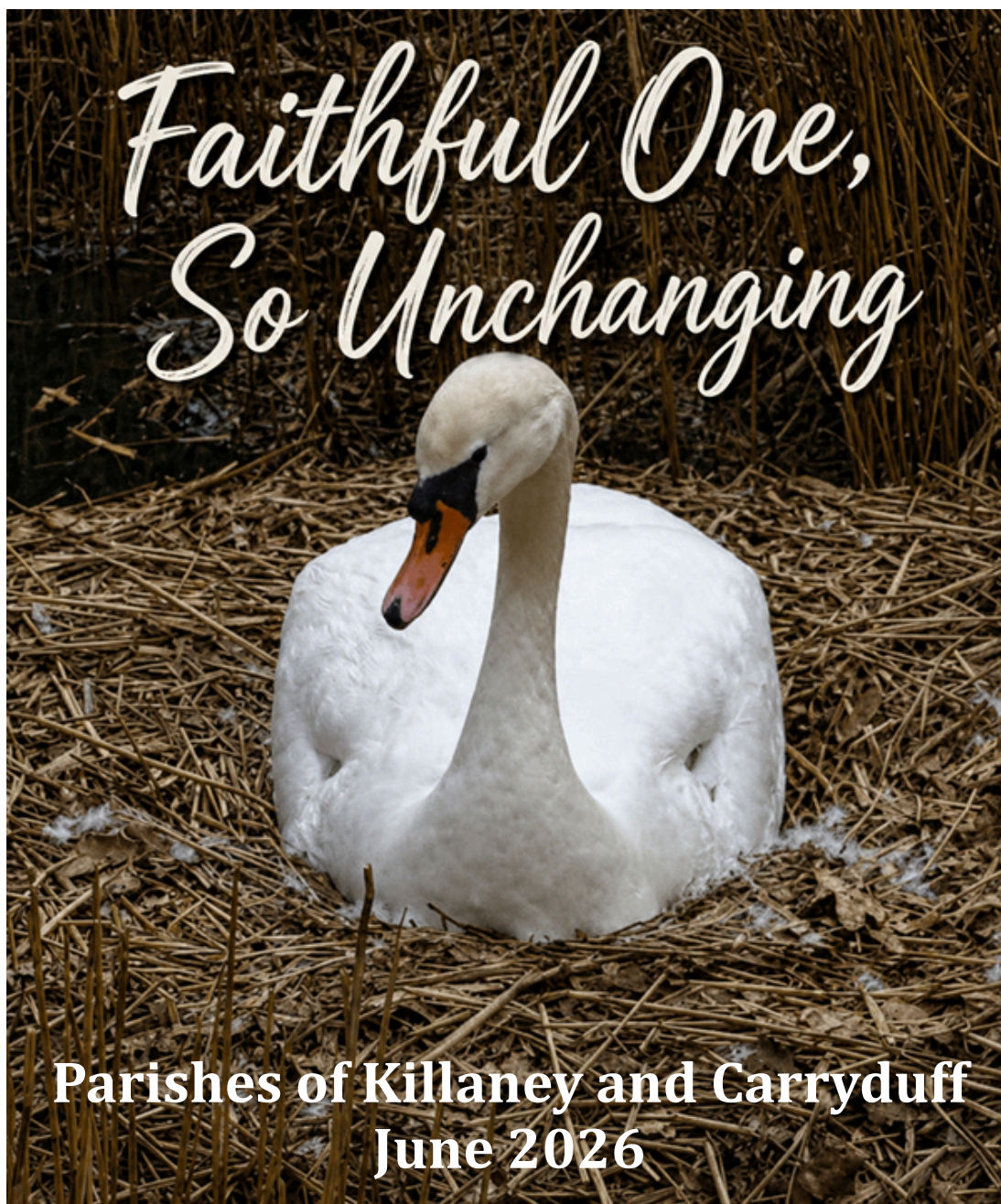


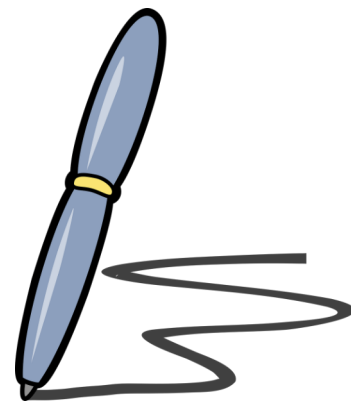
CROSSROADS



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Sarah writes

This morning I found myself sitting in a long traffic queue, but, when the queue started moving, PSNI officers were diverting the traffic another way. As I travelled up an unknown country road waiting for my GPS to re-route itself, it got me thinking about diversions in life and, specifically, divine diversions. Our earthly lives are full of daily diversions, delays, interruptions and distractions, and they can feel like a nuisance, not part of the plan. Yet I wonder if we are viewing these diversions of life wrongly; perhaps we (me included!) should think of them not as diversions but as construction zones that God adds to our lives to mould us into the people he wants us to be and to make us his hands and feet in a broken world.



Think of Joseph. God diverted him to Egypt to prepare him to rescue God's chosen people from starvation. Or of Moses, who was diverted from the luxurious lifestyle of Pharaoh's house to meet God in the wilderness in preparation to lead God's people toward the Promised Land. Or of Joseph and Mary to whom the angel announced the most significant diversion of all. Mary would be with child, and this child would be called "Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins" (Matt. 1:21). Joseph believed in the bigger purpose that God had for him, surrendered to the diversion, and obediently "called His name Jesus" (v.25). The rest is wonderful history!

Just maybe God wants to invite us to see beyond ourselves, to enjoy the view from his perspective. When we see life's interruptions as opportunities, our eyes are open to see God move in ways that we could never imagine. C.S. Lewis wrote "*the great thing is, if you can, is to stop regarding all the unpleasant things as interruptions. Of course, what one calls interruptions can be precisely part of your life, the life that God is sending you. One day at a time*".

I don't know why I was diverted this morning, no doubt BBC newscast will let me know later (other channels are available!) but what I do know is this: "My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways My ways" Isaiah 55:8.

"I the Lord do not change." Malachi 3:6

I was standing in a bus queue one day last summer. In front of me, two women were talking, complaining about the heat. "I don't like this hot weather," said one, "it ought to come gradually, so that we can get used to it." I wasn't sure how that could be arranged, but it is clear that rapid change unsettles folk. Even our faith changes. Or should do. What I understand and believe now as a Christian is very different from what I believed 30 years ago, not because God has changed but because my experience of him has deepened and my understanding has changed. The one thing that doesn't change is God's love. In the midst of change, that is one assurance which can help us cope with the rest.

GENERAL SYNOD UPDATE

The Church of Ireland General Synod 2026 took place in the Slieve Donard Hotel, Newcastle, Co Down. Proceedings began with a service of Holy Communion in which the soon to be retired Bishop of Meath and Kildare, the Most Rev Pat Storey gave the address. Bishop David invited those new to the Diocese, both clergy and lay, to serve Holy Communion; our Rector Sarah was pleased to be involved in this. Although the General Synod can sometimes seem full of laws, legislation, and legalities, it is a very important three-day event in the life of the Church of Ireland. It is where bills and motions are discussed and voted on, helping to support ministry across the island of Ireland and enabling God's Church to grow. Bill one focused on amending the clergy disciplinary process, Bill two looked at clergy ill health policy and made provisions with guidelines for better support. Bill three looked at where there was a pastoral breakdown between parish and clergy, and established a mechanism for dealing with such issues. Finally, Bill four looked at changing the wording in the constitution to reflect the new Child Safeguarding Policy, which was released at synod.

CHILD SAFEGUARDING POLICY UPDATE



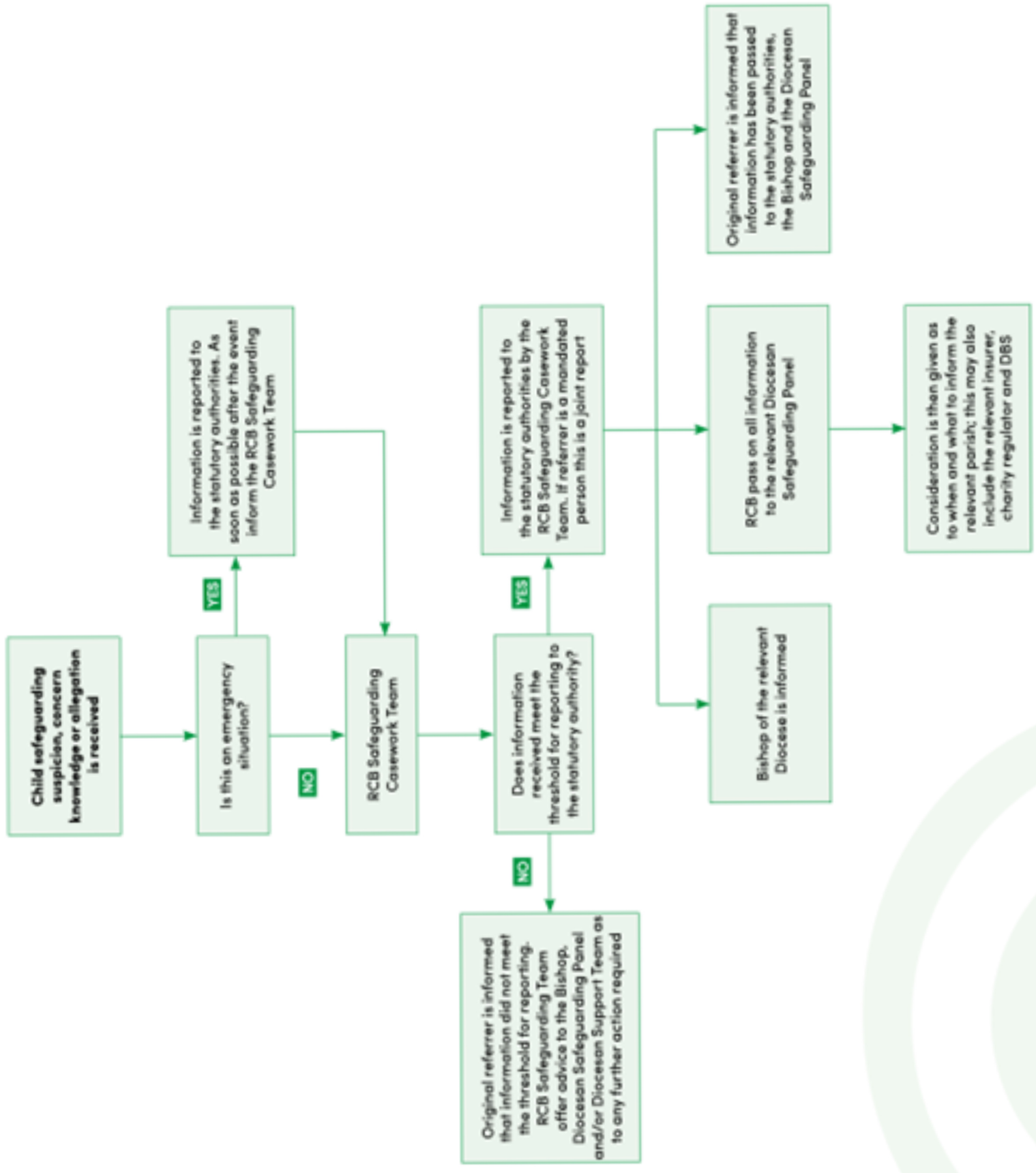
As noted in the 'General Synod update', The Child Safeguarding Policy (previously known as Safeguarding Trust) has been updated as of May 2026. You will notice new posters as well as a copy of the policy on our notice boards in both the main church building and halls of Killaney and Carryduff. Additionally, with thanks to Maureen Kealy, we now have a safeguarding section on our website. The new policy focuses on three standards: protecting, responding and complying. 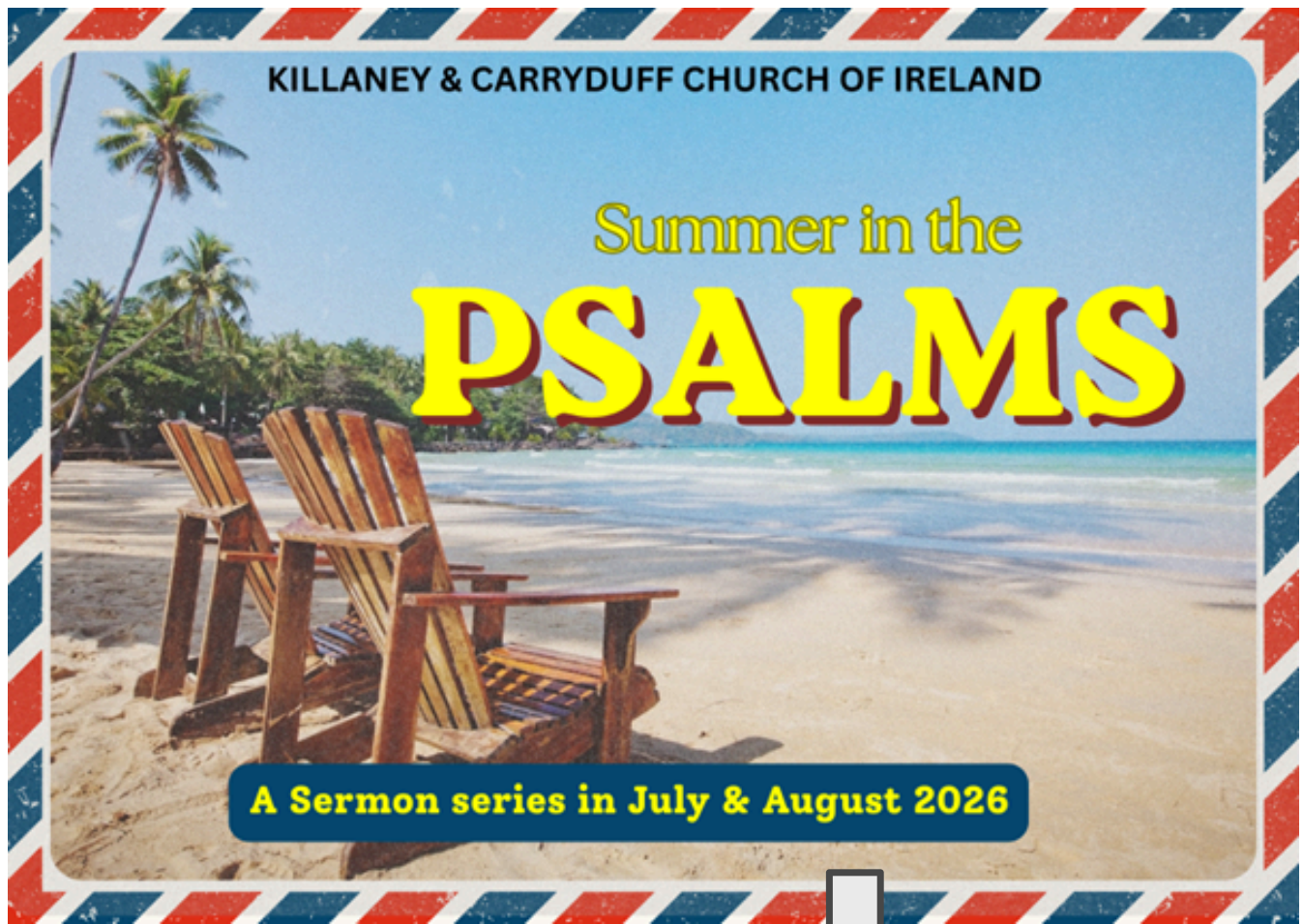
One of the main changes is how safeguarding concerns are reported. Contact details of the Parish panel and the relevant statutory authorities are included on our safeguarding posters.

An Excess of Privilege

Maybe this is something that we don't really think about all that deeply. Yet there are several times - like during our annual shoe box appeal when the so much less fortunate people in our world do briefly claim our attention.

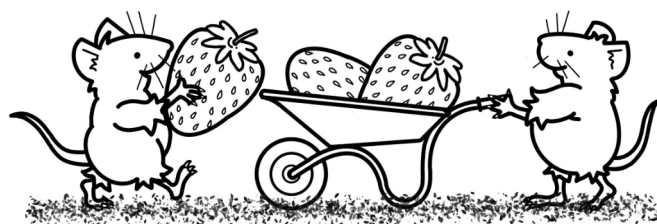
It is a very clear and straightforward issue within our tradition that God has given us the ability to love, to enjoy a deep relationship with Him and also with our fellow less fortunate fellow human beings. It is in this unarguable context that, emphatically, we discover true meaning and value. In essence, we are called to acknowledge our enjoyment of relative privilege and - significantly - to extend true generosity of both spirit and substance to others so much less fortunate than ourselves.

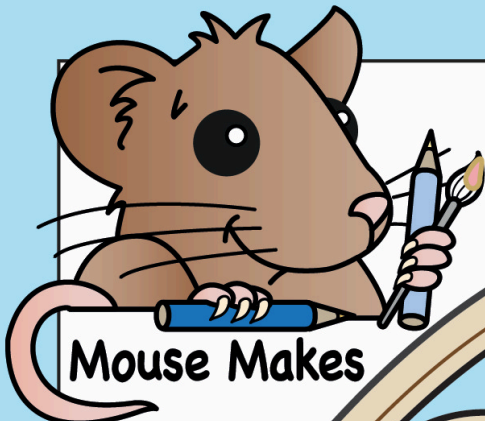
Writing personally, I am not particularly enthusiastic about the smug self-indulgent influence and enormous personal wealth of the Donald Trumps of this world. There are other rather more pressing issues - not least the need for genuine peace and understanding in those areas of the contemporary world where normal life can be overwhelmed by challenging and alarming everyday experiences - places like, for example, Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan and the Middle East.

We cannot in conscience truly ignore all this strife, poverty and deprivation. To come straight to the point, God has given us the ability to love - and that absolutely includes a caring relationship with all our fellow human beings. We are compelled to share our relative privilege with other human creatures elsewhere for whom life is so much less privileged.

How, you may reasonably ask? At the very least our enthusiastic support for Christian Aid and the annual Shoe Box appeal for Operation Christmas Child are positive steps in the right direction.

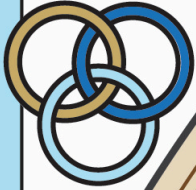

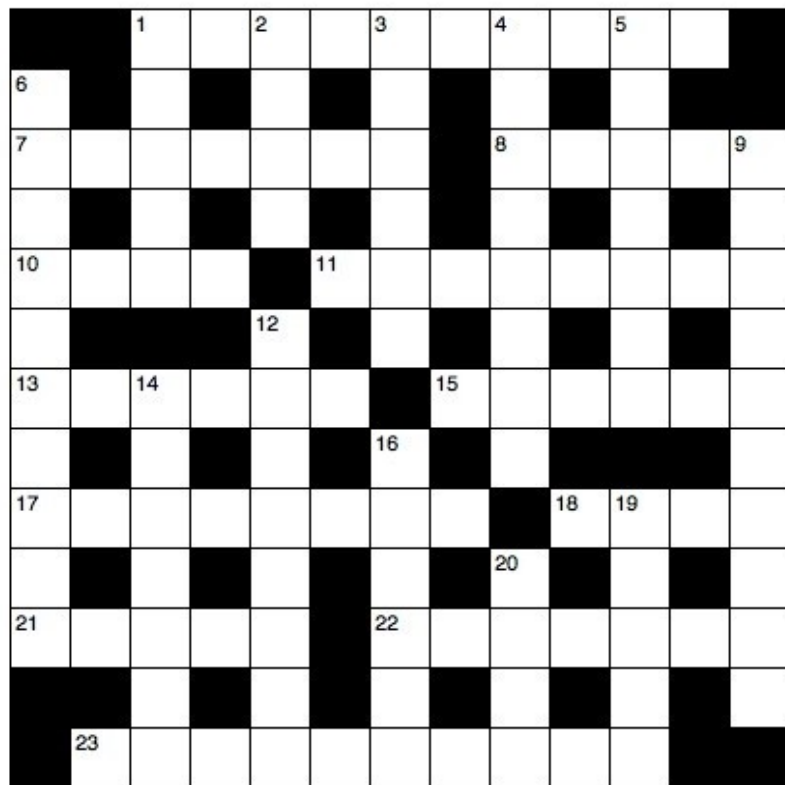

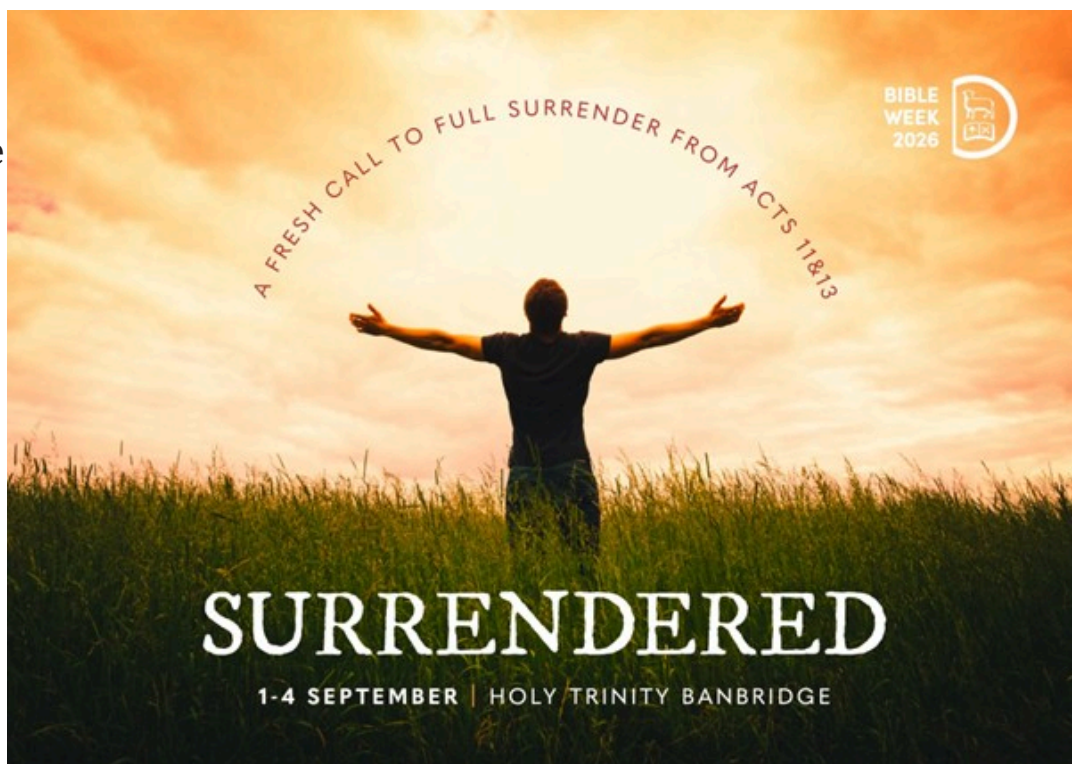
