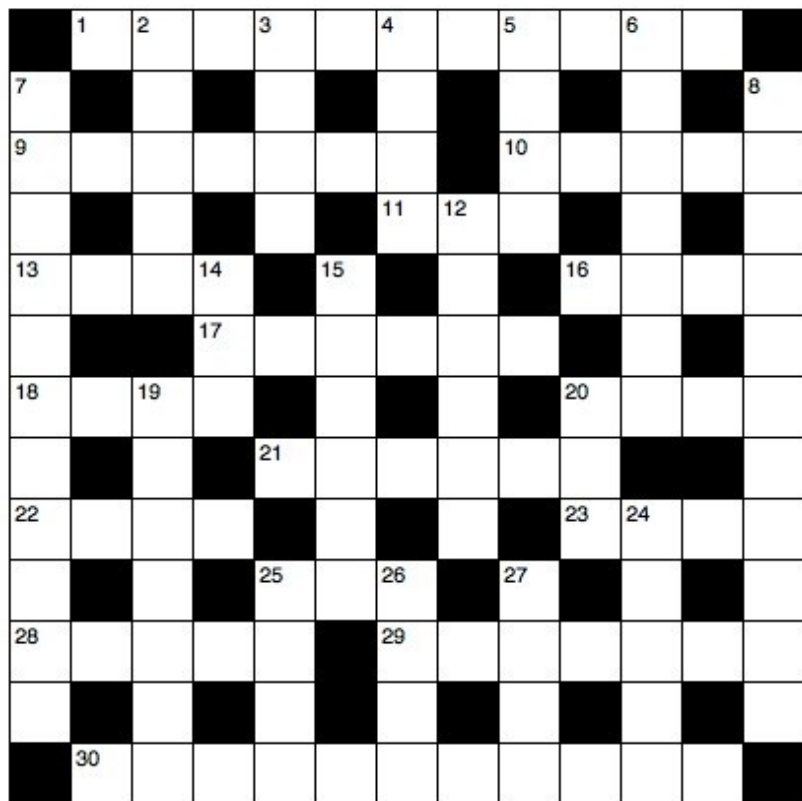
Furthermore, I rather suspect that this is possibly only one of several issues across the corporate world where the requirement to be true and just may have been set on one side.

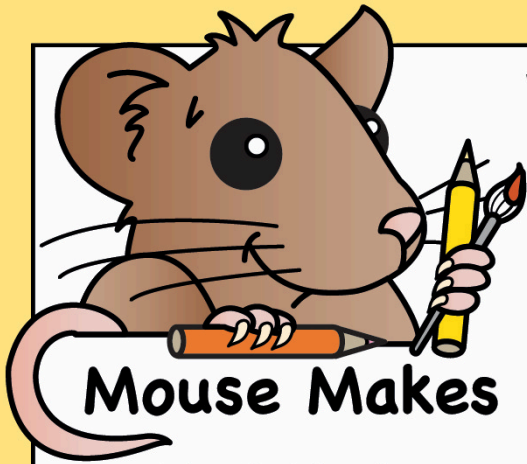

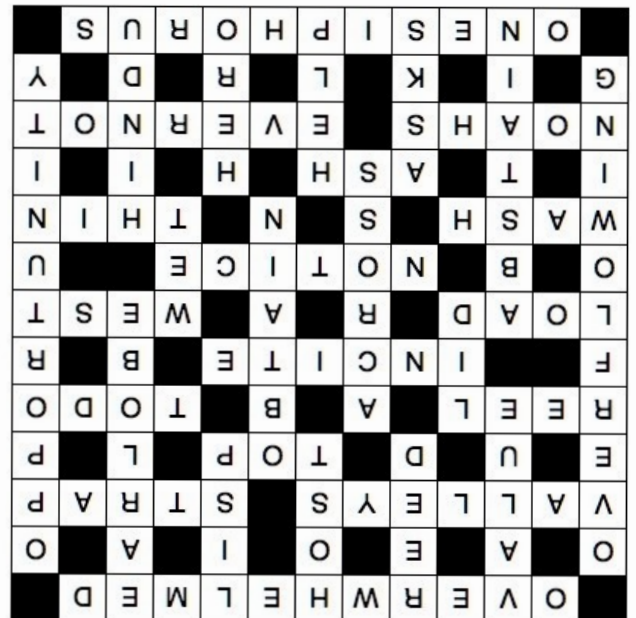
